QUICK HITS

- Washington will open the season at home for the first time since hosting the Eagles in the season opener in 2017.
- Washington will open the season against the same opponent in consecutive seasons for the first time since facing the New York Giants in back-to-back season openers in 2008-09.
- Washington will be seeking a win to give them their first win in season openers since a 24-6 victory at the Arizona Cardinals in 2018. The club is looking for their first win in a home opener since defeating the Jacksonville Jaguars 41-10 in 2014.
- Washington is 41-43-4 all-time in season openers, including a 25-25 record in openers since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

AGAINST THE BIRDS

- **WR Terry McLaurin** tallied 10 receptions for 255 yards and two touchdowns against the Eagles in his rookie season last year. That is the third-most receiving yards by a rookie all-time against the club.



- Since 2011, **DE Ryan Kerrigan** has tallied 11.5 sacks against the Eagles, the most sacks of any defensive player against Philadelphia during that time span. His 11 forced fumbles and 13 TFL are also tops among Eagles opponents during that time.



- **QB Dwayne Haskins Jr.** completed 19-of-28 passes for 261 yards and two touchdowns in his first career game against the Philadelphia.. He finished the game with a 121.3 passer rating, the sixth-highest rating in a rookie season against the Eagles all-time. His 261 passing yards against the club are the ninth-most among rookies all-time.



- Since 2015, **S Landon Collins** has tallied seven TFL against the Eagles, tied with teammate Ryan Kerrigan for the second-most against Philadelphia during that time span. His seven TFL since 2015 are the most against the Eagles amongst defensive backs.

WE ARE NOTE WORTHY

TEAM



- » Washington opens the season at home for the first time since hosting the Eagles in the season opener in 2017.
- » Washington opens the season against the same opponent in consecutive seasons for the first time since facing the New York Giants in back-to-back season openers in 2008-09.
- » A win will give Washington their first win in season openers since a 24-6 victory at the Arizona Cardinals in 2018.
- » A win will give Washington their first win in a home opener since defeating the Jacksonville Jaguars 41-10 in 2014.
- » Washington is 41-43-4 all-time in season openers, including a 25-25 record in openers since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.
- » The opener against the Eagles marks the fourth-straight season Washington has opened against NFC competition since opening against the Dallas Cowboys, New York Giants, New Orleans Saints and Eagles in Week 1 of the 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013 seasons respectively.
- » Today's game marks the 31st time Washington has opened a season against a division opponent, dating back to the Boston season opener against the Pittsburgh Pirates in an NFL Eastern Division clash on Sept. 13, 1936.
- » Including postseason play, Washington is 86-79-5 all-time against the Eagles, including season series sweeps in 2015 and 2016.
- » Washington's 86 all-time wins against the Eagles are their most against any opponent.
- » Washington's 44-38-3 all-time in home games against the Eagles and the club is 2-3 in home openers against Philadelphia since 1940.
- » Washington's 27 points against Philadelphia last season were the most against the club since Dec. 11, 2016 when they defeated the Eagles 27-22 at Lincoln Financial Field.



OFFENSE



QB Dwayne Haskins Jr.

- » Quarterback Dwayne Haskins Jr. will make his first-career Week 1 start.
- » Haskins Jr. appeared in nine games with seven starts last season. He completed 119-203 passes for 1,365 yards and seven touchdowns
- » Haskins Jr.'s 119 pass completions are the second-most through a quarterbacks first nine-career games in Washington history trailing only Robert Griffin III [172].
- » Haskins Jr. became the 10th rookie in franchise history to throw for 1,000 yards last season.
- » In his start against the Eagles last season, Haskins Jr. finished with a career high in yards and QB rating [121.3] as well as tying a career-high in completions [19].
- » Haskins Jr.'s 121.3 passer rating in Week 16 against the Eagles last season was the highest for a Washington quarterback since Kirk Cousins posted a 132.6 passer rating in Week 11 of the 2017 season.

WR Terry McLaurin

- » McLaurin will make his second-straight Week 1 start.
- » McLaurin finished the season with 919 receiving yards and seven touchdowns. His 919 receiving yards were the second-most by a rookie receiver in franchise history.
- » McLaurin hauled in 58 passes last season, the fourth-most amongst rookie-receivers in franchise history.
- » McLaurin tallied 10 receptions for 255 yards and two touchdowns against the Eagles in his rookie season last year. That is the third-most receiving yards by a rookie all-time against the club.
- » McLaurin's 919 receiving yards were the second-most by an NFL rookie last season.
- » McLaurin became the third rookie in franchise history last season to have 50 catches, 750 receiving yards and five touchdown receptions, joining Gary Clark [1985] and Charley Taylor [1964].

WR Steven Sims Jr.

- » Sims Jr. became the fifth undrafted rookie in franchise history to post five touchdowns in a season [Robert Kelly, 2016; Keiland Williams, 2010; Hugh Taylor, 1947; Steve Bagarus, 1945] last season.
- » •Sims Jr. was one of 10 undrafted players in the NFL to score

at least six touchdowns last season.

- » Sims Jr. is one of five active players to have a receiving, rushing and kickoff return score in their rookie season [Alvin Kamara, 2017; Tyreek Hill, 2016; David Johnson, 2015; Cordarrelle Patterson, 2013]. He was the first rookie in franchise history to achieve that.
- » Sims Jr. finished last season with at least one touchdown in three straight games.

DEFENSE



DT Jonathan Allen

- » DT Jon Allen appeared in 15 games, all starts, in 2019.
- » Allen finished last season with a career-high 68 total tackles. He also tallied seven tackles for loss and six sacks.

DT Matt Ioannidis

- » DT Matt Ioannidis set a new single-season career high in sacks [8.5] in 2019 and has 20.5 in his career.
- » Since the start of 2018, Ioannidis has tallied 16 sacks, the second-most on the Washington Football Team behind DE Ryan Kerrigan's 18.5.
- » Ioannidis tallied nine TFL last season, a career-high.

DE Ryan Kerrigan

- » DE Ryan Kerrigan [90.0] is 1.5 sacks away from passing Dexter Manley [91.0] as the all-time franchise leader.
- » Kerrigan's 90 sacks are the 49th most in NFL history.
- » Kerrigan has started 140 games since the 2011 season, the fifth-most during that span.

S Landon Collins

- » S Landon Collins tallied 117 total tackles last season, fifth-most by a defensive back in a single-season in franchise history.
- » Collins has had at least 95 tackles in each of his first four career seasons. That is tied for the most seasons amongst defensive backs with at least 95 total tackles since 1990.
- » Collins has 75-career tackles against Philadelphia dating back to his debut in 2015. That is the most tackles against the Eagles in that span.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

A win will....

- » Give Washington their first Week 1 victory since defeating the Arizona Cardinals in Week 1 of the 2018 season.
- » Mark the first time Washington has secured a Week 1 victory at home since defeating the New York Giants, 28-14 at FedEx-Field on September 11, 2011.
- » Improve Washington's Week 1 record to 33-38-1.
- » Improve Washington's overall record against Philadelphia to 87-79-5 and 5-5-0 against the club in Week 1.
- » Give Washington Head Coach Ron Rivera his first-career victory with the Washington Football Team.

To Note

- » Washington Head Coach Ron Rivera will become the 30th Head Coach in Washington history to coach in an NFL game.
- » Rivera is four wins away from 80-career regular season wins. He would become the eighth current head coach to achieve the milestone.
- » QB Dwayne Haskins Jr. is making his first-career Week 1 start.
- » Haskins Jr. throwing for three touchdown passes, setting a new single-game career high.
- » Haskins Jr. throwing for 200 or more yards for the third time in his career.
- » Haskins Jr. not throwing an interception for his third-straight game.
- » WR Terry McLaurin tallying 56 yards moving into second-place in franchise history in receiving yards through 15-career games.
- » McLaurin tallying at least 100 yards for the fourth time in his career and fourth-time in 15 career games, breaking a franchise record.
- » DE Ryan Kerrigan recording one sack and moving into first place on Washington's all-time sacks list.
- » Kerrigan making his 10th Week 1 appearance of his career, tied for the most among defensive players since 2011.
- » LB Thomas Davis Sr. appearing in five games will give him 197-career games, the third most among linebackers since 2005.
- » Davis Sr. currently has the most tackles (1,189) and solo tackles (836) among all active players.
- » Davis Sr. is the only active linebacker with 25 or more sacks and 10 or more interceptions.
- » Davis Sr. has the second-most forced fumbles (18) among active inside linebackers, trailing only Tampa Bay's Lavonte David (21).
- » Davis Sr. has appeared in 174-career games, the eighth most among active defensive players.
- » Hopkins [11] becoming the franchise leader in made field goals from 50-yards, passing Mark Moseley [12].
- » Hopkins [35] moving to No. 2 in franchise history in made field goals from 40-49 yards, passing Chip Lohmiller [37].

THE OPPONENT

PHILADELPHIA EAGLES



The Washington Football Team will kick off the 2020 regular season on Sunday when the team plays host to the Philadelphia Eagles at 1:00pm. The contest marks the first home opener for Washington since facing the Eagles at FedExField in 2017. It is also the first time the club will open the season against the same opponent in consecutive seasons since facing the New York Giants in back-to-back season openers in 2008-09.

A win in Landover would give Washington its first win in a season-opener since defeating the Arizona Cardinals, 24-6, in 2018. It would also be Washington's first win in a home opener since routing the Jacksonville Jaguars 41-10 in 2014.

Head Coach Ron Rivera enters his first season in Washington after serving in the same role for the Carolina Panthers from 2011-19. Rivera is 3-2 against the Eagles as a head coach.

Washington will look toward QB Dwayne Haskins Jr. in his second season commanding the huddle. Haskins Jr. amassed 1,365 yards in 2019, which ranked fifth out of rookie quarterbacks. Joining Haskins Jr. this season is former Ohio State teammate and key first-round acquisition DE Chase Young, who will look to make an immediate impact on the stout Washington defensive line. The defense that finished ranked No. 10 in sacks in 2019 with 46 will highlight DTs Jonathan Allen, Daron Payne and Matt Ioannidis alongside DEs Ryan Kerrigan and Montez Sweat. Pro Football Focus ranked Washington's defensive line preseason No. 3 behind Philadelphia, ranked No. 2 with five-time Pro Bowl selection DT Fletcher Cox and second-team All-Pro DE Brandon Graham.

The Eagles are coming off of their third-straight season with a playoff berth, including the franchise's first Super Bowl Championship in 2017. Philadelphia went 9-7 in 2019, losing to the Seattle Seahawks in the Wild Card Round.

Philadelphia is led by QB Carson Wentz who is one of six quarterbacks in NFL history to record 20+ passing TDs with fewer than 10 interceptions for three-straight seasons. Wentz threw for a career-high 4,029 yards while completing 388-of-607 passes on 27 TDs in 2019. Tight ends Zach Ertz and Dallas Goedert set up one of the top tight end duos in the league, combining for the most receiving yards [1,523] for a two tight end set in 2019. The Eagles also return running back Miles Sanders in 2020. While sharing responsibilities in the backfield, Sanders set a franchise record and led all rookie running backs in scrimmage yards [1,327] in 2019. Philadelphia will rely heavily on Sanders in 2020 after losing RB Jordan Howard in free agency.

It is the fourth-straight season Washington will open the season against NFC competition and the 31st time Washington has opened a season against a division opponent.

Washington is 44-38-3 all-time in home games against the Eagles and 2-3 in home openers against Philadelphia since 1940. The club's 86 all-time victories over the Eagles are its most against any opponent. Washington also holds the 89-79-5 all-time advantage, highlighted by two series sweeps in 2015 and 2016.

DOUG PEDERSON



Through four full seasons, Philadelphia Eagles Head Coach Doug Pederson has established himself as one of the premier coaches in the league. The 52-year-old has engineered one of the NFL's most dynamic offenses with creative play design and progressive play calling. Those traits helped Pederson and the Eagles claim their first-ever Super Bowl title in 2017, defeating the New England Patriots 41-33.

Pederson has 42 total wins since 2016, tied with Pete Carroll for fifth-most behind only Bill Belichick [58], Andy Reid [50], Sean Payton [46] and Mike Tomlin [43]. Winning is something Pederson is familiar with. As Kansas City's offensive coordinator from 2013-15, the Chiefs won nearly 70 percent of their games and made two playoff appearances. He is only the fourth person to ever win a Super Bowl title as both a player [Green Bay Packers, 1997] and coach.

In 2018, the Eagles averaged 27 points in the last six weeks of the season to claim their second playoff berth under Pederson. Despite losing starting quarterback Carson Wentz in week 14, the Eagles won their final three regular season games and the NFC Wildcard game with backup quarterback Nick Foles. Philadelphia fell to the New Orleans Saints 20-14 in the NFC Divisional round the following week.

The Eagles ranked seventh in passing yards in 2018 with 4,275. Their rush defense was one of the league's best, also ranking seventh [1,551]. Philadelphia's defense got off the field in crucial moments, holding opposing offenses to 35 percent on third-down conversions, good for fifth-best in the NFL.

Wentz has shined under Pederson, throwing for 14,191 yards and 97 touchdowns in 56 games.

Prior to his season-ending injury in 2017, Wentz was in MVP consideration. In 13 games, Wentz threw for 3,296 yards and 32 touchdowns against just seven interceptions. The Eagles averaged 27.7 points per game during that stretch, scoring 30+ points seven times.

While the Eagles have been known for their offense under Pederson, their defense hasn't been far behind. In 2017, the Eagles ranked in the top five in points allowed per game [18.4], yards allowed per game [306.5] and takeaways [31].

Getting to the quarterback was one of their recipes for success in their Super Bowl run, posting the league's third most hits [112] on the quarterback during the regular season. The pressure on the quarterback helped lead to 19 interceptions.

One of the staples under a Pederson-coached team is protecting the ball and minimizing turnovers. Since 2013, Pederson's offenses have committed 20 or fewer turnovers in five different seasons.

Pederson has a long history in the NFL, playing 12 seasons as a quarterback with six teams. The Super Bowl-winning coach was first hired in 2009 by Andy Reid as Philadelphia's offensive quality control coach. He then served as their quarterbacks coach from 2011-12 and when Reid was hired by the Chiefs in 2013, he hired Pederson to be his offensive coordinator.

