

1995 GAME-BY-GAME REVIEW

Game 1, Sun., Sept. 3 Tampa Bay 21, Philadelphia 6 Veterans Stadium 66,266

The Eagles opened their 63rd NFL season and their first under head coach Ray Rhodes with a disappointing loss to the visiting Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 21-6. Mistakes seemed to haunt the Birds all day long as they committed eight penalties and two costly 2nd-half turnovers, while converting only 6 of 15 third-down opportunities (1-5 in the 2nd half). Philadelphia moved the ball well on its first two drives but the Birds were haunted - as they were in the preseason - by the inability to get touchdowns from inside the red zone. Instead, the Eagles had to settle for 2 FGs. WR/KR Kelvin Martin, who was one of 23 players making their Eagle debut, returned a punt 38 yards to help set up Gary Anderson's first FG, a 21-ydr. However, the Bucs struck right back on their next play from scrimmage with a picture-perfect 64-yd scoring strike from QB Trent Dilfer to WR Horace Copeland to make the score 7-3. On their ensuing possession, the Eagles settled for another Anderson FG - this time from 28 yds away to cut the Bucs' lead to 7-6. The game would remain 7-6 until early in the 4th qtr., when Dilfer, after Ricky Watters' second fumble of the day, connected with TE Jackie Harris on a 10-yd TD pass to stretch the Tampa lead to 14-6. After the Eagles punted on their next drive, the Bucs, faced with a 3rd-and-10 in their own territory, used another Dilfer-to-Copeland bomb that covered 44 yds to set up RB Errict Rhett's 19-yd TD run that sealed the 21-6 loss.

Game 2, Sun., Sept. 10 Philadelphia 31, Arizona 19 Sun Devil Stadium 45,004

The Eagles captured their first victory of the 1995 season and their first under the direction of rookie head coach Ray Rhodes with a 31-19 win over Buddy Ryan's Arizona Cardinals at Sun Devil Stadium. In a nationally televised contest (TNT) played in 99-degree heat, both back-up quarterbacks (Phila's Rodney Peete and Arz's Mike Buck) took center stage early on. Rhodes replaced an ineffective Randall Cunningham with Peete in the 2nd quarter. Likewise, Ryan inserted Mike Buck in place of starter David Krieg in the 2nd stanza after Krieg threw 2 INTs, including one that Birds' LB William Thomas returned 37 yds for his first career TD and a 7-0 Philly lead. Peete, seeing his first regular season action of '95, went on to finish the night 13-8-145 as a passer, including a 19-yd TD toss to WR Fred Barnett. Peete and the Birds also benefitted from a solid running game keyed by the strong play of the offensive line and RBs Ricky Watters (22-94-28LG) and Charlie Garner (10-71-28LG-1TD). The game, however, was a costly one for both clubs. The Eagles lost two starters for the remainder of the season to knee injuries - FB Kevin Turner and RT Lester Holmes. The Cards sustained injuries to starting MLB Eric Hill and DT Eric Swann. A stingy run defense and a 21-pt. second half also loomed large in the Birds' first victory over the Cardinals in Tempe, AZ, since 1992. The Birds' allowed Arizona only 30 yards on 23 carries (a 1.2 avg.), including a 17-21 rushing night for the highly-touted Garrison Hearst. In fact, Arz's 30 rush. yds were the lowest output by an Eagle opponent since Houston posted 21 yds on 11 carries on 12/2/91. In the early going, the game had all the makings of a classic defensive struggle as each team failed to produce a point during the first 23 minutes of the contest. After Thomas' INT return for a TD, PK Gary Anderson converted the PAT and, subsequently, moved ahead of Lou Groza and into 10th place on the NFL's all-time scoring list. On the next drive, Buck led the Redbirds to a 21-yd FG by K Greg Davis with just 0:34 left in the half. A 38-yd kick-off return by Kelvin Martin, however, set the stage for Peete, whose passing led the Birds to a 43-yd FG by Anderson for a 10-3 halftime lead. The Birds came

out strong in the 2nd half as consecutive 28-yd runs by Watters and Garner set up Garner's 1-yd TD plunge. After another Davis FG, Peete answered back with his TD strike to Barnett early in the 4th stanza. On the ensuing drive, however, CB Mark McMillian was flagged for a questionable interference call that placed the Cards at the PE1. From there Hearst's 1-yd run cut the Eagle lead to 24-13. Peete then led a 9-play, 62-yd drive capped by rookie FB Fred McCrary's 1-yd TD dive.

Game 3, Sun., Sept. 17
San Diego 27, Philadelphia 21
Veterans Stadium 63,081

The Eagles suffered their fifth consecutive defeat at home, dropping a 27-21 decision to the visiting San Diego Chargers at Veterans Stadium. Big plays took a toll on the Eagles as the Chargers scored on a 38-yd pass, a 29-yd fumble return, and an 88-yd punt return. In the process, San Diego overcame a 14-0 deficit by scoring 27 unanswered points and then held off a comeback attempt by the Birds. The Ea-

