SOCIAL JUSTICE FUND

Established in 2018, the Eagles Social Justice Fund was formed to provide grants to organizations that work to reduce barriers to equal opportunity, with a specific focus on education, community and police relations, improving the criminal justice system, and other initiatives targeting poverty, racial equality, and workforce development in the Greater Philadelphia area.

Led by a panel of players and club executives, the Eagles Social Justice Leadership Council works to identify potential grant recipients and secures contributions to the Eagles Social Justice Fund. The Fund is built through one-to-one matching donations from players and the club.

In just four years, the program has provided area-based organizations with more than \$1.6 million in funding.

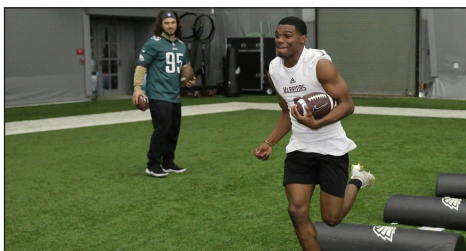
The Eagles Eye Mobile has impacted nearly 100,000 children in the Greater Philadelphia area since launching in 1996.

YOUTH FOOTBALL

The Eagles are dedicated to supporting safe play and helping to foster a love for the game at the youth level through developmental programming, equipment donations, and financial support.

Grassroots partnerships and league platforms, such as NFL PLAY 60, NFL FLAG, the Eagles Football Academy, 7v7 Tournaments, and the Positive Coaching Alliance, ensure that the game is being taught properly to inspire the next generation of athletes.

In May 2021, the Eagles donated more than \$330,000 worth of Gatorade product and football equipment to support the Philadelphia Public League's return to fall sports following COVID-19.