GAME-BY-GAME

Sunday's game between Washington and Philadelphia will mark the 171st overall meeting between the division rivals. This is the 170th regular season meeting between the two franchises, not including two meetings in 1943 when the Eagles merged with the Steelers to form the Phil-Pitt Steagles.

Washington leads the all-time regular season series 85-79-5. With exception of the 1943 season, the two teams have played a home-and-home series every year since 1936. Including a playoff win in 1990, the Redskins' 86 combined victories against the Eagles are their most against any opponent.

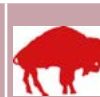

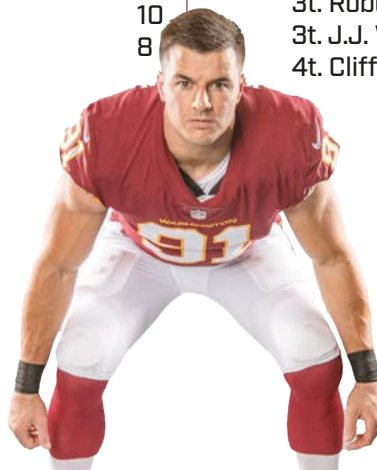

Wide Receiver Terry McLaurin emerged as the team's top target in his rookie season last year. The Ohio State product's big-play ability has placed him on every team's radar. McLaurin finished the 2019 season with 65.6 yards per game, the second-best amongst NFL rookies. His 919 receiving yards were also the second-most amongst NFL rookies.

Jonathan Allen [25]

The vocal leader of the defense, Defensive Tackle Jonathan Allen had another stellar season last year. Allen anchored one of the best defensive lines in the NFL and helped lead a defense that finished in the top 10 in sacks (10th), forced fumbles (7th), and total tackles (1st).

Kendall Fuller [25]

Super Bowl LIV champion Kendall Fuller returns home to Washington after being drafted by the team in the third round of the 2016 NFL Draft. Fuller comes to Washington following a Super Bowl winning season in Kansas City. In his last season in Washington, Fuller led the team with four interceptions.

TEAM NOTES

- Dating back to 2011, Washington has selected at least eight players in 10 consecutive drafts for the first time since the league adopted the seven-round format in 1994.
- Washington completed the 2020 NFL Draft without making a selection in the second round. It was the 10th time since the seven-round draft format was established Washington did not make a selection in the second round.
- Washington acquired three of their selections via trades. They acquired the No. 156 selection from San Francisco in exchange for T Trent Williams. They acquired the No. 162 selection from Seattle in exchange for CB Quinton Dunbar and they acquired the No. 229 selection from Denver in the 2019 trade for QB Case Keenum.
- Washington also acquired a 2021 third round pick from the San Francisco 49ers in the deal for T Trent Williams.
- Washington has selected at least three players with picks acquired via trade in each of the last seven drafts.
- Of Washington's eight selections, three were made with picks acquired by trade, including one draft-day trade with San Francisco (C Keith Ismael).
- Washington selected WR Anthony Gandy-Golden using a compensatory pick. It was the second year in a row that Washington had a compensatory selection. Last season Washington used compensatory selections on LB Cole Holcomb, WR Kelvin Harmon and DE Jordan Brailford. Prior to the 2019 compensatory picks they were the first selections using a compensatory pick since the organization drafted NT Chris Neild with a compensatory pick in the 2011 NFL Draft.
- It was the second consecutive draft that Washington has picked four offensive players in a row (2020: RB Antonio Gibson, T Saahdiq Charles, WR Antonio Gandy-Golden and C Keith Ismael; 2019: WR Terry McLaurin, RB Bryce Love, G Wes Martin and C Ross Pierschbacher). Prior to that, the last time Washington selected four consecutive offensive players in the same draft was 2008 (WR Devin Thomas, TE Fred Davis, WR Malcolm Kelly and T Chad Rinehart).
- It is the first time that the Redskins selected an edge rusher with their first pick since selecting Ryan Kerrigan No. 16 overall in 2011.
- It was the first time since 2012 that Washington had a selection in the top 3 in the first round.
- Washington drafted players from Ohio State with their first pick in consecutive seasons marking the third time in fran-

chise history that the team has drafted players out of the same school with their first pick in back-to-back draft. The other two instances were DT Daron Payne (2018 Alabama) and DT Jonathan Allen (2017 Alabama), FB Leon Heath (1951 Oklahoma) and HB George Thomas (1950 Oklahoma),

- Washington selected four defensive players and have picked at least four defensive players in six consecutive drafts for the first time since 1989-93, when the draft consisted of 12 rounds.
- Five of the 10 members of the Washington draft class played at schools in "Power Five" conferences.
- Washington selected two players from the Big Ten, two players from the Southeastern Conference and one player each from the Atlantic Coast Conference, American Athletic Conference and Mountain West Conference.



CHASE YOUNG (RD. 1, PICK 2)

- Young was the 485th selection made by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 32nd first-round selection in that time frame. He was the 63rd first-round selection by Washington all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Young's selection marks the fourth-straight year in which Washington has selected a defensive player with a first-round pick in the draft joining Montez Sweat (No. 26 overall in 2019), Jonathan Allen (No. 17 overall in 2017) and Daron Payne (No. 13 overall in 2018). This is the first time in team history Washington has selected defensive players with a first-round pick selection in four consecutive drafts.
- Young was the 11th defensive player selected by tWashington in the first round since 1999, joining CB Champ Bailey (1999), LB LaVar Arrington (2000), S Sean Taylor (2004), CB Carlos Rogers (2005), S LaRon Landry (2007), DE/LB Brian Orakpo (2009), LB Ryan Kerrigan (2011), DL Jonathan Allen (2017), DT Daron Payne (2018) and DE Montez Sweat (2019). Seven of the 10 defensive players selected by Washington in the first round in that time frame have earned at least one Pro Bowl selection during their career.
- Young's selection marked the eighth time in the Common Draft era that Washington has selected a defensive lineman in the first round, joining Montez Sweat (2019), Daron Payne (2018), Jonathan Allen (2017), Ryan Kerrigan (2011), Brian Or-

akpo (2009, transitioned to linebacker in 2010), Kenard Lang (1997) and Bobby Wilson (1991). Washington also selected Tracy Rucker (1989, third round), Markus Koch (1986, second round), Bob Slater (1984, second round), Duncan McColl (1977, fourth round) and Bill Brundige (1970, second round) with the team's first selections of each of the drafts listed.

- With the selections of Young, Sweat, Payne and Allen, the Washington has now used first-round selections on defensive linemen in four consecutive drafts for the first time in the Common Draft era.
- Young was the 19th Ohio State product selected by Washington all-time, joining C Steve Andracko (1940), E Cy Souders (1945), B Vic Janowicz (1952), T Julius Wittman (1952), G George Rosso (1954), T Fran Machinsky (1956), T George Tolford (1961), G Mike Ingram (1961), B Dave Francis (1963), G Rod Foster (1963), FB Tom Barrington (1966), E Ron Sepic (1967), RB Rich Galbos (1973), T Henry Brown (1988), G Tim Moxley (1990), WR Evan Spencer (2015), QB Dwayne Haskins Jr. (2019) and WR Terry McLaurin (2019).
- Young's selection marks the third time the franchise has drafted a player with the No. 2 overall pick in the Common Draft Era. The other two selections were LaVar Arrington (2000) and Robert Griffin III (2012).
- Young was the 19th player Washington selected out of Ohio State. Ohio State has now produced the sixth-most draft selections in franchise history, trailing only Notre Dame (34), USC (30), Alabama (26), Penn State (22) and Nebraska (20).
- In 2019, Young ranked No. 1 in the nation in tackles for loss per game (1.91), No. 1 in sacks (16.5) and sacks per game (1.50), No. 2 in forced fumbles (six) and No. 4 in total tackles for loss (21.0).
- Young joined Mike Vrabel as the only player in Ohio State history to post consecutive seasons with 10-plus sacks.
- Young was named the Big Ten's Nagurski-Woodson Defensive Player of the Year, Smith-Brown Defensive Lineman of the Year and first-team All-Big Ten last season.
- Young holds the Ohio State single-season sack record with 16.5 in 2019.
- Young is No. 2 in school history in total sacks (30.5), trailing Mike Vrabel (36.0). Young played in only three seasons compared to Vrabel's four.



ANTONIO GIBSON (RD. 3, PICK 66)

- Gibson was the 486th selection made by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 37th third-round selection in that time frame. He was the 67th third-round selection by Washington all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Gibson became the first offensive player to be selected by the Washington in the 2020 NFL Draft.
- Gibson was the fifth player drafted by the Washington from the University of Memphis, joining RB Richard Williams (1983), DE Carl Taylor (1975), RB Danny Pierce (1970) and DT Will Renfro (1954).
- Dating back to 2011, Washington has selected a running back in 10 consecutive drafts, passing the team's previous high of drafting a running back in nine consecutive drafts from 1983-91.
- Gibson was the fourth player in franchise history selected with the No. 66 pick, joining T Morgan Moses (2014), DT Tracy Rucker (1989) and RB Mike Oliphant (1988).
- Gibson became the third running back produced by Memphis selected by Washington in franchise history joining Richard Williams (1983) and Danny Pierce (1970). He would be the first wide receiver selected from Memphis.
- The selection of Gibson marks the second-highest draft pick from Memphis, trailing only RB Richard Williams (No. 56 in 1983).
- Gibson was Memphis' sixth winner of The American Athletic Conference's Special Teams Player of the Year honor in the conference's first seven seasons, joining punter Tom Hornsey (2013), kicker Jake Elliott (2014-15) and return specialist Tony Pollard (2016-17).
- Gibson finished No. 5 in school history for all purpose yards in a single-season with 1,749 yards.
- Gibson did not record a fumble in his college career and he averaged 19.3 yards per reception.

SAAHQD CHARLES (RD. 4, PICK 108)

- Charles was the 487th selection made by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 47th fourth-round selection in the time frame. He was the 52nd fourth-round selection by the organization all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Charles was the 13th LSU product selected by Washington all-time, joining E Charlie Webb (1946), B Red Knight (1947), E Charlie Webb (1947), B Dan Sandifer (1948), T Ray Potter (1952), B Vince Gonzales (1956), E Billy Shoemaker (1959), RB Bob Brunet (1968), TE Robert Royal (2002), S LaRon Landry (2007), LB Perry Riley (2010) and RB Derrius Guice (2018).
- Charles was the first Washington player ever selected with the No. 108 overall selection.
- Charles was the first offensive tackle selected by Washington since Geron Christian (2018).
- Charles was the first offensive tackle selected by the Washington in the fourth round in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and is the first offensive tackle selected in the fourth round all-time since Fran Machisky out of Ohio State in 1956.
- Charles was part of a unit that was named the 2019 Joe Moore Award Winner given to the nation's top offensive line.
- Charles appeared in 32 games with 28 starts in three seasons was named to the All-SEC Freshman Team in 2017.



ANTONIO GANDY-GOLDEN (RD. 4, PICK 142)

- Gandy-Golden was the 488th selection made by the Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 48th fourth-round selection in the time frame. He was the 53rd fourth-round selection by Washington all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Gandy-Golden was the first ever Liberty product drafted by the Washington Football Team.
- Gandy-Golden joined WR Ryan Grant (2014) as the second player in franchise history drafted with the No. 142 overall selection.
- Gandy-Golden was the third consecutive offensive player selected by the Redskins after drafting DE Chase Young No. 2 overall.
- With the selection of Gandy-Golden, Washington has drafted a wide receiver in seven-consecutive drafts dating back to

2014, which is the longest such streak since 1994-2003.

- Gandy-Golden was the first wide receiver drafted by Washington in the fourth round since Jamison Crowder in 2015 (No. 105 overall).
- Gandy-Golden appeared in 13 games last season and registered 79 receptions for 1,396 yards (17.7 avg.) and 10 touchdowns.
- Gandy-Golden finished his career appearing in 45 games with 240 receptions for 3,814 yards and 33 touchdowns.



KEITH ISMAEL (RD. 5, PICK 156)

- Ismael was the 489th selection made by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 52nd fifth-round selection in the time frame. He was the 77th fifth-round selection by Washington all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Ismael was the eighth player drafted by Washington out of San Diego State University, joining WR DeAndre Maxwell (1996), TE Ray Rowe (1992), DB Harold Hicks (1988), P Wayne Ross (1988), DB Tory Nixon (1985), DB Vernon Dean (1982) and TE Don Warren (1978).
- Ismael joined G Jim Huddleston (1986) and T George Watts (1942) as the third player in franchise history drafted with the No. 156 overall selection.
- Ismael is the fourth-consecutive offensive player selected by Washington after drafting DE Chase Young No. 2 overall.
- Ismael becomes the sixth center selected by the Washington in the fifth round joining Dave Price (1938), George Bujan (1945), Greg Huntington (1993), Mark Fischer (1998) and Ross Pierschbacher (2019).
- Ismael appeared in 38 career games.
- Ismael is a 2019 Pro Football Focus Third-Team All-American and two-time First Team All-Mountain (2018-19).
- Ismael was a two-time SDSU Offensive Lineman of the Year (2018-19).

KHALEKE HUDSON (RD. 5, PICK 162)

- Hudson was the 490th selection made by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 53rd fifth-round selection in the time frame. He is the 78th fifth-round selection by the franchise all-time since the institution of the draft in

1936.

- Hudson was the 17th player drafted by Washington out of the University of Michigan. Michigan ranks No. 9 all-time in total players drafted in the organization's history.
- Hudson joins DE Brandon Jenkins (2013), G Brad Badger (1997), C Bob Caldwell (1963), E Jack Farls (1958) and C Clay Davis (1950) as the sixth player in Washington's history drafted with the No. 162 overall selection.
- Hudson was the second defensive player selected by Washington joining DE Chase Young No. 2 overall.
- Hudson became the ninth linebacker selected by the Washington in the fifth round joining Cole Holcomb (2019), Martell Spaight (2015), Cody Glenn (2009), Dallas Sartz (2007), Robert McCune (2005), Twan Russell (1997), Ravin Caldwell (1986) and Jeff Pegues (1984).
- With the selection of Hudson, Washington has now taken a linebacker in seven consecutive drafts, the longest such streak since a nine-year streak from 1978-86.
- It is the first time in franchise history that Washington have selected a linebacker in the fifth round in consecutive drafts.
- Hudson appeared in 52 games with 37 starts and registered 237 tackles (111 solo), including 26 for loss, 12.0 sacks, two interceptions, 16 passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.
- Hudson was a three-time All Big Ten Honoree.
- Hudson was a Jason Witten Collegiate Man of the Year Semi-finalist.
- Hudson holds a Michigan single game record and tied an NCAA record for total tackles for loss in a single game when he registered eight against Minnesota in 2017.