gles got off a to a flying start as QB Randall Cunningham connected with RB Ricky Watters on a 4-yd swing pass that put Philly up 7-0. Later in the first stanza, FS Greg Jackson recovered a Natrone Means fumble at the SD36, setting up Cunningham's 1-yd TD strike to WR Fred Barnett on the first play of the 2nd qtr. for a 14-0 lead. But the defending AFC Champion Chargers bounced back on their next possession as KR Andre Coleman returned the ensuing kickoff 41 yds to the PE49, setting up QB Stan Humphries' 38-yd TD pass to WR Shawn Jefferson. Late in the 2nd qtr., Phila. had opportunities to thwart a Charger drive but after CB Derrick Frazier dropped a potential INT and LB William Thomas was unable to corral a Humphries fumble, John Carney booted a 35-yd FG. On the Birds' next offensive play, however, Willie Clark caused WR Calvin Williams to fumble and LB Junior Seau returned the ball 29 yards for a 17-14 Charger lead at the half. Just minutes into the 3rd qtr, San Diego upped its lead to 24-14 when Andre Coleman returned a Tom Hutton punt 88 yds for a score. The Chargers' vaunted power back Natrone Means (23-122 rushing) then keyed another 3rd qtr. drive that ate up time and set up a FG. But the Eagles marched right back, cutting their deficit to 6 as Cunningham engineered an 80-yd TD drive. That drive was highlighted by a 33-yd pass to Calvin Williams and an 18-yd Ricky Watters run, and capped off by Cunningham's 3-yd bullet to TE Ed West. Cunningham, benched in favor of Rodney Peete during a win at Arizona the previous Sunday, returned to the starting lineup and looked fairly sharp, finishing with 39-23-196-1-3TD passing numbers. On the day, Philadelphia topped San Diego in total net yards (319-270), passing yards (181-139), and rushing yards (138-131), but came up short on special teams where the Chargers had the edge with a 41-yd kick return and the 88-yd punt return TD.

Game 4, Sun., Sept. 24
Oakland 48, Philadelphia 17
Oakland Coliseum 48,875

For the second week in a row, the Eagles jumped out to a big lead in the first quarter, only to see the roof cave in. This time, in their first regular season visit to the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum since 1971, the Birds let a 17-0 edge evaporate under an avalanche of turnovers, sacks, and 48 unanswered points by the Raiders. Philadelphia used a balanced 10-play drive, capped by Charlie Garner's 7-yd TD run to go up 7-0 before MLB Kurt Gouveia's interception off Raider QB Jeff Hostetler set up Gary Anderson's 30-yd FG and a 10-0 lead. Two plays later, DT Andy Harmon stripped WR Rocket Ismail of the football on a reverse and FS Greg Jackson upped Philly's lead to 17-0 by returning the fumble 45 yds for a TD. Philadelphia, however, would not score again. From the mid 2nd Qtr. on, Oakland took control in the trenches on both sides of the ball, giving QB Jeff Hostetler time to throw and wreaking havoc on the Eagles' QBs. In all, the Raiders made 5 takeaways (2 INTs, 3 FRs) and 7 sacks, and scored on two of those takeaways by returning fumbles for TDs. Oakland evened the score in the 2nd Qtr. with a Cole Ford FG, a Harvey Williams' 1-yd TD plunge on a 14-play drive, and with Austin Robbins' 6-yd return of a fumble by Ricky Watters. Philadelphia then missed a 55-yd FG just before the half; it was the last time the Birds would threaten. In the 2nd half, the Raiders marched to a FG for a 20-17 lead and then ended four straight Eagles possessions with a fumble, two INTs, and another fumble. The first and third of those takeaways by the Raiders resulted in a 7-yd Hostetler-to-Derrick Fenner TD pass and a 4-yd TD run by Harvey Williams that put Oakland on top 34-17. The fourth takeaway came when Aundray Bruce sacked QB Rodney Peete (who had come on in relief of Randall Cunningham late in the 3rd Qtr) and forced a fumble that LB Rob Fredrickson returned 35 yds. for a TD. Oakland then closed out the scoring when Daryl Hobbs turned a Vince Evans pass into a 54-yd TD. While DE Pat Swilling (3 sacks), Bruce (2 sacks), and Fredrickson (1 INT & 1 TD on a fumble return), led the Raiders' defense, Hostetler (32-22-272-1 TD passing) and Williams (2

rushing TDs) led the Silver and Black offense. On the afternoon, the Raiders outgained the Eagles 439 yds. to 236 and were never forced to punt.

Game 5, Sun., Oct. 8
Philadelphia 15, New Orleans 10
Louisiana Superdome 43,938

The Eagles used 5 Gary Anderson field goals to get back on the winning track as they downed the host New Orleans Saints, 15-10. Philadelphia's defense, stretched thin by injuries to its top two linemen - LDE William Fuller (hamstring) and LDT Andy Harmon (groin) - still managed to put pressure on Saints QB Jim Everett (24-10-102-0-1INT/3 sacks) all day long. The group was led by rookie first round pick Mike Mamula, who not only recorded the first two sacks of his career, but also knocked Everett out of the game for a period of time in the 3rd qtr. with a sprained ankle. Offensively, Rodney Peete, the man whom coach Ray Rhodes chose to start at QB over Randall

Cunningham, did a workmanlike job of guiding the Eagles into scoring position time and again. After a 34-yard FG by Chip Lohmiller, the Eagles answered right back as Peete, making his first start as an Eagle, drove the Birds 81 yds on 17 plays with the drive culminating in a 20-yd FG by Anderson for a 3-3 tie. The game remained tied with 1:01 left in the half, when Peete engineered a two-minute drill that set up Anderson's 43-yd FG that put Philly up 6-3 as time expired. Early in the 2nd half, the Eagles again moved the ball effectively as RB Ricky Watters, who returned to action after suffering a sprained neck in the 1st qtr, ran for 31 yards on 6 carries to get the Eagles to the NO9. On the next play, Peete scored on a QB draw but LG Guy McIntyre was flagged for holding and the Birds eventually settled for another FG, this time from 36 yds for a 9-3 lead. On the ensuing possession, Mamula registered his first career sack and sent Everett to the bench with a sprained ankle. But Tommy Hodson came on in relief and, on his first play, handed off to WR Torrance Small who took a reverse 44 yds for a TD and a 10-9 Saints lead. On their subsequent possession, the Eagles regained the lead for good with 1:18 left in the 3rd qtr. as Anderson booted a 37-yd FG, his 4th of the day. On the drive, the Eagles converted two 3rd-n-long situations with a 23-yd screen pass to Watters and a 13-yd pass to WR Calvin Williams. On each of those plays, Watters and Williams put forth great individual efforts to elude and run over tacklers en route to a first down. The Eagles added a 42-yd Anderson FG with 7:24 left to play, upping their lead to 15-10. Philly then held the Saints in check on three possessions as a hobbled Everett returned to action midway through the 4th qtr only to be sacked twice by Mamula and Daniel Stubbs before DB Barry Wilburn intercepted a last gasp Hail Mary pass to lock up the win.