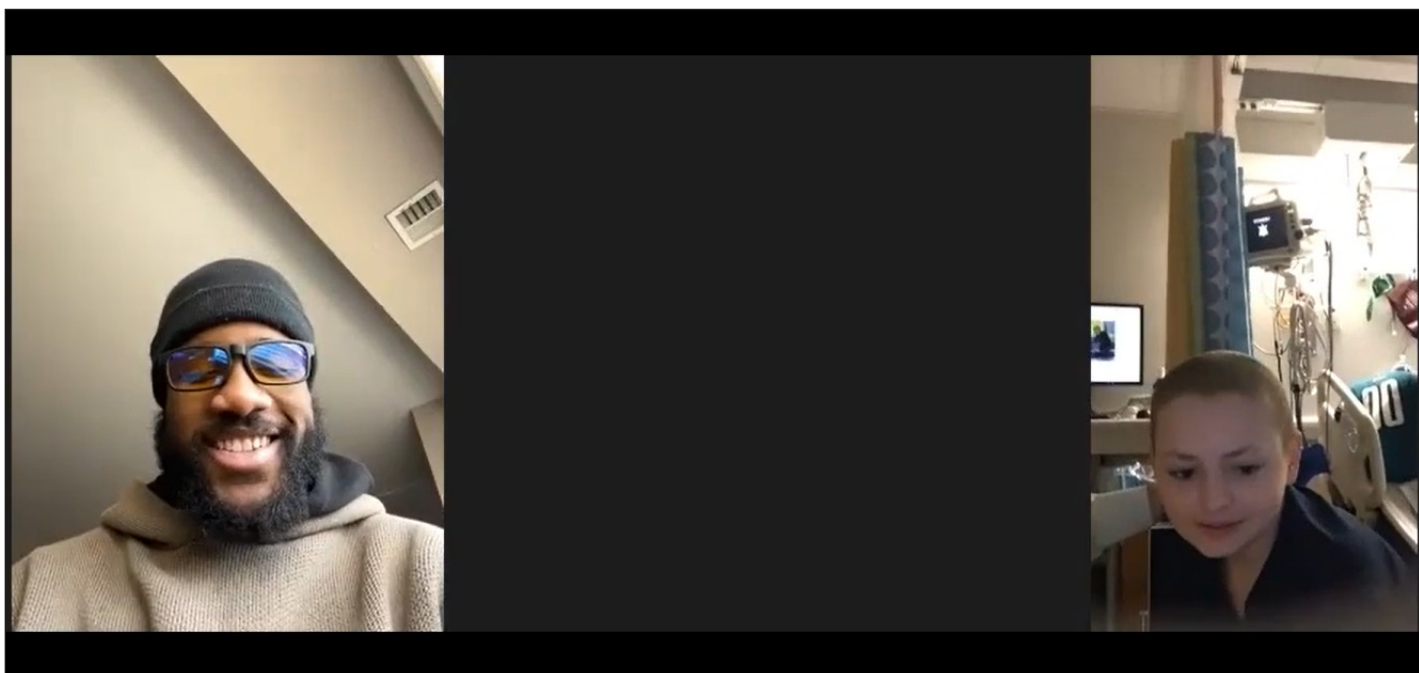

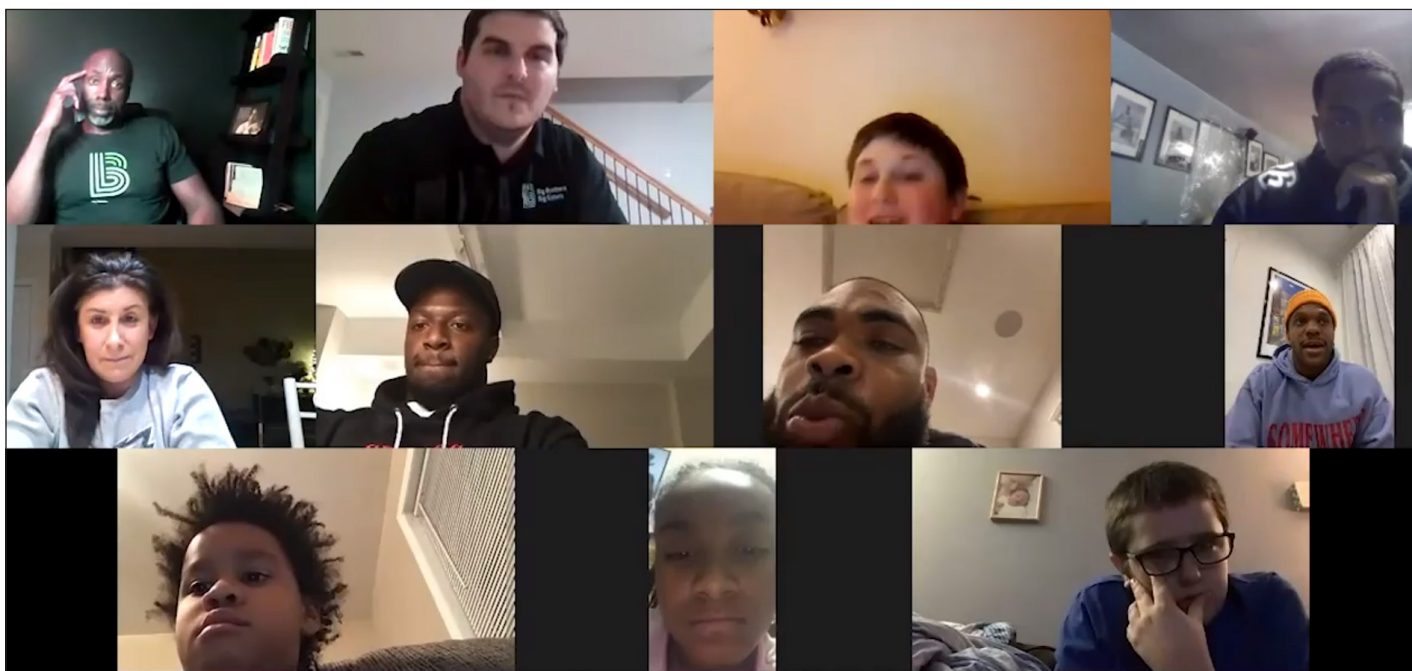

Brandon Graham, Jordan Howard, and Rodney McLeod joined the call to announce that the organization would be receiving a \$10,600 grant from the Eagles Social Justice Fund for their committed efforts behind mentorship in the Philly area.

The grant was part of the team's 'End Philly Gun Violence' campaign which distributed \$316,600 to 32 Philadelphia nonprofits committed to serving the region through specialized social justice work. Since 2018, BBBS has received \$55,600 through the Eagles Social Justice Fund.