KAMREN CURL (RD. 7, PICK 216)

- Curl was the 491st selection made by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 65th seventh-round selection in the time frame. He was the 96th seventh-round selection by Washington all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Curl was the seventh player drafted by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) out of the University of Arkansas, joining TE Jeremy Sprinkle (2017), LB Martell Speight (2015), CB Tevin Mitchell (2015), K Zach Hocker (2014), LB Raven Caldwell (1986) and LB Jeff Goff (1982)
- Curl joins TE Tyler Ecker (2007) and DT Delbert Cowsette (2000) as the third player in franchise history drafted with the No. 216 overall selection.
- Curl was the third defensive player in the 2020 NFL Draft selected by Washington joining DE Chase Young (No. 2 overall) and LB Khaleke Hudson (No. 162).
- Curl is the first safety drafted by Washington since Troy Apke in 2018.
- Curl appeared in 34 games with 33 starts and registered 175 tackles (105 solo), two interceptions, three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and two tackles for loss.
- Curl was an SEC Preseason Third Team selection.



JAMES SMITH-WILLIAMS (RD. 7, PICK 229)

- Smith-Williams was the 492nd selection made by Washington in the Common Draft era (since 1967) and the 66th seventh-round selection in the time frame. He was the 97th seventh-round selection by Washington all-time since the institution of the draft in 1936.
- Smith-Williams is the eighth player from North Carolina State selected by Washington all-time, joining E Dom Mac Cara (1937), B Jim O'Rourke (1952), B Alex Webster (1953), T Darrell Dess (1958), G John Lawrence (1960), DB Lloyd Harrison (2000), CB David Amerson (2013) and WR Kelvin Harmon (2019).
- Smith-Williams joined C Erik Cook (2010) as the second player in franchise history drafted with the No. 229 overall selection.
- Smith-Williams was the fourth defensive player selected by Washington in the 2020 draft joining DE Chase Young (No. 2 overall), LB Khaleke Hudson (No. 162) and S Kamren Curl (No. 216).
- Smith-Williams appeared in 43 games with 18 starts and registered 87 tackles (40 solo), including 13 tackles for loss, eight sacks and four passes defended.
- Smith-Williams was named to the prestigious AFCA All State Good Works Team for 2019 for his community service efforts
- Smith-Williams was a semifinalist for the Jason Witten Man of the Year Award.

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BIOGRAPHY

Ron Rivera enters his 24th season coaching in the NFL and his first as Washington's head coach in 2020. He was named the 30th head coach in franchise history on Jan. 1, 2020.

A friend of legendary head coach Joe Gibbs, Rivera is a passionate and skilled leader who has earned the respect of his players, coaching staff and the community. He most recently served as the head coach of the Carolina Panthers for nine seasons, where he led the team to three straight divisional titles and an appearance in Super Bowl 50. Rivera was also recognized twice as the NFL Coach of the Year by the Associated Press in 2013 and in 2015.

Rivera inherited a 2-14 Carolina Panthers team as a rookie head coach in 2011 and guided it back to an NFC force with four playoff appearances since 2013, tied for the second-most playoff berths in the NFC over that six-year period. In that span, the Panthers recorded 58 wins, tied for the most in any six-year period in their franchise history and fifth-most in the NFL.

In 2015, Carolina won its second NFC Championship in franchise history, third consecutive NFC South division title and appeared in Super Bowl 50. Carolina finished the season with a franchise-best 17-2 record, including home playoff victories over Seattle in the divisional round and Arizona in the NFC Championship game.

Hired by the Panthers for his defensive expertise, Rivera did not disappoint as the Panthers put together five top-10 finishes in total defense in seven seasons from 2012-18. Like Rivera, the Panthers' rebound has been steady and solid, starting with six wins in his first season in 2011 and seven victories in 2012 before registering three consecutive division championships starting in 2013 when he earned his first Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year award. Laying a foundation that included back-to-back Rookie of the Year award winners in quarterback Cam Newton and linebacker Luke Kuechly, Rivera blended veteran and young talent into productive units on both sides of the ball.

Rivera helped lead a Panthers team that finished among the league's top 10 rushing offenses, including top-five finishes in 2011, 2015, 2017 and 2018. The Panthers recorded 30 consecutive regular season games with at least 100 rushing yards from Week 6 of 2014 to Week 3 of 2016, the longest streak in the NFL since Pittsburgh tallied 43 from 1974-77.

Carolina's run defense ranked in the top 10 of the NFL in 2013, 2015, 2016 and 2017. Starting in Week 14 of 2016 through Week 1 of 2018, the Panthers went 21 consecutive games without allowing a 100-yard individual rusher, setting a franchise record.

In 2018, Rivera coached two players to All-Pro selections. Panthers running back Christian McCaffrey earned AP All-Pro second-team honors as he helped the Panthers lead the NFL in rushing yards per carry (5.1). McCaffrey also recorded 107 receptions, the most by any running back in a season in NFL history and broke Steve Smith's franchise record for single-season receptions by any player. He ran for 1,098 rushing yards, becoming the third player in NFL history with over 100 receptions and 1,000 rushing yards in the same season. McCaffrey accumulated a franchise-record 1,965 scrimmage yards, ranking third in the NFL.

Linebacker Luke Kuechly earned his sixth-straight Pro Bowl selection and fifth AP All-Pro first-team honor, tied for the most among active players. Kuechly tied for third in the NFL with 20 tackles for loss. In 2017, the rushing attack helped propel the

team to an 11-5 record and a Wild Card berth by averaging 131.4 yards on the ground, good for fourth in the league.

In 2015, Rivera was named NFL Coach of the Year for the second time in three seasons as his team earned its third consecutive NFC South title and claimed the top seed in the NFC for the first time in Panthers franchise history. The Panthers became just the seventh team in the Super Bowl era to post a 15-1 or better record in the regular season. Carolina started 2015 with 14 consecutive victories, which, combined with four wins to close the 2014 regular season, gave the Panthers an NFC-record 18-game winning streak.

Rivera's Panthers went 12-4 and won the NFC South in 2013, Carolina's first division title since 2008. The Panthers then recovered from a 3-8-1 start in 2014 to win four in a row and capture a second consecutive NFC South crown. Prior to Rivera's arrival, Carolina had never reached the postseason in consecutive years, and no team had captured the NFC South twice in a row.

Rivera arrived in Carolina with a reputation for hard work, attention to detail and preparation. Those were also the qualities he exhibited in his first campaign as the Panthers tripled their win total from the previous season. Rivera did not even meet his team until they reported to training camp and, despite a slow start, held it together to finish with four wins in the final six games.

Rivera has shined as a coach and player during his 30-plus years in the NFL, serving as defensive coordinator for the San Diego Chargers' top-ranked defense in 2010 and playing linebacker for the Chicago Bears' top-ranked defense and Super Bowl XX championship team in 1985. In 23 seasons as a coach and nine as a player, he has been with teams that have reached the playoffs 19 times, including nine conference championships and three Super Bowls. The mentality of the Chargers defense that Rivera coached and the Bears defense on which he played has stuck with the head coach, and he has transferred it to his teams.

Rivera's character has been influenced by two innovative defensive coordinators. As a player, Rivera was coached by the late Buddy Ryan, the architect of the "46 Defense," which involved blitzing on nearly every down. As a coach, Rivera toiled under the late Jim Johnson, a highly regarded defensive coordinator renowned for his aggressive approach.

Rivera's identity also has been shaped by his family. The son of a U.S. Army officer and the second youngest of four boys, Rivera learned from a young age about chain of command and many of the principles he teaches and expects from his players. "I come from a military family where discipline isn't taught, it's lived. It's expected from day one. I have a philosophy that every player, every coach, everyone who works for this organization, they'll know it day one," Rivera said in his introductory press conference with Washington on Jan. 2.

Rivera worked with the Chargers from 2007-10. He coached inside linebackers before taking over as the team's defensive coordinator midway through the 2008 season. Under Rivera's guidance, the pass defense steadied itself – intercepting nine passes and yielding 229.6 passing yards per game and 11 touchdown passes over the final eight games. Those numbers contrasted to the first half of the season when San Diego notched just seven picks and was victimized for 265.1 yards per game and 14 touchdowns through the air. In Rivera's first full season leading the defense in 2009, the Chargers ranked 16th in total defense and 11th against the pass. Those rankings improved in 2010 as San Diego led the NFL with an average of 271.6 total yards allowed per game and gave up a league-low 177.8 passing yards per game. From

2004-06, Rivera oversaw the Chicago Bears defense, engineering the unit to two top-five finishes in the league. Under Rivera's direction, five different defensive players went to the Pro Bowl: linebacker Lance Briggs, safety Mike Brown, defensive tackle Tommie Harris, linebacker Brian Urlacher and cornerback Nathan Vasher.

In his first season as a defensive coordinator in 2004, Rivera presided over a defense that produced nine more takeaways and 17 more sacks than the previous year and scored a franchise-record and NFC-high six defensive touchdowns. The Bears also thrived on third down and buckled down inside their own 20-yard line, ranking first in the NFL in third-down efficiency (30.5 percent) and topping the NFC in red zone defense (42.6 percent). The following year, Chicago continued to build on the foundation Rivera laid in 2004. The Bears won their first of two consecutive NFC North titles and stood second in the NFL in total defense. In surrendering the fewest points in the league, Rivera's defense went 43 consecutive quarters without allowing more than seven points – the longest streak in the NFL since 1969. During Rivera's last season with the Bears in 2006, the defense paced the NFL with 44 takeaways and finished fifth in the league in total defense and third in scoring defense, helping propel Chicago to the NFC Championship and an appearance in Super Bowl XLI.

Prior to becoming a defensive coordinator, Rivera spent five seasons from 1999-2003 as the linebackers coach for the Philadelphia Eagles, who advanced to the NFC Championship game in each of his final three seasons. Twice during Rivera's tenure with the Eagles, the team finished second in the NFL in scoring defense and in 2001 held all 16 of its opponents to fewer than 21 points – making them just the fourth team in NFL history to do so.

Rivera gained his first coaching experience with the Bears as a defensive quality control coach from 1997-98. He is just the third Latino head coach in NFL history, joining Tom Flores with the Oakland Raiders from 1979-87 and Seattle Seahawks from 1992-94 and Tom Fears with the New Orleans Saints from 1967-70.

Following retirement from his playing career, Rivera went into broadcasting. He covered the Bears and college football as a television analyst for WGN and SportsChannel Chicago for four years from 1993-96.

Selected in the second round of the 1984 NFL Draft by Chicago, Rivera played all nine of his pro seasons with the Bears. Primarily an outside linebacker, he appeared in 149 games with 62 starts (including 12 postseason contests with six starts) and posted 392 tackles, 7.5 sacks, five forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries, nine interceptions and 15 passes defended. Rivera was a member of six NFC Central division title teams and a Super Bowl XX championship team in 1985.

As a player, Rivera was known for both his skill and determination on the field and his dedication of time and energy to the community. As a result, he was named the Bears' Man of the Year in 1988 and earned the club's Ed Block Courage Award in 1989. He has carried that same community commitment to coaching, sponsoring a bowling tournament to benefit the Ronald McDonald House, USO and Humane Society. He was a finalist for the 2017 Salute to Service Award, an annual award presented to NFL players, coaches, personnel and alumni who demonstrate an exemplary commitment to honoring and supporting the military community.

Rivera, who lost his brother Mickey to pancreatic cancer in 2015, also serves as a spokesman for the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network. He has twice been the honorary starter for the organization's PurpleStride 5K in Charlotte. An All-American at the University of California, Rivera finished his career as the school's all-time leader in sacks with 22 and tackles with 336. As a senior in 1983, he set the Bears' single-season record for sacks with 13 and tackles for loss with 26.5.

Born Jan. 7, 1962, in Fort Ord, Calif., Rivera lived in Germany, Panama, Washington and Maryland before his family settled in Marina, Calif. He attended Seaside High School in Seaside, Calif., and was a three-sport star in football, basketball and baseball. Rivera and his wife, Stephanie, have two children, Christopher and Courtney. Stephanie is a former assistant coach for the WNBA's Washington Mystics.

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BIOGRAPHY

Jack Del Rio enters his 23rd season coaching in the NFL and his first as Washington's Defensive Coordinator in 2020 after being named to the position on January 2, 2020.

Del Rio brings 32 combined seasons of NFL experience to the role, including 21 as a coach and 11 as a player. He has held head coach and defensive coordinator roles with the Oakland Raiders, Denver Broncos, Jacksonville Jaguars and Carolina Panthers. He has also coached 28 players to a total of 56 Pro Bowl selections.

From 2015-17, Del Rio was the Head Coach with the Oakland Raiders. In 2016, he guided the Raiders to a 12-4 record, marking the franchise's first 12-win season since 2000. The Raiders earned a postseason berth for the first time since 2002 and landed an NFL-high seven players on the AFC Pro Bowl squad. Two Raiders earned spots on the Associated Press All-Pro First Team and DE Khalil Mack was named Defensive Player of the Year. Del Rio was selected as the recipient of the Maxwell Club's Greasy Neale Professional Coach of the Year Award, becoming the sixth Raiders coach to earn NFL Coach of the Year honors. In addition, he was named the AFC Coach of the Year by Kansas City's Committee of 101.

In 2016, Oakland tied for the NFL lead with a +16 turnover differential and the offensive unit ranked near the top of the league, finishing sixth in the NFL in yards per game (373.3), sixth in rushing yards per game (120.1) and seventh in points per game (26.0). The team committed just 14 turnovers on the year, a mark that ranked fourth fewest in the NFL. The defense strengthened as the season progressed, ranking 11th in the NFL in total yards allowed per game from Week 7 to the end of the year. The team also ranked second in the NFL in takeaways, forcing 30 turnovers on the year.