Game 6, Sun., Oct. 8 Philadelphia 37, Washington 34 (OT) Veterans Stadium 65,498

As was the case during each of their previous five matchups, the Philadelphia Eagles and Washington Redskins played to a dramatic finish with the Birds prevailing in an overtime shootout, 37-34, at Veterans Stadium. Gary Anderson's 35-yd FG with 4:54 left in the extra session lifted the Eagles to their sixth consecutive triumph over the 'Skins. Philly's version of the West Coast offense - simply put - was awesome. Running backs Ricky Watters (25-139 rush./11-90 rec.) and Charlie Garner (9-120-3TDs rush.) led the way as the Eagles racked up 524 yards of total offense - their best output since 11/15/81, when they gained 574 yards vs. the Baltimore Colts. In fact, the 272 yards rushing were the most by the Birds since they gained 304 yds. vs. the Patriots on 11/4/90. Philadelphia also upped its record to 21-0-1 in their last 22 contests in which an Eagle has topped the 100-yd rushing mark. Watters and Garner, however, became the first pair of Eagles RBs to each rush for 100 yds in the same game since 12/17/78 when Wilbert Montgomery and Mike Hogan did so vs. the Giants. The Eagles got off to a quick start as Garner raced 55 yards for a TD on the game's fifth play from scrimmage. For Garner, the run was the longest of his brief career. After a FG by former Eagle Eddie Murray, Wash's Brian Mitchell returned a Tom Hutton punt 59 yards for a TD to put the Redskins on top 10-7. The Eagles finished the 1st qtr. scoring as Anderson nailed the first of his three FGs on the day, this one a 40-ydr., to knot the score at 10-10. But the 'Skins struck right back in the 2nd stanza as they recovered a fumble by Eagle WR Kelvin Martin and converted it into a 40-yd scoring pass from Gus Frerotte to Henry Ellard. Led by QB Rodney Peete, who made his second consecutive start, the Eagles surged back with a 12-play, 80-yd drive capped off by a 1-yd plunge by Garner to even the score at 17-17 with 3:07 left in the half. Looking to re-take the lead, Frerotte drove the Redskins to the PE39 before losing a fumble on a sack by Andy Harmon, who tied a personal career best effort with 3 sacks on the day. Daniel Stubbs, starting at LDE for the second straight game in place of an injured William Fuller, recovered the ball at the WR48 with 1:11 remaining in the half. Peete then completed 4 straight passes, including a 19-yd catch-n-run that Watters took to the WR2. Peete, who finished the



game 45-30-256-1-1TD, then found WR Fred Barnett in the end zone to give the Eagles a 24-17 halftime lead. The fast and furious scoring pace continued in the 2nd half as Frerotte scored on a 1-yd keeper to even the game once again at 24-24. But an INT off Frerotte by FS Greg Jackson later in the 3rd set up Garner's nifty 17-yd TD run that gave the Eagles a 31-24 lead. For Garner, the three rushing TDs equaled a club record last set by Wilbert Montgomery vs. Hou on 12/19/82. Murray misfired on a 47-yd FG and Anderson booted a 43-ydr to give the Birds a 34-24 lead early in the 4th Q. But the Redskins would not quit, as Frerotte brought them back on an 80-yd drive that was capped off by a juggling, 12-yd TD catch by Ellard that closed the gap to 34-31. After 'Skins' CB Tom Carter made a shoestring, first-down saving tackle on Watters, Washington drove 57 yds on 15 plays to set up a 46-yd FG into the wind by Murray. Murray's boot barely passed over the crossbar but it was good enough to send the contest into overtime. After winning the coin toss, the Redskins' initial drive stalled at the PE45 when CB Bobby Taylor batted away a 3rd down pass intended for Michael Westbrook. On the Eagles' subsequent possession, Peete marched the Birds 73 yds. to the WR18. The drive was highlighted by Watters, who was 7-33 rushing, and Peete, completed 4 of 5 passes, including two 3rd down conversions to Barnett. The latter of those came at the WR47 where, facing a 3rd-n-8 situation, Barnett made a leaping 16-yd catch to sustain the drive and set up Anderson's game-winning 35-yd kick.

The Eagles used another strong defensive performance and a 122-yd, 1 TD rushing day by Ricky Watters to defeat the host New York Giants, 17-14. The Birds' defense rallied behind the strength of 6 sacks, 3 interceptions, and 1 fumble recovery (for a TD) to beat the New Yorkers for the first time since 12/27/92. After a scoreless 1st qtr, the Eagles took a 7-0 lead on the second play of the 2nd qtr. as Watters scampered 8 yds. into the end zone for his first rushing TD as an Eagle. On the ensuing drive, MLB Kurt Gouveia forced a fumble by Giants' RB Rodney Hampton that SS Michael Zordich recovered and returned 58 yds. for a score and a 14-0 lead. The Giants' Brad Daluiso then booted two FGs, including a 27-ydr. with 2 seconds left in the half to trim the Eagles lead to 14-6. The second of those FGs came after Birds' punt returner Kelvin Martin muffed a punt at the E31. The second half featured both club's backup quarterbacks as Eagles starter Rodney Peete, leveled on a QB scramble late in the 2nd qtr., was sidelined by a mild concussion. Randall Cunningham replaced Peete for the rest of the game, marking his first game action since the Birds' Sept. 24th loss to Oakland. After stalling on the first drive of the 2nd half, the Giants inserted QB Tommy Maddox for Dave Brown, who, besides being sacked 5 times, went only 18-9-82 passing on the afternoon. Maddox didn't fare much better against the Birds defense as he was intercepted 3 times, including 2 thefts by RLB William Thomas on successive Giant drives in the 3rd qtr. After Gary Anderson nailed a 40-yd FG early in the 4th qtr to put the Eagles up 17-6, the game appeared to be in hand until Giant RB Keith Elias forced a fumble by rookie P Tom Hutton that Omar Douglas scooped up and returned 41 yds. for a TD. Hampton scampered two yards for the 2-point conversion to make the score 17-14 with 4:45 left in regulation. The Giants had one last attempt to tie the score but Zordich intercepted a Maddox pass in Eagle territory with :53 left to preserve the win. Besides Zordich, Watters, and Thomas, other Eagles who turned in strong performances were 1st year DT Kevin Johnson, who notched the first two sacks of his career, and DT Andy Harmon, who also logged a pair of sacks.

For the second game in a row, the Eagles' defense turned in a stellar performance, this time leading the Birds to a 20-9 win over the visiting St. Louis Rams. Philadelphia's fourth straight win boosted their record to 5-3. After entering the game with league's number-one ranked defense, the Eagles flexed their defensive muscle with six sacks, two interceptions, and two fumble recoveries including one that was returned for a touchdown. The Birds' fierce pass rush was led by LDT Andy Harmon (2 sacks) and LDE William Fuller (2 sacks, 2 FF in his first start since missing nearly 3 full games with a hamstring pull) as the Birds logged their second straight 6-sack performance - a feat last accomplished by Philly in 1985. After a scoreless 1st qtr, the Eagles opened the scoring early in the 2nd stanza as QB Rodney Peete connected with WR Calvin Williams on a 33-yd scoring strike. After stifling the Rams' offense throughout the half (63 total yards allowed), the Eagles marched 80 yards on 17 plays to set up a 20-yd FG by Gary Anderson with 12 seconds remaining to give Philly a 10-0 halftime lead. The Rams' offense, however, came out strong in the second half as

Miller drove St. Louis to the PE15 on their first possession, only to have Steve McLaughlin misfire on a 32-yd FG try. After the Eagles went 3-n-out on the ensuing possession, St. Louis marched deep into Eagle territory again but had to settle for a 29-yd FG that cut the Birds' lead to 10-3. St. Louis opened the 4th qtr. with a 7-play, 78-yd drive capped off by a 12-yd Chris Miller-to-Isaac Bruce TD toss that put the Rams within one point of a tie. With the Rams lined up for a PAT try, head coach Rich Brooks shifted his club into the "swinging gate" formation and had the ball snapped directly to LB Carlos Jenkins. Eagles LB William Thomas stopped Jenkins short of the end zone, however, to preserve a 10-9 lead. On their ensuing possession, the Eagles stormed right back as RB Charlie Garner raced 36 yards to set up an Anderson FG and a 13-9 lead with just under 10:00 left to play. Then, with the Rams at their own 45, Fuller's second sack of the day forced a fumble by Miller. First-year DT Kevin Johnson scooped up the loose ball, followed the blocking of Fuller, and rumbled 37 yards for his first NFL TD. Philadelphia's defense then sealed the win for good as Thomas and CB Mark McMillian registered INTs off Miller on the Rams' final two drives.

Philadelphia's four-game winning streak came to a halt in Dallas where the Cowboys handed the Eagles a 32-14 defeat in front of a national television audience on ABC's Monday Night Football. Dallas' dynamic trio of QB Troy Aikman, RB Emmitt Smith, and WR Michael Irvin entered the game as the league leaders in passing, rushing, and receiving, respectively, and did little to hurt their rankings. Smith rushed for 158 yds. and 2 TDs on 27 carries for his sixth 100-yd day in his last seven outings vs. the Birds. Irvin's 8-115 receiving effort put him over 100 yards for the 7th straight game, tying an NFL record. Aikman was a cool, efficient, 24-17-202-1-1 TD through the air while receiving outstanding protection from his offensive line. A fumble by Smith deep in Dallas territory on the game's opening series gave Philadelphia a golden opportunity but the Birds had to settle for a 36-yd FG by Gary Anderson and a 3-0 lead. The lead, however, was short-lived as Dallas went 69 yards to a TD, the last 39 coming on a tackle-breaking run by Smith. Two series later, Deion Sanders took a handoff from punt returner Kevin Williams on a reverse and went 43 yards to the PE 42 to set up a 42-yd FG by Chris Boniol for a 10-3 edge at the end of one quarter. Early in the 2nd stanza, Aikman capped a 75-yd drive with an 11-yd TD toss to Irvin that put Dallas up 17-3. Another FG by Anderson trimmed the Birds' deficit to 9 and Dallas took a 17-6 lead into the locker room at halftime. The Eagles' offense came to life at the start of the 2nd half as QB Rodney Peete, making his 4th straight start, marched the Birds 54 yds to a touchdown. RB Ricky Watters' 2-yd plunge cut Dallas' lead to 17-12 but Peete's pass to Kelvin Martin on a 2-point conversion att. was incomplete. Dallas bounced right back, however, as a 38-yd Aikman to Irvin hookup led to Smith's 2nd rushing TD of the game, this one a 3-ydr. for a 24-12 lead. In the final stanza, Dallas simply turned up the heat as Boniol nailed another FG and CB Larry Brown returned an interception off Peete 20 yds for a TD.