In his first season with the Raiders in 2015, Del Rio oversaw significant improvements as the Raiders more than doubled the previous year's win total. Oakland moved up 15 spots in the NFL rankings in turnover ratio, finishing 17th in the league (+1) after ranking 32nd in 2014 (-15). The team improved in five major statistical categories on offense alone, making gains in total offense, rushing, passing, points per game and third-down efficiency. On defense, the Raiders improved in rushing defense, points per game allowed and third-down defense. Six Raiders were selected for the Pro Bowl, marking the most since 1991.

As defensive coordinator with the Denver Broncos from 2012-14, Del Rio was part of three-straight AFC West titles and helped lead Denver to an AFC Championship and appearance in Super Bowl XLVIII following the 2013 campaign. It marked his second stint under Head Coach John Fox, as the two also spent the 2002 season together in Carolina. In all, he has coached 28 players to a total of 40 Pro Bowl selections.

In 2014, Del Rio's defensive unit boasted five Pro Bowl selections, ranked third in the NFL in overall defense (305.2 yards per game) and second in the league against the run, allowing 79.8 yards per game. With 25 takeaways and a plus-five turnover ratio, Del Rio's defense was instrumental in leading the Broncos to a third straight 12-win season.

In his second season with the Broncos in 2013, Del Rio's defense helped Denver to a 12-4 record and an appearance in Super Bowl XLVIII. Del Rio also accepted the additional role of interim head coach (Weeks 10-13) while Fox underwent a heart procedure and led the Broncos to a 3-1 record against teams

with a combined record of 29-9 (.763). With Del Rio at the helm, Denver beat previously-undefeated Kansas City twice in addition to San Diego, with the team's only loss coming at New England.

In 2012, Denver's defense finished as the NFL's second-ranked unit (290.8 yards per game), after finishing the previous season ranked 20th in the league. The group also tied for the league lead with 52 sacks and allowed the lowest opponent third-down percentage (30.6 percent), while tying for the largest scoring improvement (6.3 points per game) from the previous season.

Prior to joining the Broncos in 2012, Del Rio spent nine seasons at the helm in Jacksonville. During his head coaching tenure (2003-11) with the Jaguars, the club ranked sixth in the NFL in yards per game allowed (317.3) and eighth in points per game allowed (20.3).

Under Del Rio, the Jaguars made two playoff appearances in 2005 and 2007, highlighted by the club's first postseason win in eight seasons with a 31-29 road victory against the Pittsburgh Steelers in a 2007 AFC Wild Card Game.

In 2009, Del Rio led one of the league's youngest teams, with four rookies in full-time roles as starters, 32 new players on the roster and a total of 16 rookies by season's end. The team was in playoff contention until the final weekend of the regular season, finishing 7-9. Rookies combined to make 71 starts, the most in team history, and the team was penalized a league-low of 70 times, the fewest in franchise history. The Jaguars battled through injuries in 2008 to a 5-11 record despite having just four players start all 16 games and a total of 15 players on injured reserve at the end of the year.

The Jaguars posted an 11-5 record in 2007 to earn a second playoff berth in three years, in addition to claiming the franchise's first playoff win since the 1999 season, while becoming the first team in NFL history to win in Pittsburgh twice in one season. The offense ranked seventh in the league and scored a team-record 411 points. The offense had a team-record seven games with 400-or-more yards, while the defense held opponents to 17 points or less 10 times.

Del Rio led the 2006 Jaguars to a record of 8-8 as the team finished 5-3 against playoff teams and suffered seven losses by seven points or less. Among the highlights was a team-record 2,541 rushing yards and just 30 sacks allowed on offense. The defense registered the highest ranking in team history at second overall.

In 2005, the Jaguars won eight of the last nine regular season games, including four straight on the road, en route to a 12-4 finish and a Wild Card playoff berth. The league's sixth-ranked defense was sixth in points allowed and had 19 interceptions. On offense, the team increased scoring by 100 points over the previous year and had a team-record and NFL-low six interceptions thrown.

In 2004, Del Rio posted the team's first winning record since 1999, leading the Jaguars to a 9-7 mark. In taking over the Jaguars in 2003, Del Rio was the architect of a defense that improved to sixth overall in the NFL and second against the run. The Jaguars' 5-11 record included six losses by seven points or less.

During his lone season as a defensive coordinator with Carolina in 2002, he inherited the NFL's worst defense statistically (371.4 yards per game allowed) and turned it into the league's second-ranked unit (290.4 yards per game allowed). Additionally, the 2002 Panthers squad led the NFL in rushing average against (3.7 avg.) and ranked second in third down efficiency

(32.9 percent) and sacks (52).

As linebackers coach for the Baltimore Ravens from 1999-2001, Del Rio tutored a talented group that included Peter Boulware, Ray Lewis and Jamie Sharper. Baltimore's 2000 team set the NFL 16-game record by allowing only 165 points while recording four shutouts and forcing a league-best 49 turnovers. Lewis was named the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV that season after a playoff run in which the defense surrendered just one touchdown in four games.

Del Rio began his coaching career with the New Orleans Saints under Head Coach Mike Ditka, serving as an assistant strength coach in 1997 before moving on to coach the linebackers in 1998.

A veteran of 11 seasons as an NFL linebacker, he was selected in the third round (68th overall) of the 1985 NFL Draft by New Orleans and went on to make the NFL's All-Rookie Team and earn the Saints' Rookie of the Year award.

Following two seasons in New Orleans (1985-86), he played for Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-91) and Minnesota (1992-95). He led the Vikings in tackles for three consecutive years and was selected to participate in the Pro Bowl in 1994. For his career, he played 160 games in the regular season and totaled 1,078 tackles, 12 sacks and 13 interceptions.

Del Rio was a four-year starter at the University of Southern California, where he earned consensus All-American honors as a senior and was runner-up for the Lombardi Award, given to the nation's best lineman or linebacker. Named co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl, Del Rio recorded 340 career defensive stops, including 58 tackles for a loss. A standout catcher on the USC baseball team, Del Rio was drafted by the Toronto Blue Jays in 1981. He was inducted into the USC Athletic Hall of Fame in May 2015.

Del Rio was a three-sport star in football, baseball and basketball at Hayward (Calif.) High School. He earned a degree in political science from the University of Kansas while playing for the Chiefs.

Born on April 4, 1963, in Castro Valley, Calif., Del Rio and his wife, Linda, have three daughters, Lauren, Hope and Aubrey, and a son, Luke, who also works for Washington as an offensive quality control coach.

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BIOGRAPHY

Scott Turner is entering his first season as the offensive coordinator with Washington after being hired on January 8, 2020. He will be entering his 9th NFL season and has held positions with the Carolina Panthers, Cleveland Browns and Minnesota Vikings during his NFL career.

Turner served as the Carolina Panthers quarterbacks coach from 2018-19, where he was also elevated to interim offensive coordinator for Weeks 14-17 of the 2019 season. In 2019, Turner spent time working with three different quarterbacks throughout the course of the season after Cam Newton went down in Week 2. Carolina was only one of six teams in the NFL to start three different quarterbacks during the 2019 season. Turner helped guide young quarterbacks Kyle Allen and rookie Will Grier and played a key role in installing plays to fit each of their playing styles when he took the reins as interim offensive coordinator in Week 14. Allen completed 303-of-489 passes for 3,027 yards and 17 touchdowns for a passer rating of 80.0. Grier got an opportunity to start late in the season in Weeks 15 and 16. In his first career start on the road against the Colts, Grier completed 27-of-44 passes for 224 yards, completing 61.4 percent of his attempts.

In his first season as quarterbacks coach in 2018, Turner helped quarterback Cam Newton post a 67.9 completion percentage, the highest of any player in franchise history, despite playing through injury and missing the final two games. Newton set a franchise record by throwing for at least two touchdown passes in 11 consecutive games, while his 94.2 passer rating was third-best in franchise history. Newton also set a Panthers record for most consecutive passes completed with 16 straight over a two game stretch.

In 2018, the Panthers finished 10th in the NFL in net yards (373.3), the second-highest season average in franchise history. Carolina finished the season with a franchise record for most completions in a single season with 378 and set a franchise record for most passing first downs in a single season with 212. In the final two games of 2018, Turner was tasked with preparing backup quarterbacks Taylor Heinicke and Kyle Allen to play in Newton's absence. In Week 16 at Atlanta, Allen and Heinicke combined to set a franchise record for most completions in a single game with 37 (33 - Heinicke; 4 - Allen). In Week 17, Allen joined Matt Moore and Chris Weinke as the only Panthers rookies to win their first starts.

Prior to re-joining Carolina, Turner served as the University of Michigan's senior offensive analyst in 2017. The Wolverines went 8-5 and advanced to the Outback Bowl, while the offense featured three running backs who averaged 5.0 yards per carry or better and the team rushed for more than 2,000 yards for the third consecutive season.

Before his time with Michigan, Turner worked as the Minnesota Vikings quarterbacks coach from 2014-16. In 2016, Turner helped quarterback Sam Bradford set a then-NFL record in completion percentage (71.6) and guided him to Vikings records in single-season completions (395), interception percentage (0.9; five in 552 attempts) and single-season completion percentage (71.6). Bradford notched the fourth-highest passer rating in Vikings history with a career-best 99.3.

In 2014 and 2015, Turner worked with first-round draft choice Teddy Bridgewater. In 2015, Bridgewater was selected to his first Pro Bowl in his second season in the NFL and his first as a full-time starter. Bridgewater, who led the team to its first NFC North championship since 2009, bumped his passer rating up from 85.2 to 88.7 and threw three fewer interceptions while playing

in three more contests than his initial season. He finished with 3,231 yards passing and 14 passing touchdowns, while rushing for three touchdowns. With 17 combined wins from 2014 and 2015, Bridgewater tied Brett Favre and Warren Moon for the most wins in team history among quarterbacks in their first two seasons with the franchise.

In 2014, Turner helped Bridgewater to the best season for a rookie quarterback in Vikings history, setting virtually every franchise rookie passing record and producing the third-best completion percentage (64.6) and the seventh-highest passer rating (85.2) in NFL history for a rookie. In Bridgewater's first career start vs. Atlanta in Week 4, the rookie threw for a season-best 317 yards and helped the offense pile up 558 net yards, the fourth-most in team history, in a 41-28 win.

In 2013, Turner coached wide receivers for the Cleveland Browns, helping Josh Gordon to the best receiving season in Browns history. Despite appearing in just 14 games, he became the first player in Browns history to lead the NFL in receiving yards (1,646) and became the first player in NFL history with back-to-back 200-yard receiving games.

Turner entered NFL coaching with two seasons as offensive quality control coach for the Panthers in 2011 and 2012. The Panthers recorded two of the top four seasons in franchise history in terms of net yards, setting the all-time mark with 389.8 yards per game in 2011 and 360.7 in 2012. Newton was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year in 2011. His 14 rushing touchdowns broke the NFL record for rushing touchdowns by a quarterback and were just one shy of the NFL record of rushing touchdowns by a rookie.

Prior to Turner's first stint in Carolina, he spent three seasons at the University of Pittsburgh, two as an offensive assistant and the last as wide receivers coach. Turner made his coaching debut in 2005 as a graduate assistant at Oregon State before serving as the offensive coordinator at South County (Va.) Secondary School from 2006-07.

A three-year letterman at Nevada-Las Vegas from 2002-04, Turner graduated with a degree in psychology. He served as a reserve quarterback for the Rebels as a junior and senior and played on special teams as a sophomore after being redshirted as a freshman. He earned his college degree in psychology from UNLV in 2006.

Turner is the son of former NFL Coach Norv Turner. The two previously coached together in Carolina, Minnesota and Cleveland. Turner graduated from Oakton High School in Vienna, Va. when his father was the Head Coach of the Redskins. He and his wife, Robyn, have two children - a son, Harry (6) and a daughter, Rose (4).

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BIOGRAPHY

Nate Kaczor (pronounced Kat-sir) enters his second season as special teams coordinator with Washington in 2020. He will be entering his 13th NFL season and has held positions with the Jacksonville Jaguars, Tennessee Titans and Tampa Bay Buccaneers during his NFL career.

In 2019, Kaczor helped guide punter Tress Way to his first Pro Bowl selection. Way was also named to the Associated Press All-Pro Second Team. Way finished the season No. 2 in net average (44.1) and No. 2 in punt yardage (3,919) and No. 7 in punts inside the 20 yard line (30). Under Kaczor's guidance, Washington ranked No. 4 in the league in kickoff return average (25.2) and No. 5 in kickoff return yardage (833) despite fielding one of the league's youngest rosters.

Under Kaczor's guidance, Tress Way became the first Washington punter since Matt Turk in 1997 to be named to the Pro Bowl. Steven Sims Jr. (NFC Special Teams Player of the Week in Week 12) and Tress Way (NFC Special Teams Player of the Week in Week 13) were also the first Redskins in the history of the franchise to receive the honor of NFC Special Teams Player of the Week in consecutive weeks.

During Kaczor's three seasons with Tampa Bay, the Buccaneers were one of the top punt coverage units in the NFL, allowing only 6.6 yards per return, the fourth-lowest mark in the league during that span.

In 2018, Tampa Bay allowed only 21.0 yards per kickoff return, which was the sixth-lowest in the NFL despite allowing 30-plus total kickoff returns.

In 2017, the Buccaneers had three blocked kicks (one blocked field goals and two blocked extra points), tied for the third-most in the NFL. Tampa Bay led the league in special teams takeaways, with four (three fumble recoveries on punt coverage, one on kickoff coverage). All four of Tampa Bay's special teams takeaways helped lead to touchdowns – two were returned for touchdowns, while the other two set up the offense with a short field. The Buccaneers' punt return unit also averaged 9.6 yards per return, the sixth-highest mark in the NFL.

Punter Bryan Anger was a standout during Kaczor's tenure with the Buccaneers. In his first year with the team, Anger set Buccaneers records for both punts inside the 20 (37) and net punting average (42.7), with both of those ranking in the top five in the NFL in 2016. In the three seasons that Anger spent under Kaczor's tutelage, Anger ranked top 15 in the league in punts inside the 20 and net average while only recording 14 touchbacks.

Kaczor came to Tampa Bay having spent the previous four seasons with the Tennessee Titans, the final three as the teams' special teams coordinator (2013-15) after being hired as the assistant offensive line coach in his first season (2012). In 2015, the Titans tied for the NFL lead in special teams takeaways, while in 2013 Kaczor's unit ranked third in the league in opponent punt return average and eighth in kickoff return average.