Philadelphia put together one of its finest all-around performances of the season as they routed the visiting Denver Broncos, 31-13, in front of a Sunday night national television audience. With the win, the Eagles upped their record to 6-4 as they captured their 11th consecutive primetime victory at Veterans Stadium since 9/10/79. The Eagles passing game, which had struggled in recent weeks, got back on track in fine fashion as QB Rodney Peete threw for 264 yards and 1 TD on 25-37 passing in leading Philly to TDs on each of their first three possessions. WRs Calvin Williams and Fred Barnett, the latter of whom returned from from a two-game absence because of a pulled hamstring, also contributed heavily to the victory with 7-79 and 7-105 receiving performances, respectively. Philly got on the board quickly as they marched 77 yards on 11 plays on the game's opening drive that was capped off by a 1-yd TD catch by TE Reggie Johnson. Denver, however, answered right back as QB John Elway connected with WR Anthony Miller on a 46-yd scoring play to tie the game at 7-7. The Birds did not flinch though, as Watters rumbled into the endzone from 5 yds. out to finish a 12-play, 73-yd drive and give Philly a 14-7 lead. On the Broncos next drive, DEs Mike Mamula and William Fuller combined on a knockdown of Elway that sidelined the veteran signal caller for the rest of the game with a concussion. Hugh Millen replaced Elway and, although the Broncos ended up with a 44-yd FG by Jason Elam on that drive, the Broncos offensive attack would not be the same as the Eagles defense stymied Denver the rest of the way. Peete finished the first-half scoring as he scampered into the endzone on a rollout from 2 yds. out

to make the score 21-10. Denver opened the 2nd half scoring as Elam nailed a 48-yd FG late in the 3rd qtr. to cut the Eagle lead to 21-13. After the Birds stalled on their next drive, the Broncos threatened to score once again, but SS Michael Zordich sacked and forced a fumble by Millen on a safety blitz. Mamula scooped up the bouncing ball and rumbled 25 yds to the DB16. Four plays later, Watters scored on a 1-yd plunge to give the Eagles a commanding 28-13 lead. K Gary Anderson sealed the win by booting a 39-yd FG to give the Birds their 11th win in their last 13 primetime games. On the evening, Philly was nearly flawless on both sides of the ball as they did not commit a turnover, allowed only one sack, and were penalized only 3 times for 20 yards. The Eagles outgained the Broncos 381-283 in total offense, while logging 34:42 in time of possession.

The Eagles used a season-high 8 sacks from their defense and 2 touchdowns apiece from RB Ricky Watters and WR Fred Barnett to down the visiting NY Giants, 28-19. The win, the Birds' 6th in their last seven outings, upped Philadelphia's record to 7-4. Rookie DE Mike Mamula set the tone for the Eagles with 3 sacks in the first half before leaving the game with a shoulder injury. DT Andy Harmon chipped in 2 sacks and DEs William Fuller and Daniel Stubbs each contributed a sack in the fourth quarter that caused a fumble. Other defenders making big plays were LB William Thomas, who notched his 5th interception of the year, and CB Mark McMillian, who grabbed his 3rd. Offensively, QB Rodney Peete led the Birds to a 21-7 halftime advantage with a 20-14-133-1-2TDs passing effort but was sidelined for the 2nd half by a bruised hip. As was the case when these two teams met in Week 6, Randall Cunningham took over for the injured Peete at the start of the 2nd half. After Ricky Watters fumbled on the Eagles opening drive, Giants QB Dave Brown connected with Thomas Lewis on 46-yd TD off a flea flicker to put the New Yorkers ahead 7-0. Philly stormed right back on their next possession as Watters atoned for the earlier fumble by racing 57 yds to set up a 13-yd scoring pass from Peete to Barnett. Then McMillian intercepted a Brown aerial on the Giants next drive to set up Watters' 3-yd TD run that put the Eagles on top, 14-7. After a wild sequence of events in the 2nd qtr. in which 3 turnovers were committed in a string of 4 plays, the Eagles managed to take a 21-7 lead as Rodney Peete found Barnett in the endzone to give the Birds a 14-pt lead. Despite a fine first half, Peete suffered a hip flexor injury that would eventually sideline the Eagles' signal caller for the remainder of the game. On the 3rd play of the 2nd half, the Eagles were dealt another serious blow as Mamula, who registered 3 sacks of Brown in the first half, suffered a dislocated left shoulder that would sideline him for the remainder of the contest. The New Yorkers opened the second half scoring on a 44-yd FG by Brad Daluiso to cut the Eagles' lead to 21-10. But the Birds answered right back as Cunningham directed the Birds 65 yds. on 8 plays to give the Eagles a 28-10 lead as Watters registered his 2nd rushing TD (1 yd) of the game. The Giants, however, would not quit as Rodney Hampton's 1-yd plunge on 4th and goal cut the Eagles' lead to 28-17. After the Birds stalled on their next drive, NYG DE Michael Strahan blocked a Tom Hutton punt. The ball would eventually bounce through the Eagles end zone and result in a safety that made the score 28-19 with 11:16 left in the contest. But the Eagles defense stifled the Giant attack the rest of the way as sacks by Harmon, Fuller (which knocked Brown out of the game) and Stubbs (which caused a fumble that



Fuller recovered) down the stretch helped preserve the win and give the Birds their first season sweep of the Giants since 1992.

It wasn't fancy and it wasn't pretty, but the Eagles' 14-7 win over the Redskins at Washington's RFK Stadium was their eighth of the year and their seventh triumph in their last eight games. After going on top 6-0 in the first qtr., the Birds carried that lead into the final stanza only to see Washington take a 7-6 advantage with 14:22 left to play. Philadelphia, however, stormed right back on its ensuing possession. Starting quarterback Rodney Peete, who had been benched by head coach Ray Rhodes for two series in the third qtr., was reinserted and promptly sparked the Birds. Peete completed three straight passes, including 18 and 31-yarders to WR Fred Barnett to put the Birds at the W20. From there, Watters' 1-yd. TD plunge and Peete's 2-point conversion pass to WR Calvin Williams (the Eagles' first suc-