In three seasons under Kaczor, Titans punter Brett Kern tied for the third-most punts inside the 20 (94) in the NFL. In 2015, despite punting 88 times, Kern saw only one touchback on the year. In 2014, Kern posted a net average of 40.8, a career best and a Titans franchise record. Kaczor also worked with kicker

Ryan Succop, who set a career high in field goal percentage in 2015 (87.5), surpassing the career best he had established the season before.

Kaczor entered the NFL as an assistant special teams coach with the Jacksonville Jaguars, working there from 2008-11. During those four years, Jacksonville had one of the league's top special teams coverage units, allowing the lowest punt return average in the NFL (6.5 avg.) and the eighth-lowest kickoff return average (21.8 avg.). In each of Kaczor's final two seasons, Montell Owens earned Pro Bowl recognition as a special teams player.

Prior to joining the NFL, Kaczor spent 17 years coaching in college, the final two working as co-offensive coordinator (2007) and tight ends coach (2006) at Louisiana-Monroe. In his only season as co-offensive coordinator, the team ranked second in the Sun Belt Conference in rushing offense and averaged its most points scored since 1993. Before his time at Louisiana-Monroe, Kaczor spent two seasons (2004-05) as the co-offensive coordinator/tight ends coach at Idaho and four seasons as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Nebraska-Kearney (2000-03). Kaczor began his coaching career as an offensive assistant at his alma mater, Utah State, working as an offensive assistant for nine seasons (1991-99), helping the team win three conference championships.

A center at Utah State, Kaczor was a team captain, who earned all-conference honors in 1989. A native of Scott City, Kansas, he and his wife, Angie, have two children, Kaylee and Micah.

Luke Del Rio is entering his first season coaching in the NFL and his first as Washington's offensive quality control coach in 2020. He previously coached tight ends and quarterbacks at Santa Margarita Catholic High School.

A former collegiate quarterback, Del Rio began his college career at the University of Alabama where he was the backup QB as a true freshman to three-time national champion quarterback AJ McCarron. He then moved to Oregon State where he served as the backup to current Minnesota Vikings quarterback Sean Mannion. Del Rio played his final three years at the University of Florida where he would go on to be 7-1 as a starter in the SEC.

Del Rio's collegiate career highlights include a win over Georgia, a 320-yard 4-touchdown performance against Kentucky, and then in his senior year, came off the bench to lead a 14-point comeback against Kentucky to extend Florida's winning streak over the rival Wildcats to 31 games. Del Rio also served as a team captain for the Gators in 2016 and served on the leadership committee.

Del Rio was a state champion quarterback at Valor Christian High School. In addition to his state championship at Valor Christian High School, Del Rio was an Elite 11 quarterback, first team all-state and team captain for the Eagles.

Del Rio has played under the tutelage of Nick Saban (Alabama), Mike Riley (Oregon State) and Jim McElwain (Florida). Del Rio, a native of Jacksonville, Fla., graduated from the University of Florida in 2016 with a Bachelor's degree and then earned his Master's degree in 2018, also from the University of Florida, in Business. He is the son of Washington defensive coordinator Jack Del Rio.

In 2008, Englehart served as director of strength and conditioning at Xcel Sports Performance in Louisiana. Before that, he was head strength and conditioning coach in 2007 at HS2 Athletic Performance in Mandeville, La., and at the University of New Orleans in 2006.

Englehart holds a Master's degree in human movement with

a concentration in corrective exercise from A.T. Still University. He also holds a bachelor's degree in kinesiology with a concentration in exercise science from Southeastern Louisiana University. He is a certified strength and conditioning specialist with the National Strength and Condition Association and is a Performance Enhancement Specialist and Corrective Exercise Specialist with the National Academy of Sports Medicine (NASM). Englehart also holds certifications with USA Weightlifting and USA Track and Field, Functional Movement Screen and TRX Suspension Training certifications as well as a Fitness Nutrition Specialist certification from the NASM and a 3DMAPS (3D Movement Analysis and Performance System) certification from Gray Institute.

Englehart and his wife, Lyndsey, have two daughters, Blair and Elise.

Chris enters his seventh season coaching in the NFL and his first as Washington's defensive backs coach in 2020. Harris brings a combined 14 seasons of NFL experience to the role, including six as a coach and eight as a player.

Harris joins Washington after serving as the Los Angeles Chargers assistant secondary coach from 2016-19. In 2019, the Chargers defense ranked sixth in the league by yards, only surrendering 313.1 yards per game. The group also ranked fifth in the NFL in passing yards per game, only allowing 200.3 yards per game.

In 2018, Harris helped develop first round pick Derwin James into an All-Pro selection and a Pro Bowl starter at safety in his first season. James became the first rookie in Chargers history to record 100 or more tackles. On top of the rise of the rookie, second year defensive back Desmond King earned second-team All-Pro accolades on the strength of three interceptions, including a pick-six. Six of the top seven tacklers for the Chargers in 2018 came from the defensive backfield.

In 2017, the Chargers ranked fourth in the league with 18 total interceptions with 14 coming from defensive backs. The team did not allow a 100-yard receiver until Week 17. Individually, cornerback Casey Hayward was named to his second straight Pro Bowl after ranking tied for second in the NFL with 22 passes defended. He also added four interceptions.

Harris' first season in 2016 was a huge success as the Chargers led the NFL with 18 interceptions as a team, while Hayward earned Pro Bowl honors for the first time in his career after leading the NFL with a career-high seven picks. The Chargers had 11 different players record at least one interception in 2016, most in the NFL and the most in team annals since 2004.

Harris began his coaching career as a defensive quality control coach for the Bears, working primarily with the team's safeties. He coached in Chicago from 2013-14.

An eight-year NFL pro, Harris was a sixth-round pick of the Chicago Bears (181st overall) in 2005. He played four seasons with the Bears over two separate stints (2005-06 and 2010-11). Harris was named second team All-Pro by The Associated Press in 2010 and was named one of the Bears' Brian Piccolo Award winners as a rookie in 2005. Besides Chicago, Harris also played for the Carolina Panthers (2007-09), Detroit Lions (2011) and Jacksonville Jaguars (2012), totaling 422 tackles, 16 interceptions, 13 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries and 37 passes defended. He appeared in 101 career games and made 88 starts. In 2007, Harris racked up a franchise-record eight forced fumbles for the Panthers.

Harris started seven playoff games during his career, including Super Bowl XLI for the Bears. During that game, he famously intercepted Colts quarterback Peyton Manning. Harris' career postseason statistics include 48 tackles, an interception and two forced fumbles.

Harris is a native of Little Rock, Ark., and played collegiately at Louisiana-Monroe (2001-04) where he finished his career ranked fourth in school history in career tackles (383) and third in interceptions (14), including a school record-tying seven in 2004.

Harris and his wife, Kenetria, have three sons – Jayce, Jaxon and Jett – and a daughter, Skylar.

Pete Hoener enters his 22nd season of coaching in the NFL and his first season as Washington's tight ends coach in 2020.

He has spent the past nine years as tight ends coach with the Carolina Panthers (2011-19) under current Washington head coach Ron Rivera. Prior to coaching at Carolina, he held coaching roles with the San Francisco 49ers (2005-10), Chicago Bears (2004) and Arizona Cardinals (2002-03).

Hoener spent nine seasons as Carolina's tight ends coach, overseeing one of the most prominent positions in the offense. Under Hoener's tutelage, Greg Olsen became one of the top tight ends in the NFL. Hoener helped Olsen obtain the top five single-season receptions totals and the top four single-season receiving yards totals by a tight end in Panthers franchise history. Olsen's 10 100-yard receiving games are the most by a tight end in Carolina history.

Through the 2019 season, Hoener helped coach Olsen to top-10 ranks in all-time among NFL tight ends in receptions (718) and receiving yards (8,444) and ninth in receiving touchdowns (59).

In 2016, Olsen became the first tight end in NFL history to have three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons after recording 1,073 yards on a team-high 80 catches. He was named to his third consecutive Pro Bowl and earned second-team All-Pro honors for the second consecutive year.

In 2015, Hoener's tight ends helped Carolina win the NFC Championship and set team records with an NFL-leading 500 points and 59 touchdowns. Olsen garnered Pro Bowl recognition after setting a team record for the most receiving yards in a season by a tight end with a career-high 1,104 yards. He ranked second among NFL tight ends in receiving yards and receiving average (14.3 yards per catch) while leading the Panthers in receptions (75) and receiving yards (1,104) and ranking second in receiving touchdowns with seven.

During the 2014 season, Olsen was selected to his first Pro Bowl after ranking third among NFL tight ends with a team-leading 84 receptions and second with 1,008 receiving yards while scoring six receiving touchdowns. In the process, he set team records for the most catches and 100-yard receiving games (four) in a season by a tight end.

In 2013, Olsen paced the Panthers with 73 receptions, 816 receiving yards and six receiving touchdowns – the first time since Wesley Walls in 1997 that a wide receiver did not lead Carolina in receptions and receiving yards. In 2012, Olsen set a then-franchise record for the most receiving yards in a season by a tight end with 843, surpassing the previous record set by Walls in 1999, on 69 catches.

In Hoener's first season with the Panthers in 2011, the tight ends combined to catch 85 passes for 1,008 yards and nine touchdowns and contributed to a running game that averaged a team-record 5.41 yards per carry and featured three 700-yard rushers.

Not limited to being just receivers, Hoener's group has also helped open running lanes for Carolina to rank among the NFL leaders in rushing during his tenure, finishing third in 2011, ninth in 2012, 11th in 2013, seventh in 2014, second in 2015, 10th in

2016 and fourth in both 2017 and 2018.

With the 49ers, Hoener helped develop tight ends Vernon Davis and Delanie Walker, both of whom were drafted by the 49ers in 2006.

In 2010, Davis tallied 56 receptions, 914 receiving yards and seven touchdowns to become the first tight end in franchise history to lead the team in receptions, receiving yards and touchdowns in consecutive seasons. The previous year, Davis compiled 78 receptions for 965 yards and 13 touchdowns, an effort that resulted in being selected a Pro Bowl starter. Davis' 13 touchdowns tied the NFL single-season record at the time for the most touchdowns by a tight end and equaled the most touchdown catches in the NFL, making him the first tight end in the Super Bowl era to lead or tie for the league lead in receiving touchdowns.

Hoener joined the 49ers from the Chicago Bears, where he oversaw the offensive line in 2004. Under Hoener's guidance, center Olin Kreutz earned Pro Bowl honors. Prior to the Bears, Hoener spent three seasons with the Arizona Cardinals, serving as the offensive line coach in 2003 and tight ends coach from 2001-02. It marked his second stint with the Cardinals after entering the NFL coaching ranks as the team's tight ends coach from 1985-86 when the franchise was in St. Louis. While with the Cardinals, Hoener worked with tight end Freddie Jones, who finished first on the team with 44 catches for 358 yards in 2002. Jones became the first tight end to lead the team in receiving since Jackie Smith in 1973, and his 44 receptions were the most by a Cardinals tight end since 1968.

Along with his NFL experience, Hoener coached 24 years on the college level as an offensive line coach and offensive coordinator. Beginning as a graduate assistant at Missouri in 1975, he then coached the offensive line at each of his next seven stops: Illinois State (1977), Indiana State (1978-84), Illinois (1987-88), Purdue (1989-91), Texas Christian (1992-97) and Iowa State (1998-99). In addition to his role as offensive line coach, Hoener also held the responsibilities of offensive coordinator at Indiana State, Texas Christian and Iowa State. He handled the running backs at Texas A&M in 2000 before returning to the NFL in 2001.

Hoener played tight end and defensive end at Bradley, where he earned a degree in physical education. Hoener and his wife, Marianne, have three daughters: Jennifer, Kathleen and Lisa. Last name is pronounced HAY-NER.

Jim Hostler enters his 21st season of coaching in the NFL and his first season as Washington's wide receivers coach in 2020.

Hostler brings 20 years of NFL coaching experience to the Redskins including coaching roles with the Carolina Panthers (2019), Green Bay Packers (2018), Indianapolis Colts (2015-17), Buffalo Bills (2014), Baltimore Ravens (2008-13), San Francisco 49ers (2005-07), New York Jets (2003-04), New Orleans Saints (2001-02) and Kansas City Chiefs (2000).

In his only season with Carolina in 2019, Hostler helped lead the Panthers receiving group to top-10 finishes in receiving yards (10th, 4,134), receptions (7th, 382), receptions per game (7th, 23.9) and receiving yards per game (10th, 258.4).

In 2018, Hostler served as the passing game coordinator for the Green Bay Packers. The Packers ranked sixth in the NFL with

4,629 receiving yards and seventh with 392 receptions. Green Bay's Davante Adams was second in the NFL with 13 receiving touchdowns and seventh with 1,386 receiving yards.

Prior to Green Bay, Hostler spent three seasons with the Indianapolis Colts, first as wide receivers coach (2015) and then as tight ends coach (2016-17). During his time in Indianapolis, Hostler tutored tight end Jack Doyle, who caught 139 passes for 1,274 yards and nine touchdowns between 2016-17. His 139 receptions over those two seasons were tied for fourth in the league among tight ends, while his 80 receptions in 2017 were the second most by a tight end in Colts history.

In 2015, Hostler coached the wide receivers for Indianapolis, helping guide T.Y. Hilton to his second career Pro Bowl selection as he became just the third player in team history to register three straight 1,000-yard receiving seasons.

Hostler spent the 2014 campaign with the Buffalo Bills, serving as a senior offensive assistant. During that season, wide receiver Sammy Watkins set team single-season rookie records for receptions (65) and receiving yards (982), and the Bills had three different players (Watkins, Robert Woods, Fred Jackson) post at least 50 catches each for the first time in franchise history.

Prior to Buffalo, Hostler spent six seasons (2008-13) with the Baltimore Ravens as wide receivers coach, where he oversaw a receiving corps that played an integral role in the team's Super Bowl XLVII win. During the 2012 campaign, Baltimore's wideouts helped contribute to the team's 3,996 receiving yards, the second most in a season in franchise history to that point.

Hostler spent the 2005-07 seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, serving as quarterbacks coach for his first two years and offensive coordinator for his final season. Prior to San Francisco, Hostler spent two seasons with the New York Jets, coaching quarterbacks in 2003 and wide receivers in 2004.

Hostler spent the previous two seasons (2001-02) with the New Orleans Saints, serving as offensive assistant/quality control in his first season and as the assistant wide receivers coach in his second season. Hostler began his NFL coaching career with the Kansas City Chiefs in 2000 as offensive assistant/quality control.

Before joining the NFL coaching ranks, Hostler spent 10 seasons coaching at the college level, including nine seasons (1990-92, 1994-99) in a variety of roles at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. In between stints at IUP, Hostler spent the 1993 season as offensive coordinator at Juniata College.

A four-year letterman and two-time Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference all-conference selection, Hostler was a standout cornerback at IUP from 1986-89. During his collegiate playing career, he helped the Indians capture two conference titles and make three trips to the PSAC Division II playoffs. He earned a bachelor's degree in criminology from IUP in 1989. Born in Pittsburgh, Pa., Hostler attended Bethel Park High School in Pittsburgh. He and his wife, Jen, have three sons, Clint, Grant and Cooper, and a daughter, Attie.

Jacobs is entering his second NFL season and his first as Washington's assistant special teams coach in 2020 after joining the Carolina Panthers in 2019. A former NFL linebacker, Jacobs spent eight seasons as a key contributor on all four phases of special teams, recording 31 special teams tackles and eight tackles on defense in 73 career games played.

Jacobs led or tied for the team high in special teams tackles in two of his seasons (2014 and 2018) with Carolina and helped the Panthers win the NFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl 50 during the 2015 season.

In 2017, Jacobs played a significant role on a coverage unit that finished eighth in opponents' punt return average, allowing just 5.9 yards per return. In 2016, Jacobs was part of a kickoff

coverage unit that allowed a league-low 18.1 yards per kickoff return and finished fifth in the NFL with an opponents' average drive start of the 23.7-yard line.

Jacobs entered the NFL in 2011 with the Cleveland Browns as an undrafted free agent out of Fresno State.

Randy Jordan enters his seventh season as Washington's running back coach in 2020 after initially being named to the position on January 26, 2014.

A nine-year NFL veteran as a player from 1993-2002, Jordan appeared in 122 career games with the Raiders and Jaguars. He was the recipient of the NFL Unsung Hero Award and the Ed Block Courage Award in 2001 and served as special teams captain for the Raiders' AFC Championship team in 2002.

In 2019, Jordan directed a group of running backs that included veterans Adrian Peterson and Chris Thompson. Peterson finished this season with 1,040 scrimmage yards, his 10th season with 1,000+ yards from scrimmage. He is tied for seventh all-time in NFL history for most seasons with 1,000 yards from scrimmage [Curtis Martin, Walter Payton, Barry Sanders, Randy Moss].

Peterson rushed for five touchdowns last season and now has 111 career rushing touchdowns, giving him sole possession of fourth place in NFL history. He also had 211 carries, becoming the sixth player in NFL history to tally 200 or more carries at 34 years or older.

Thompson paced the Washington backs with 42 receptions for 378 yards including two seven-reception games in weeks one and 14. His 42 receptions moved him into third place in Washington franchise history with 212 total receptions.

In 2018, Jordan guided a group that ranked fourth in the NFL in rushing on second down and was a key factor in the offense finishing seventh in the league in 3rd-and-1 conversion rate. He was also instrumental in running back Adrian Peterson having his best season since 2015. Peterson finished the season ranked fifth in rushing attempts (251), eighth in rushing yards (1,042) and third in fourth quarter rushing yards (332). Peterson also had the longest touchdown run of his career with a 90 yarder against the Philadelphia Eagles on Monday Night Football in Week 13.

In 2017, Jordan oversaw a group that was ravaged by injury, as his coaching acumen was called upon to prepare eight different running backs for game action, tied with Arizona for the most in the NFL. The group was particularly efficient as receivers out of the backfield, accounting for 885 receiving yards, the fourth-most in the NFL (Saints, 1,254; Patriots, 957; Browns, 923) and the most by a group of Redskins running backs since 2000 (1,127).

Jordan also presided over a breakout 2017 campaign for Chris Thompson, who led the Redskins in both rushing and receiving yards prior to suffering a season-ending injury in Week 11. Thompson recorded only the sixth season in franchise history with at least 275 rushing yards and at least 500 receiving yards and was one of six NFL players to accomplish the feat in 2017 (Todd Gurley II, Le'Veon Bell, Alvin Kamara, Christian McCaffrey and Duke Johnson Jr.), though Thompson accomplished the feat in 10 games while the other five players all appeared in at least 15 contests.

Jordan's hard-nosed approach to the position was evident in the team's running backs in 2016, a year in which the Redskins gained 1,058 of their rushing yards after contact, second-most in the NFL. Jordan oversaw the development of rookie free agent Rob Kelley, who ascended to the starting role mid-year and finished the season as the team's leader in rushing attempts (168), rushing yards (704) and rushing touchdowns (six). Jordan also helped Chris Thompson become the first member of Washington

to record at least 325 rushing yards and 325 receiving yards in a single season since Roy Helu Jr. in 2011, all while serving as a critical component in pass protection to the team's record-setting aerial attack despite standing 5-foot-8 and 195 pounds.

In 2015, Jordan oversaw a rotating stable of backs that included workhorse Alfred Morris (202 carries for 751 yards with one touchdown), third-round pick Matt Jones (144 carries for 490 yards with three touchdowns) and Thompson (gained 6.2 yards per carry on 35 attempts). The group also contributed heavily in pass protection, helping the Redskins decrease their sack total from 58 in 2014 to 27 in 2015.

In his first season in Washington in 2014, Jordan helped Morris earn his second consecutive Pro Bowl berth, making Morris the first Redskins running back selected to consecutive Pro Bowls since Stephen Davis in 1999-2000. Morris joined Davis as the only backs in team history to record three consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons. Jordan's work was also evident in the play of fullback Darrel Young, who matched his career highs in rushing touchdowns (three) and receiving touchdowns (two) en route to a career-high five total touchdowns in 2014.

Before joining Washington, Jordan spent two years as the running backs coach at his alma mater, North Carolina. In his first season with UNC in 2012, Jordan's Tar Heels averaged 193.8 rushing yards per game, third-most in the Atlantic Coast Conference and the program's highest average since 1994. That season, he tutored tailback Giovani Bernard to one of the best seasons in UNC history, helping Bernard average 122.8 rushing yards per game, most in the ACC and 11th in the nation.

Jordan coached running backs at Texas A&M for four seasons from 2008-11. In 2011, the Aggies averaged 199.1 rushing yards per game, fourth-most in the Big 12 Conference, and had two different backs – Cyrus Gray and Christine Michael – finish among the top five in the conference in rushing yards per game.

Jordan left for AggieLand from the University of Nebraska where he served as the running backs coach for the Cornhuskers from 2004-07. Jordan helped shape the I-back position, coaching two 1,000-yard rushers in Cody Ross in 2004 and Marlon Lucky in 2007. He oversaw a committee of backs in 2006 that produced nearly 2,400 rushing yards and 26 rushing touchdowns, as an improved effort on the ground helped NU move from 107th in 2005 to 23rd nationally in rushing offense in 2006.

Jordan began his coaching career with the Oakland Raiders as a special teams assistant midway through the 2003 season. He played nine years in the NFL as a running back, playing in 122 career games from 1993 through 2002. He began his career with the Los Angeles Raiders before joining the expansion Jacksonville Jaguars in 1995 and playing three seasons. Jordan holds the distinction of scoring the very first touchdown for the Jacksonville club, a 71-yard reception against Cincinnati in 1995.

After the 1997 season, Jordan rejoined the Raiders' organization where he played five more seasons. In 1998, Jordan rushed for 159 yards for the Raiders. He had a career-high 213 yards rushing and three touchdowns in helping the Raiders reach the AFC Championship Game in 2000. He also caught 27 passes for 299 yards and a touchdown that same season.

Jordan finished his career with 574 yards rushing and seven touchdowns, while making 58 catches for 596 yards and two touchdowns. Jordan was also a standout special teams player. He finished his career with 801 yards on 38 career kick returns, including a season best of 553 yards on 26 returns for Jacksonville in 1996. He also recorded 64 career tackles on special teams.

Jordan played for the University of North Carolina under coach Mack Brown from 1989-92. He earned three letters for the Tar Heels rushing for 1,134 yards and nine touchdowns in his career, including 618 yards and seven touchdowns in 1991.

Jordan earned his bachelor's degree in speech communication from North Carolina in 1993. He was born in Manson, N.C. Jordan and his wife, Romonda, have a daughter, Raven – a volleyball player at the University at Buffalo – and two sons, Jalen and Justin.

Paul Kelly enters his 22nd NFL season and his 11th as Washington's Director of Football Operations in 2020. Kelly, who was named to the post on February 16, 2010, works directly with Head Coach Ron Rivera and is responsible for coordinating the team's daily operations, including all travel and accommodations for home and away games, managing all football department budgets, coordinating training camp logistics and managing the year-round football schedule.

Additionally, Kelly serves as the coaching staff's liaison on all matters relating to the athletic training, equipment, video and the public relations departments, serving as the point of communication in administering every Washington practice and team function, including all mini-camps, OTA days and training camp.

Kelly previously spent five seasons with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2004-08) and six seasons with the Oakland Raiders (1998-2003). He spent the 2009 season assisting the broadcast team of ESPN's Monday Night Football.

In his five seasons with the Buccaneers, Kelly worked directly with Head Coach Jon Gruden in organizing football operations for the club and directed many of the day-to-day operations of the team. During Kelly's five seasons as a member of the Buccaneers' staff, the Buccaneers captured NFC South titles in 2005 and 2007.

Kelly spent six seasons (1998-2003) as an assistant on the Oakland Raiders coaching staff, which included three consecutive Division Championships (2000, 2001 & 2002). In 2002, he helped Head Coach Bill Callahan guide Oakland to its first Super Bowl appearance in 19 years as the Raiders represented the AFC in Super Bowl XXXVII.

Kelly graduated with a bachelor's degree in business administration with an emphasis in new ventures and small business management from California State University Hayward in 1990. Prior to joining the Raiders, he owned and managed his own San Francisco Bay Area-based businesses.

Kelly and his wife, Catherine, have three children. His oldest son, Colin, is a lieutenant in the United States Army. His daughter, Lauren, is a student and women's soccer player at William & Mary. His youngest son, Hunter, is a student at George Mason and a batboy for the Washington Nationals.

Jennifer King enters her first full season coaching in the NFL and her first as Washington's full-year coaching intern in 2020. In her role, King will work with the offensive staff throughout the course of the offseason, training camp and regular season and will specifically assist Randy Jordan with the running backs.

King comes to Washington having coached in the National Football League, the Alliance of American Football and in the

college ranks.

King was most recently an offensive assistant with Dartmouth College. She primarily worked with the wide receivers and created defensive scouting reports and secondary specific scouting reports for the wide receivers. Dartmouth finished the 2019 season 9-1 and captured the Ivy League Championship. The team averaged 33.3 points per game and averaged 382.4 yards per game.

King interned for the Carolina Panthers during the offseason in 2018 and 2019. In 2018, she was an intern wide receivers coach and assisted Lance Taylor with on-field development drills and in position meetings. She assisted with the creation of scouting scheme cards for the opposing defense and charted practice and in-game player participation and defensive schemes. In 2019, she returned to the Panthers in the role of intern running backs coach and worked with the running backs in organized team activities, mandatory mini camp and training camp. She worked one-on-one with rookies on playbook proficiencies and individual skill development along with analyzing drill efficiency and drill concepts. She worked with the Panthers running backs, including Pro Bowl running back Christian McCaffrey.

In between her two internships with the Panthers, King was an assistant wide receiver coach and special teams assistant for the Arizona Hotshots of the Alliance of American Football. The Hotshots were 5-3 and tied for first place in the AAF Western Conference before the league disbanded. At the time of the league being dissolved, the Hotshots ranked No. 2 in yards per game (343.9) and points per game (23.2).

King has participated in NFL coaching clinics from 2015-18 and also took part in the NFL Women's Career in Football Forum in January of 2018. The forum was a highly selective two-day event which connected qualified female candidates for positions in football as coaches, officials, scouts and athletic trainers.

King also has experience as a player. She was a seven-time All American quarterback and wide receiver for the Carolina Phoenix women's tackle football team from 2006-17. In 2018 she played wide receiver and defensive back for the New York Sharks women's tackle football team and captured the 2018 WFA National Championship. Most recently, King played wide receiver and safety in the District for the D.C. Divas women's tackle football team in 2019.

King also has experience coaching women's basketball. She was the Head Coach of Johnson & Wales University Charlotte from 2016-18. During King's tenure the team had an 37-10 record and they captured the USCAA Division II National Championship in 2018. She was named the USCAA Division II National Coach of the Year in 2018. King also was an assistant coach on the Greensboro College women's basketball staff from 2006-16. During King's 10 years with the team, they went 136-54, won five conference titles and appeared in the NCAA tournament five times.

King holds a masters of science in sports administration from Liberty University and holds a bachelor of science in sports management from Guilford College. She was a member of the Guilford College women's basketball and softball team's from 2002-06.

John Matsko enters his 29th season coaching in the NFL and his first as Washington's offensive line coach in 2020.

Matsko brings nearly three decades of NFL coaching experience, two Super Bowl appearances and a Super Bowl Championship to Washington. Matsko's career includes coaching roles with the Carolina Panthers (2011-19), Baltimore Ravens (2008-11), Kansas City Chiefs (2006-07), St. Louis Rams (1999-05), New York Giants (1997-98), New Orleans Saints (1994-96) and Phoenix Cardinals (1992-93).

Matsko, who was promoted from offensive line coach to running game coordinator by the Panthers in 2016, spent all nine seasons of his Panthers career under current Washington head coach Ron Rivera. A pivotal part of the Panthers run game, Matsko led Carolina to 30 consecutive regular season games with at least 100 rushing yards from Week 6 of 2014 to Week 3 of 2016, the longest streak in the NFL since Pittsburgh tallied 43 from 1974-77. Four of the top six seasons in rushing average in franchise history have come in the last eight years under Matsko. He also helped lead the Panthers offensive line to an NFC Championship and a trip to Super Bowl 50.