cessful 2-pt. try in four attempts since the rule was instituted in 1994) gave Philadelphia a 14-7 lead. The 2-point conversion was necessary after the Birds' first PAT try by Gary Anderson, a 30-yd. attempt following a penalty, bounced off the right upright in the first qtr. On the day, Watters and Garner powered the Eagles' offense, combining for 174 of Philadelphia's 179 rushing yards. While Garner was 11-50-4.5, Watters surpassed 1,000 yds. for the season with a 25-124-2TD effort. For Watters, it was his third straight game with 2 rushing TDs and his third 100-yd. rushing day of the year. Peete, playing with limited mobility due to a strained and bruised hip suffered a week earlier vs. the Giants, finished the day 23-16-150-1-0TDs passing. Rookie CB Bobby Taylor's interception off Redskins' QB Heath Shuler with 11:04 left to play gave the Eagles the ball at the W33 with a chance to put the game out of reach. Anderson, however, missed a 41-yd. FG try. Philadelphia FS Greg Jackson then made a huge play, breaking up a Shuler bomb to Olanda Truitt deep in Eagles territory to help seal Philadelphia's 7th straight win over the 'Skins. Another key element not to be overlooked in the Eagles' win was the play of the punt coverage unit which held Washington's dangerous Brian Mitchell, who had returned a punt for a TD at Philadelphia earlier in the year, to 26 yards on 4 runbacks.

Game 13, Sun., Dec. 3 Seattle 26, Philadelphia 14 Kingdome 39,893

After winning seven of their last eight games, the Eagles stumbled at Seattle, losing to the Seahawks, 26-14, in the Kingdome. The loss dropped the Birds' record to 8-5. As such, the Eagles missed a big opportunity to gain ground on the NFC East division-leading Dallas Cowboys who fell to 10-3 with a loss to Washington. An Eagles win at Seattle would have set up a game 14 battle for first place between Philadelphia and Dallas. Seattle jumped out to a 7-0 lead in the 1st qtr and led wire-to-wire. The Seahawks got on the board first after forcing the Eagles to punt from their own 1. Seattle subsequently took over at the P40 and, from there, used a combination of Rick Mirer's passing and Chris Warren's running to set up Warren's 5-yd TD burst. On Seattle's next possession, Mirer's 17-yd scramble to the P11 set up his own QB draw for a TD and a 14-0 lead. Philadelphia then moved 60 yds to the S15 but came up empty when Gary Anderson's 32-yd FG was off the mark. The Eagles, however, continued to move the ball well on their next possession, using a 27-yd Rodney Peete to Calvin Williams pass and a 12-yd run by Ricky Watters to set up a 1-yd TD scamper by Watters that cut the Seahawks lead to 14-7 with 1:14 to play in the half. But Seattle widened that margin just before intermission. A kick return to the S41, a 13-yd run by Steve Broussard, and 13 and 8-yd passes from Mirer to Brian Blades set up Todd Peterson's 47-yd FG as time expired. It was the first of four FGs on the day for Peterson. In the 2nd half, Seattle continued to churn out yardage with the running of Warren and with short sideline passes from Mirer to Blades and fellow WR Joey Galloway. The resulting 3 FGs and a Seattle defensive effort that limited Philly to 100 yards in the 2nd half would be good enough to hold off the Eagles. Trailing 20-7, the Eagles showed life late in the 3rd qtr after Derrick Witherspoon ret'd a kickoff to the P41. Peete led the Birds to Watters' second TD run of the day, cutting the Seahawks' lead to 20-14. Seattle, however, put together 41 and 38-yd FG drives on their next two possessions and held the Eagles scoreless the rest of the way. The Seahawks finished with 167 rushing yds. and a 56% conversion rate on 3rd down (10 of 18). For Philadelphia, Watters put together his fourth straight game with 2 rushing TDs. Watters was, in fact, the only Eagle with a rushing attempt as fellow backfield mate Charlie Garner sat out the contest due to a broken thumb suffered the previous week at Washington.

Game 14, Sun., Dec. 10 Philadelphia 20, Dallas 17 Veterans Stadium 66,198

In perhaps their biggest victory at Veterans Stadium since crushing Dallas in a Monday night encounter in 1992, the Eagles erased a 14-point deficit to knock off the Cowboys, 20-17. The victory boosted Philadelphia's record to 9-5 and pulled the Birds to within a game of the NFC East-leading Cowboys, who dropped to 10-4. The win also snapped a string of seven straight losses at the hands of Dallas. The strong running of RB Ricky Watters (33-112-1TD) along with a marvelous second half defensive effort that virtually shut down the Cowboys' vaunted trio of all-pros - QB Troy Aikman, RB Emmitt Smith, and WR Michael Irvin - were keys to the victory. But perhaps the biggest play of the day came late in the 4th qtr. with the game tied at 17-17. Facing a 4th-and-inches at their own 29, Dallas coach Barry Switzer elected to go for it rather than punt. The Birds then stuffed two consecutive runs off left guard by Smith (the first of those plays had been blown dead by a referee's whistle for the 2-minute warning). Shortly thereafter, Gary Anderson booted what appeared to be a game-winning 42-yard FG. That, too, was waived off, however, as officials had not given the signal for play to start. Forced to try the same kick again, Anderson was perfect, nailing his second late-minute, game-winning FG of the year. The second half defensive surge by the Eagles saw them