Last season, Carolina's running game had top-six finishes in average yards per carry (6th, 4.71) and rushing touchdowns (7-4th, 20). Running back Christian McCaffrey tallied his second-consecutive season with at least 1,000 rushing yards. In 2018, Carolina topped the NFL in rushing yards per attempt with a 5.1-yard average, while finishing fourth in total rushing yards (2,136). In Week 3, Matsko's line cleared running lanes for McCaffrey to record 184 rushing yards, the fourth-highest rushing output in Panthers history. Left guard Trai Turner earned Pro Bowl honors for the fourth consecutive season.

The Panthers ranked fourth in the NFL in rushing in 2017, averaging 131.4 rushing yards per game. Led by quarterback Cam Newton who rushed for a career-best 754 rushing yards, along with Jonathan Stewart (680 yards) and McCaffrey (435), the Panthers were the only team in the NFL with three players rushing for more than 400 yards. Left guard Andrew Norwell earned AP All-Pro First Team honors, while right tackle Daryl Williams earned Second Team honors. Turner was named to the Pro Bowl for the third consecutive season.

Under Matsko's guidance in 2015, the offensive line played a prominent role for the NFL's top-scoring offense and sec-

ond-best rushing offense, helping the Panthers win the NFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl 50. Ryan Kalil was named to the Pro Bowl for the fifth time and added All-Pro recognition, and Turner earned his first career Pro Bowl selection. From 2011-2014, Matsko stabilized a line that won two NFC South Championships.

From 2008-10, Matsko helped the Baltimore Ravens rank in the top five in the NFL in rushing twice. Prior to joining Baltimore, Matsko served as offensive line coach of the Kansas City Chiefs from 2006-07. In 2006, the offensive line helped the Chiefs rank ninth in the NFL in rushing and compile a team-record 11 100-yard rushing games. Under Matsko's guidance, guards Will Shields and Brian Waters earned Pro Bowl recognition.

From 1999-2005, Matsko served as the offensive line coach for the St. Louis Rams. The Rams led the league in total offense for three consecutive years from 1999-2001, including a record 5,232 yards in 2000, and won Super Bowl XXXIV. He played an instrumental role in the development of two Pro Bowlers - tackle Orlando Pace and guard Adam Timmerman.

Matsko began his NFL coaching career as offensive line coach of the Phoenix Cardinals in 1992 and served in that capacity for two seasons. In 1993, the line opened holes for the Cardinals to have their first 1,000-yard rusher since 1985. He then moved to New Orleans in 1994 and coached three seasons with the Saints. Under Matsko's tutelage, tackle Willie Roaf made three Pro Bowls, and the Saints rated third in the league for fewest sacks allowed in 1996. Following his stint with New Orleans, Matsko assumed the same role from 1997-98 with the New York Giants, where they improved both their pass protection and run blocking. The Giants allowed 24 fewer sacks and jumped from 19th to seventh in the NFL in rushing in 1997 compared to 1996.

Prior to joining the NFL, Matsko spent 17 years on the college level. He worked as a graduate assistant at Miami (Ohio) from 1974-75 and returned as offensive line coach in 1977 after being the head coach at Danbury High School in Lakeside-Marblehead, Ohio, in 1976. Matsko served as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach at North Carolina from 1978-84 prior to stops as offensive line coach at Navy in 1985 and Arizona in 1986. He joined Southern California as offensive line coach in 1987 and was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1989 for his final three seasons with the Trojans.

Matsko played fullback at Kent State and lettered three years from 1970-72. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in business education in 1973 and later earned a master's degree in education from Miami (Ohio) in 1976.

Matsko and his wife, Kim, have four children: two daughters, Marie and Liz, and two sons, John and Michael. Marie is married to Roque Jimenez and the couple has three children: Jackie, Lucas and Emily. Liz is married to Scott Munter and the couple has three children: Brooklyn, Zachary and J.D. Michael is married to Ariel Scoggins with sons, Noah and Leo. John is married to Casey Cunningham with two daughters, Eila and Saylor.

Sam Mills III enters his 16th season in the NFL and his first as Washington's defensive line coach in 2020.

Mills joins Washington after serving in a variety of roles with the Carolina Panthers from 2005-19, including defensive line coach during the 2018 season after serving as assistant defensive line coach over the previous eight seasons. In 2019, Mills served as the defensive line coach as well as assuming game management responsibilities, assisting head coach Ron Rivera with clock management, replay challenges and other situational football analysis.

In 2019, Mills coached a Panthers defensive line that helped contribute to the defense finishing the season second in the NFL

in sacks totaling 53 sacks. The defense also finished second in the league in sacks per pass attempt with one sack per 9.74 opponent pass attempts. Defensive tackle Vernon Butler finished the season tied for seventh in the NFL among defensive tackles in sacks with six total sacks.

In 2018, four of the top eight sack artists in franchise history were on the roster. All-time Panthers sack leader Julius Peppers tallied five sacks on the season, bringing his career total to 159.5 sacks, fourth most all-time in NFL history. Defensive tackle Kawann Short tallied 50 tackles, 22 quarterback pressures and three sacks on the season, earning Pro Bowl honors for the second time in his career.

In 2017, the defensive line helped the Panthers record 50 sacks, ranking third in the NFL and fourth in franchise history. Peppers and Mario Addison led the team with 11.0 sacks each, the fifth pair of teammates with double-digit sacks in a season in franchise history. The line also helped the Panthers rank

third in the league in rushing defense, giving up just 88.1 rushing yards a game, the second fewest in franchise history.

In 2016, Mills helped tutor a defensive line that produced 35 of the team's 47 sacks, which ranked second in the NFL. Addison produced a then-career-high 9.5 sacks, and defensive tackles Short and Star Lotulelei combined for 10 sacks, tied for the fifth most sacks by a pair of defensive tackles in the NFL.

In 2015, Mills assisted a unit that was a linchpin for a defense that helped the Panthers reach Super Bowl 50. Carolina's defensive line recorded 33.5 of the team's 44 sacks. The unit contributed to a defense that ranked sixth in the NFL in total defense, the fourth consecutive season the team fielded a top-10 defense, and also helped Carolina rank fourth in the NFL in rushing defense.

Short enjoyed a breakout performance, tying for eighth in the NFL with 11 sacks - which tied for the most among defensive tackles. Defensive end Kony Ealy contributed five sacks and tied an NFL record with three sacks in the Super Bowl. Charles Johnson, slowed by injuries in the middle of the season, returned for the postseason to notch three sacks for the NFC champions. In all, 10 different defensive linemen notched at least one sack for the Panthers.

In 2014, Mills assisted a defense that finished 10th in the NFL in total defense. The defensive line totaled 32.5 of the team's 40 sacks, including a team-leading 8.5 by Johnson and four by Ealy, who earned all-rookie honors. In Carolina's 27-16 NFC Wild Card victory over Arizona, the defensive line gathered four sacks to help limit the Cardinals to an NFL postseason record low 78 total net yards.

During the 2013 season, Mills aided a unit that helped the Panthers lead the NFL with 60 sacks, including a team-record nine at Atlanta, and rank second in total defense, second in rushing defense and sixth in passing defense. Defensive end Greg Hardy tied a team record with 15 sacks to earn Pro Bowl and second-team All-Pro honors, while Johnson posted 11 sacks to become the first player in team history with at least nine sacks in four consecutive seasons. Mills also played a key part in the development of all-rookie defensive tackles Lotulelei and Short.

In 2012, Mills worked with a line that was responsible for 37 of Carolina's 39 sacks. Johnson led the team with 12.5, and Hardy posted 11 as they became the first Panthers tandem to record double-digit sacks since 2002.

Prior to the 2011 season, Mills added assistant defensive line coach to his title along with serving as Carolina's defensive quality control coach, though he actually had been working with the defensive line since 2006. He assisted a line that accounted for 25.5 of the team's 31 sacks. Johnson paced the team with nine sacks, and young players received valuable experience as three rookies started games at defensive tackle.

After spending the 2005 season in a dual role as a strength and conditioning and defensive assistant, Mills was promoted to defensive quality control coach in 2006.

Mills' father, Sam, played and coached for the Carolina Panthers and is the only Panthers player to have his number retired. He is also the only player inducted into the team's Hall of Honor. When his father played for the Panthers, Mills worked as a ball boy at training camp and later in the equipment room before joining the strength and conditioning program.

Mills followed in his father's footsteps by playing at Montclair (N.J.) State, where the elder Mills was an NCAA Division II All-America at linebacker. He started 20 games in two seasons

at defensive back for the Red Hawks and totaled 71 tackles, two interceptions, 14 passes defended, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

Mills has been a member of the coaching staff for the East-West Shrine Game five times and served as head coach of the East team in 2018.

Vincent Rivera enters his third NFL season and first as Washington's defensive quality control coach in 2020.

Rivera joins the Redskins after spending two seasons with the Carolina Panthers as a defensive quality control coach. In his role, Rivera breaks down game film, analyzes opponent tendencies and assists in the preparation of the defensive game plan.

In 2018, Rivera spent his time primarily with the defensive backs, helping coach a unit that featured two young cornerbacks in James Bradberry and Donte Jackson in the starting lineup. Jackson led the Panthers with four interceptions in 2018, the second most by a rookie in franchise history. Bradberry led the team with 20 passes defended.

Rivera also worked as a football operations intern for the Panthers during the 2017 season.

Rivera began his collegiate career at the University of San Diego, redshirting in 2012 and seeing action at running back in 2013 before transferring to the University of California-Berkeley. After sitting out the 2014 season, Rivera played two seasons (2015-16) at Cal, seeing action at running back, wide receiver and on special teams. He finished his career at Cal with 44 catches for 487 yards and four touchdowns. Rivera graduated with a degree in film and media studies.

Rivera is the nephew of Redskins head coach, Ron Rivera.

Entering his 32nd year in the coaching profession and his ninth in the NFL, Richard Rodgers enters his first year with Washington in 2020 as the team's assistant defensive backs coach.

Rodgers joins Washington after serving in a variety of roles with the Carolina Panthers from 2012-19. In 2019, he served as the safeties coach where he coached safety duo Eric Reid and Tre Boston. Reid is one-of-four players in the NFL this season with at least 110 tackles and four sacks on the year. He finished the season second on the team with 129 tackles. He has also tallied six passes defended and two fumble recoveries. Boston ranks fourth on the team with 68 tackles and has also recorded three interceptions and 11 passes defended.

In 2018, he served as the secondary coach after three seasons as the assistant defensive backs/safeties coach. The secondary featured two young cornerbacks in the starting lineup, James Bradberry and rookie Donte Jackson. Jackson led the Panthers with four interceptions, the second most by a rookie in franchise history and Bradberry led the team with a career-high 20 passes defended.

The 2017 season saw the addition of veteran safety Mike Adams to the secondary. He recorded two interceptions and two fumble recoveries. In the season's final nine weeks, the Panthers tallied nine interceptions, including seven from the secondary. Those picks helped Carolina rank third in the NFL with a plus-eight turnover differential over that period.

In 2016, Rodgers worked with a position group that helped the Panthers tie for the NFC lead with 17 interceptions. Safety Kurt Coleman led the team in interceptions (four) for the second consecutive season, ranking fifth in the NFL among safeties with four picks.

Rodgers returned to his roots as assistant defensive backs coach for Carolina in 2015, after he had previously gained experience as a secondary coach for 11 years on the college level before entering the NFL. In 2015, Rodgers assisted a group that helped the Panthers rank sixth in the NFL in total defense and win the NFC Championship. Carolina limited opposing quarterbacks to an NFL-low 73.5 passer rating and paced the NFL in interceptions (24), total takeaways (39) and turnover differential (plus-20). Including the postseason, seven different defensive backs recorded interceptions for the Panthers. Coleman finished third in the NFL with seven interceptions, and cornerback Josh Norman earned All Pro and Pro Bowl honors.

Rodgers came to Carolina in 2012 as special teams assistant and took over as special teams coordinator for the final seven games, a position he held through the 2014 season.

In his first full season as the Panthers' special teams coordinator in 2013, Rodgers oversaw a unit that featured record-setting performances from kicker Graham Gano, punter Brad Nortman and kick returner Ted Ginn, Jr., while long snapper J.J. Jansen made the Pro Bowl.

Rodgers aided Gano in converting 24-of-27 field goal attempts, including a team-record and NFL-leading six makes from 50 yards or more, and topping the league with a 79.7 touchback percentage on kickoffs – then the best mark in the league since 1992. Rodgers helped Nortman set then-team records with a gross average of 47.8 yards and net average of 41.6 yards, ranking fourth and fifth in the NFL, respectively. Ginn set a franchise record and ranked sixth in the NFL with a 12.2-yard punt return average.

During the last seven games of the 2012 season, Rodgers had a positive effect on special teams play, helping the Panthers improve from 31st to 14th in the NFL in punt return average and from 18th to 10th in punt coverage. Rodgers' units also led the league in opponents' kickoff return average following a 30th place finish in 2011.

Prior to joining Carolina, Rodgers coached collegiately for 23 years. He coached at Holy Cross from 2005-11, spending his last six seasons as defensive coordinator after handling the secondary in 2005. Rodgers developed the Crusaders into one of the top defenses in the Patriot League. Five players from his unit earned All-Patriot League honors in 2009, 2010 and 2011.

From 2001-04, Rodgers tutored the secondary at New Mexico State. During his tenure, the Aggies amassed 45 interceptions while lowering their passing yardage allowed in each of his final three seasons. Previously, Rodgers worked at Portland State from 1997-2000. He oversaw the Vikings' secondary and special teams in

addition to serving as the team's strength and conditioning coordinator.

Prior to Portland State, Rodgers had a two-year stint at San Jose State, working with the secondary and special teams from 1995-96. He started his coaching career as an assistant at Diablo Valley Community College from 1989-94.

Rodgers was also exposed to professional football along the way. He participated in the NFL's Minority Internship Program with the Oakland Raiders during training camp in 1996 and was the defensive backs coach for the Scottish Claymores of NFL Europe in 1998.

A two-time second-team All-Pac 10 Conference selection at California, where he was teammates with Panthers head coach Ron Rivera, Rodgers played defensive back and was the Golden Bears' special teams captain for three seasons. He called "The Play" in the huddle to defeat Stanford in 1982. Rodgers was the second and fourth player to handle the ball on the famed five-lateral kickoff return for a touchdown on the final play between the two rivals.