completely shut down Aikman, Smith, and Irvin. After Aikman was 5 of 6 passing for 65 yds in the 1st half, he was just 6 of 22 for 45 yards after intermission. Similarly, Smith, who had been 18-98-1TD in the first half, gained just 10 yards and fumbled once on 9 carries in the second half. Irvin, by comparison was held in check virtually all afternoon by rookie CB Bobby Taylor. After catching two passes for 24 yards early in the first quarter, Irvin was held to just one catch the rest of the way, a harmless 16-yarder with 1:12 to play in the game. Philadelphia had struck first, going on top 3-0 with a 42-yd Anderson FG before falling behind, 17-3. Dallas' scoring came on Smith's 10-yd TD burst, a Chris Boniol FG, and Larry Brown's 65-yd return of an interception off Rodney Peete for a score. A 27-yard Anderson boot did, however, narrow the Birds' deficit to 11 points just before halftime. Late in the third quarter, Watters brought the Birds closer with a 1-yd TD plunge that was followed by a successful 2-point conversion pass from Peete to WR Fred Barnett. Then, disaster seemingly struck for the Birds as Peete lost his grip on the ball while attempting to pass and DE Leon Lett's fumble recovery gave Dallas the ball at the P15. On 1st-and-goal from the 5, however, Smith lost the ball on a jarring hit by MLB Kurt Gouveia and the Eagles recovered at their own 2. Later in the final stanza, an 11-play, 41-yd. Eagles' drive was capped by Anderson's game-tying 38-yd FG and the stage was set for the Birds' dramatic, victorious finish.

Game 15, Sun., Dec. 17 Philadelphia 21, Arizona 20 Veterans Stadium 62,076

With a 21-20 victory over the visiting Cardinals, Philadelphia upped its record to 10-5 and clinched its first playoff berth since 1992. After overcoming a 14-point deficit a week earlier vs. Dallas, the Birds battled their way out of a 17-0 hole against Arizona with a big effort in the second half. In a game filled with turnovers and miscues, the three biggest plays came in the fourth quarter. Early in the final stanza, the Eagles took a 21-20 lead, their first of the day, when Calvin Williams took a short pass from Rodney Peete and broke away from Seth Joyner en route to a 37-yd TD. Then, with just over two minutes left in the game, Eagles' reserve DT Mark Gunn sacked Dave Krieg for a 7-yd loss at the PE 29. One play later, Greg Davis, who was 4-for-4 on FGs to that point, saw his 47-yd try fall just short. Although Arizona had one more possession, Eagles linebacker William Thomas showed why he was elected to the Pro Bowl just three days earlier when he sealed the win with his second interception of the day off Krieg. After returning the opening kickoff 70 yds to the PE 24, Arizona took a 3-0 lead. They then converted three first half takeaways (2 INTs, 1 FR) into a 17-0 lead. Leading 6-0 in the 2nd qtr, Brent Alexander forced a fumble by Eagles' WR Calvin Williams that the Cards recovered at the PE 25. Four plays later, FB Larry Centers scored on a 1-yd plunge and Krieg fired a 2-pt. conversion pass to Stevie Anderson for a 14-0 lead. One series later, former Eagle Seth Joyner returned an INT off Peete to midfield, setting up another Cards' FG. But Philadelphia finally got on the board when first-year player Derrick Witherspoon returned the ensuing kickoff 86 yds for a TD. Early in the 3rd qtr, Eagles' LB Bill Romanowski forced a fumble by RB Garrison Hearst that Greg Jackson recovered at the AC23. Two plays later, Peete drilled a 21-yd TD pass to reserve TE Reggie Johnson to trim the Cards' lead to 17-14. After Davis' 4th FG of the day bumped the Cards' lead to 6, Arizona had a chance to stomp on the Eagles before Hearst fumbled at the PE2 and Barry Wilburn pounced on the loose ball in the end zone. Philadelphia then scrapped and fought and took the lead for the first time on Williams' 37-yd catch-n-run TD with 12:10 left to play in the game. Overall in the second half, the Eagles would recover three fumbles by Hearst and pick off two passes by Krieg.

Game 16, Sun., Dec. 24 Chicago 20, Philadelphia 14 Soldier Field 52,391

After clinching a playoff berth a week earlier with a victory against the Cardinals, the Eagles travelled to Chicago needing a win over the Bears and a win by Arizona over Dallas to wrap up the NFC East division title. Those hopes were dashed, however, as Philadelphia fell, 20-14, and assured Dallas the division crown. The loss put the Birds' regular season record at 10-6 and extended the club's string of futility in the Windy City to 0-14 lifetime. For the fourth consecutive week, Philadelphia gave up 17 first half points and fell behind early as the offense sputtered out of the gate. Chicago took the opening kickoff and marched to the Birds' 19 before turning the ball over via a fumble. On Philadelphia's first play, however, DE Alonzo Spellman sacked Eagles' QB Rodney Peete and forced a fumble that the Bears recovered at the PE15. Two plays later, Erik Kramer tossed the first of his two TD passes on the day to TE Keith Jennings for a 7-0 lead. Chicago then missed a 40-yd FG try before Peete passed the Eagles to the CB8, setting up Charlie Garner's TD scamper that knotted the game at 7-7. In the 2nd quarter, Chicago dominated on both sides of the ball while putting together a 13-play FG drive and an 11-play, 49-yd TD drive that gave the Bears a 17-7 edge at halftime. Key factors on both sides were Chicago's success on 3rd downs (a combined 5 of 6) and the running of Rashaan Salaam, who was 21-104 in the first half.

Eagles' LB Bill Romanowski then made two big plays in the 3rd quarter, first with an interception off Kramer at the CB36 and then with a fumble recovery at the Eagles' 8. Although Philadelphia's offense could capitalize on neither of the two ensuing possessions, the Birds scored on a wild play following the latter series. That came when a punt by Tom Hutton bounced off the leg of Chicago's Dennis Lundy at the CB5 and rolled into the end zone where Jerome Henderson recovered it for a TD that narrowed the Bears' lead to 17-14. But after the Bears started their next drive at their own 45, they marched to the Philadelphia 10 and got a 28-yd FG from Kevin Butler that provided the game's final score. Philadelphia had three more cracks at winning the game but on two of those series, Peete was intercepted. The first pass theft came with the Eagles facing 3rd-n-7 at the CB27. A Bears' blitz forced an errant throw that went off the hand of TE Reggie Johnson and was picked off by Marty Carter. The next interception, by DB John Mangum, came at the Eagles' 40. Overall, Chicago's swarming defense held the Eagles to their lowest yardage output of the season, 211 yards, including just 13 yards on 12 carries by RB Ricky Watters, who had entered the game as the 3rd leading rusher in the NFC. In the game, Eagles' WR Art Monk extended his NFL record of consecutive games with a reception to 183 by hauling in a 36-yd pass from Peete. On that play, however, Monk suffered a fractured left arm when tackled by DB Mark Carrier.

NFC Wild Card Game, Sat., Dec. 30 Philadelphia 58, Detroit 37 Veterans Stadium 66,099

In the highest scoring game in NFL playoff history, the Philadelphia Eagles soared to their first postseason win at Veterans Stadium since January 11, 1981 (a 20-7 win over the Cowboys in the NFC Championship Game) with a 58-37 thumping of the Detroit Lions. Team and NFL postseason records were threatened all day long as the Eagles' 58-point barrage was not only a club record, but was the third highest total by one team in NFL postseason history. After an interception and return by Eagles' CB Mark McMillian set up the Birds deep in Lions' territory, RB Charlie Garner scampered 15 yds. for Philly's first of 7 TDs - the most by any Eagle team in the postseason. On Detroit's ensuing drive, QB Scott Mitchell, who otherwise had a miserable afternoon (29-13-155-4-1TD) before being replaced by Don Majkowski in the 2nd half, hit TE David Sloan on a 32-yd scoring pass to knot the score at 7-7 to end the first stanza. The 2nd quarter, however, would be nothing like the first as the Eagles scored 31 pts. in one of the most memorable 15-minute periods in club history. The Birds' 31 2nd-qtr points were the second most ever scored in one stanza of postseason play (behind only the 35 scored by Washington in the 2nd quarter of their SB XXII win over Denver). After a Gary Anderson FG upped the Birds lead to 10-7, QB Rodney Peete, who was making his first playoff start, connected with WR Fred Barnett on a picture-perfect 22-yd scoring pass. Three plays later, Mitchell was intercepted by Eagles' DB Barry Wilburn, who then raced 24 yds for a TD that gave the Birds a commanding 24-7 lead. Philly continued its torrid pace by intercepting yet another Mitchell aerial - this time MLB Kurt Gouveia came up with the 3rd of the Birds' postseason record 6 INTs on the day. That theft set up a 1-yd TD run by RB Ricky Watters. After the Lions stalled on their next series, Philly would then take over at their own 16-yard line with 2:32 remaining. From there, a 20-yd run by Garner and a 22-yd reception by Reggie Johnson set up a 43-yd Hail Mary pass from Peete to Rob Carpenter that gave the Eagles a 38-7 lead as time expired in the 1st half. Comfortably ahead as they entered the 2nd half, the Eagles would not slow down as Peete connected with Watters on a 45-yd TD pass. Peete, who finished the day 25-17-270-0-3TDs, led the Birds to 5 TDs and 3 FGs on their first 11 possessions before giving way to Randall Cunningham early on in the 4th qtr. Gary Anderson upped the Birds lead to 51-7 with a pair of 3rd-qtr FGs (31 and 39-yds) to extend his consecutive FG streak in the postseason to 16 and break Rafael Septien's league record of 15 set with the Cowboys in 1978-82. Al-

though the Lions sandwiched a William Thomas INT return for a TD - the Birds' 2nd defensive score of the game - with 4 TDs of their own in the game's final 21 minutes, the outcome of the contest was never in jeopardy as the Birds equaled their largest margin of victory in a playoff game with the 21-point win. There were many heroes on the afternoon for Philly, including Barnett, who came through with a 8-109-1TD receiving performance. Peete tied a club playoff record with his 3 TD passes. And the first-team defense also put together one of its finest efforts of the '95 campaign as they limited the league's number-one ranked offensive unit to just 7 pts. in the first 40 minutes. Employing a 5-DB set against the Lions' 3-WR, 1-RB, 1-TE set, defensive coordinator Emmitt Thomas's troops registered 6 INTs, 17 pass knock-downs, and 2 sacks, while limiting all-pro RB Barry Sanders to just 40 yds. on 10 carries.

NFC Divisional Game, Sun., Jan. 7 Dallas 30, Philadelphia 11 Texas Stadium 64,371

Ray Rhodes' inaugural season as head coach of the Eagles came to a halt as they were downed by the Dallas Cowboys, 30-11, in an NFC Divisional Playoff game at Texas Stadium. The loss to the Cowboys marked the second time in four years that the Birds were eliminated from the playoffs at the hands of their NFC rivals. Dallas also defeated the visiting Eagles, 34-10, in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game on 1/10/93. A balanced offensive attack and a stingy defense was the name of the game for the Cowboys from the start as they mounted a 17-3 halftime lead. With the Eagles trailing 3-0, Mark McMillian INT'd a Troy Aikman pass that was deflected by fellow CB Bobby Taylor. That set up a 26-yd FG by Gary Anderson on the first play of the 2nd qtr. to tie the game at 3-3. However, that scoring drive proved to be costly to the Eagles as QB Rodney Peete was lost for the game with a concussion suffered as a result of a hit by SS Darren Woodson. The Eagles would get no closer for the rest of the afternoon as scoring runs by Deion Sanders and Emmitt Smith vaulted Dallas to a 17-3 halftime lead. Dallas K Chris Boniol added two FGs (18 and 51 yds.) in the 3rd stanza, before Aikman connected with WR Michael Irvin on a 9-yd. scoring strike to give the 'Boys a commanding 30-3 advantage. For Irvin, that TD catch would be his only reception of the day as rookie CB Bobby Taylor virtually shut down the all-pro receiver for the second consecutive game. The Eagles closed out the scoring on a 4-yd TD run by backup QB Randall Cunningham and two-pt. conversion pass from Cunningham to TE Reggie Johnson.