Rodgers then played defensive back and wide receiver for three seasons in the Arena Football League. He appeared in the league's first championship game in 1987, catching a 32-yard touchdown pass for the Denver Dynamite in Arena Bowl I.

He graduated from California with a degree in political science. He has a daughter, Kayla, and four sons, Richard II – a tight end for Washington – Christopher, Noah and Evan, and is married to Sara.

Entering his 20th year in the coaching profession and his third in the NFL, Steve Russ enters his first year with Washington in 2020 as the team's linebackers coach. Prior to joining Washington, he served as the linebackers coach for the Carolina Panthers from 2018-19.

In 2019, the Panthers made a switch to the 3-4 defense where Russ headed both the inside and outside linebacker units, working directly with the inside linebacker group and overseeing the outside linebacker group. The inside linebacker group was led by seven-time Pro Bowler and five-time First Team All-Pro selection Luke Kuechly. Kuechly finished fourth in the league with 144 total tackles while Shaq Thompson added 109. Kuechly also added 12 pass defenses, which was tied for the most in the league among linebackers. The Panthers defense finished the 2019 season ranked second in the NFL in sacks totaling 53 sacks. The outside linebacker corps, led by Mario Addison (9.5) and Bruce Irvin (8.5), finished the season with 18 total sacks. First round pick Brian Burns also contributed 7.5 sacks during his rookie campaign.

In his first season coaching the linebackers in 2018, Russ was tasked with coaching a talented group including Luke Kuechly, Thomas Davis and Shaq Thompson. Under Russ' tutelage, Kuechly recorded 130 tackles, eighth most in the NFL according to press box stats, and 20 tackles for loss, a new career high and tied for third in the league. Kuechly earned Pro Bowl honors and was named AP First-Team All Pro. After playing in just 12 games, Davis still finished third on the team with 84 tackles. Thompson finished with career highs in tackles [79] and sacks [3.0].

Prior to joining Carolina, Russ spent six seasons (2012-17) at Air Force as the assistant head coach, including four (2014-17) as the defensive coordinator and defensive backfield coach. Russ served as co defensive coordinator from 2012-13 with responsibilities coaching the inside linebackers (2013) and secondary (2012).

In 2017, the Air Force defense led the Mountain West Conference against the pass, allowing just 171.1 yards per game, a mark that ranked 10th nationally. The unit also ranked second in the conference and 14th in the country in opponent first downs.

In 2016, Russ' defensive unit ranked 10th nationally in rushing defense and 33rd in total defense. He coached defensive back Weston Steelhammer to three first-team all-conference selections, an Academy first, and to a pair of All-American honors in 2016. Steelhammer earned the East-West Shrine Bowl Pat Tillman Award for leadership and citizenship. He was also one of four finalists – with the other three finalists all being drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft – for the Lott Trophy, which

is presented annually to the college football defensive impact player of the year.

In 2014, Russ' first season as the Falcons' sole defensive coordinator, Air Force improved in all four major categories, including a nation-best 15.8 points per game improvement to 24.2 allowed per game, moving 72 spots higher in the national rankings (33rd) than the previous season. The Falcons also improved in rushing, passing and total defense, including a more than 100-yard improvement in rushing defense to 135.6 yards per game. Air Force led the nation by improving from 119th nationally in 2013 to 28th in 2014, a 91-spot jump.

Russ came to Air Force, his alma mater, from Wake Forest where he spent four seasons (2008-11). Russ coached tight ends and fullbacks in his first two seasons before moving to the defensive side of the ball, coaching linebackers in 2010 and the secondary in 2011.

Wake's punt coverage team, which Russ coordinated, led the nation in punt return defense, allowing just nine yards all season in 2008. When he took over the secondary in 2011, the Wake defense showed dramatic improvement.

From 2010 to 2011, the pass efficiency defense improved 56 spots nationally, the third-down defense improved 52 spots and the scoring defense improved 45 spots. In 2011, Russ coached safety Josh Bush to first-team All-ACC and third-team AP All-America honors. Bush was drafted in the sixth round by the New York Jets. Russ coached Merrill Noel, who was named the ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Freshman All-American by numerous publications as he led the country in pass break-ups. He also coached Tommy Bohanon, a fullback that was drafted in the seventh round of the 2013 Draft by the New York Jets.

Russ also coached at Syracuse (2005-07) where he led linebackers in 2005 and 2006, before being promoted to defensive coordinator in 2007. While at Syracuse, Russ coached linebacker Kelvin Smith, a seventh-round draft pick in 2007 by the Miami Dolphins.

He also coached linebackers as an assistant at Ohio (2001-04), coaching alongside current Panthers defensive coordinator Eric Washington. Russ began his coaching career at Air Force as a graduate assistant strength coach in 1995.

While playing at Air Force, Russ earned second-team All-WAC honors in 1994 and was selected to play in both the Blue-Gray All-Star game and the East-West Shrine game following his senior season. Russ received Air Force's Brian Bullard Award, which is the program's highest honor, in 1994 and was a seventh-round draft pick of the Denver Broncos in the 1995 NFL Draft. He was just the fifth player in Air Force history to be drafted in the NFL.

Following two years of active service in the military, Russ joined the Broncos and spent four seasons (1997-2000) with the team, and he was a part of Denver's 1997 and 1998 Super Bowl Championship teams. He played in 24 career games as a linebacker and on special teams.

Russ is a native of Stetsonville, Wis. He and his wife, Betsy, are the parents of a daughter, Mackenzie, and a son, Tyler.

Brent Vieselmeyer enters his fifth season coaching in the NFL and his first as Washington's assistant defensive backs/nickel coach in 2020 after serving in a variety of coaching roles with the Oakland Raiders from 2015-18.

Prior to joining Washington, Vieselmeyer was the head coach for Santa Margarita Catholic High School. Prior to coaching at Santa Margarita, he was an offensive analyst for the University of Kansas in 2018.

In 2016 with Oakland, the linebacking corps was led by veteran linebackers Bruce Irvin, Perry Riley Jr. and Malcolm Smith. The addition of Irvin in free agency made an immediate impact, as Irvin started all 16 games for the first time in his career, generating seven sacks (second most on the team), and tied a fran-

chise record with six forced fumbles, also tying for the NFL lead. Smith recorded a team-high 115 tackles (86 solo), a mark that led the team for the second consecutive season. Riley Jr. joined the team in October and stepped in upon arrival and emerged into a starting role, finishing sixth on the team with 62 tackles (45). Rookie LB Cory James saw significant time in 2016, making five starts and posting 43 stops in his five starts.

In 2015, Vieselmeyer assisted with a linebacker corps that had a significant impact on the Raiders overall defense. With Vieselmeyer's assistance, Smith lead the team with a career-high 143 tackles (98), while finishing second on the team with four sacks.

Vieselmeyer also assisted in the development of rookie linebackers Ben Heeney and Nelron Ball. Heeney emerged as a key contributor on defense late in the season finishing with 39 tackles (28), 2.5 sacks and one forced fumble. Ball emerged as a starter at outside linebacker making nine tackles (four), one sack and one pass defended in his six appearances before having his rookie season cut short due to a knee injury.

From 2013-14, Vieselmeyer served as the co-defensive coordinator at Houston Baptist University. Prior to joining the Huskies, he served as head coach at Valor Christian High School in Highlands Ranch, Colo., beginning in March 2007, where he launched the football program. At Valor Christian, he compiled a 55-12 record, leading the Eagles to four-straight state championships in 2009 (3A), 2010 (4A), 2011 (4A) and 2012 (5A). He was named the Denver Post Colorado Coach of the Year in 2009, 2010 and 2011 and was All Sport Jefferson County Coach of the Year in 2010.

Vieselmeyer began his coaching career at Orange (Calif.) Lutheran High School, where he spent eight years as defensive coordinator. He led the Lancers to a 2006 California state title. They also won the 2004 CIF Southern Section Championship and were finalists in 2000, 2001 and 2003.

During his career, Vieselmeyer has seen 31 of his student-athletes earn college football scholarships.

Vieselmeyer is a native of Wauwatosa, Wis., where he played linebacker at Redlands (Calif.) and Concordia University. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in education from Concordia in 1999 and a Master of Arts in educational administration from the University of Phoenix in 2005. He and his wife, Marnie, have two daughters, Payton and Quinn.

Travelle Wharton enters his 13th season in the NFL including three as a coach and 10 as a player and his first as Washington's assistant offensive line coach in 2020.

He coached with the Carolina Panthers from 2018-19 assisting then-running game coordinator John Matsko.

In 2019, Wharton assisted an offensive line that helped Panthers running back Christian McCaffrey rush for 1,387 yards, third most in the NFL and a career-high 15 rushing touchdowns. It was his second-consecutive season with at least 1,000 rushing yards. Overall in 2019, Wharton assisted a Panthers offense that finished sixth in the NFL in average yards per carry with 4.71.

In Wharton's first season coaching in 2018, he assisted with an offensive line that helped Carolina top the NFL in rushing yards per attempt with a 5.1-yard average, while finishing fourth in total rushing yards (2,136). The Panthers rushing attack recorded 69 rushes that went for 10+ yards, the second most among all teams in 2018 and second most in a single season in team history. Left guard Trai Turner earned Pro Bowl honors for the fourth consecutive season.

Wharton worked with the Panthers prior to the 2017 season in offseason workouts and training camp as part of the NFL Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship.

Wharton made his coaching debut with his alma mater, the

University of South Carolina, with one season of coaching in 2015. He was initially named offensive quality control coach, but then was promoted to offensive line coach midway through the 2015 season.

Wharton is a veteran of 10 NFL seasons, nine (2004-11, 2013) with the Panthers and one with the Cincinnati Bengals (2012). With the Panthers, Wharton started 111 of 115 regular season games played, the third-highest totals by an offensive lineman in team history.

Wharton anchored the offensive line on Carolina's top three seasons of rushing in franchise history in 2009 (2,498), 2008 (2,437) and 2011 (2,408). Carolina ranked third in the NFL in rushing in all three of those seasons. The Panthers averaged 5.41 yards per carry in 2011, a mark that led the NFL and set a franchise record.

In 2008, Wharton helped protect Panthers quarterback Jake Delhomme as Carolina allowed just 20 sacks, a mark that ranked sixth in the NFL and still stands as the franchise record.

Wharton played in five postseason games, helping the Panthers advance to the playoffs in 2005, 2008 and 2013.

A native of Fountain Inn, S.C., Wharton played collegiately at South Carolina where he was a four-year letterwinner (2000-03) and earned All-SEC recognition in his junior and senior seasons. He also earned Freshman All-America honors and a spot on the All-SEC Freshman team. He was selected in the third round of the 2004 NFL Draft by the Panthers.

Ken Zampese enters his 22nd season coaching in the NFL and his first as Washington's quarterbacks coach in 2020. He has served in a variety of offensive coaching roles with the Cleveland Browns (2018), Cincinnati Bengals (2003-17), St. Louis Rams (2000-02), Green Bay Packers (1999) and Philadelphia Eagles (1998). In 2019, Zampese was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach for the Atlanta Legends of the Alliance of American Football (AAF).

In 2019, Zampese spent time with the Atlanta Legends of the Alliance of American Football. He served as the teams offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach and helped lead his quarterback room to a 62.4 completion percentage going 186-298 with five touchdowns and 1,907 yards in eight games. In the fall, he served as a defensive analyst with the University of Florida, assisting defensive coordinator, Todd Grantham. He specifically assisted in breaking down opponent pass protections, leading to the teams 11-sack increase from the previous season.

In 2018, Zampese helped guide Browns rookie quarterback Baker Mayfield to an NFL rookie record 27 passing touchdowns, despite starting just 13 games. His 27 passing touchdowns ranked fifth in a season among all Browns quarterbacks in franchise history. Mayfield also threw for 3,725 passing yards, setting a Browns rookie record and ranking sixth among NFL rookies all-time. Mayfield led all 2018 NFL rookies in passing yards (3,725), passing touchdown (27), completion percentage (63.79) and passer rating (93.7) under the guidance of Zampese.

As the Bengals offensive coordinator in 2016, Zampese helped the Bengals offense finish comfortably in the NFL's top half in net yards at No. 13, averaging 356.9 per game. Prior to being named the clubs offensive coordinator, Zampese spent 13 seasons as the Bengals quarterbacks coach, working with Jon Kitna, Carson Palmer and Andy Dalton.

In 2015, Dalton posted a club-record 106.3 passer rating, and his career rating of 91.8 is also a franchise record. From 2011-15, Dalton became only the second starting quarterback in the Super Bowl era to lead his team to the playoffs in each of his first five seasons. Zampese stands as the only quarterbacks coach to fully guide such an accomplishment, as Baltimore's Joe Flacco, the other quarterback to turn the trick, had three different position coaches during his five-year run. Equally notable in 2015 from a coaching standpoint, first-year quarterback AJ McCarron was immediately impressive when suddenly called on late in the season to replace an injured Dalton. McCarron went from Zampese's classroom to a playoff run unexpectedly.

McCarron posted a 2-1 record and a 101.1 passer rating in his three starts (Games 14-16). In the Wild Card playoff, McCarron led a Bengals comeback from a 15-point deficit to take a late lead, only to see Pittsburgh come back with a winning field goal at the gun.

Prior to Dalton, Zampese led Carson Palmer into the ranks of the Bengals' all-time top passers. Palmer still holds the club's all-time best completion percentage (62.9).

In 2003, his first season with the Bengals, Zampese had success with a veteran starting quarterback in Jon Kitna. The '03 campaign saw Kitna post career highs at that point in completions (324), passing yards (3,591), touchdown passes (26), completion percentage (62.3) and rating (87.4).

Zampese came to the Bengals following three seasons in St. Louis. He was the club's wide receivers coach in 2001 as the Rams led the league in passing yards, averaging 291.4. In 2002, he added the title of passing game coach, and the Rams finished second in the league at 259.6 yards per game. Zampese began his NFL career in 1998 as an offensive assistant with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Prior to the NFL, Zampese coached for nine years in college, including two seasons at Miami (Ohio). In '97, Miami averaged 37.4 points per game. Zampese played wide receiver and kick returner at the University of San Diego from 1985-88. He was the team's Special Teams Player of the Year as a senior. He earned an undergraduate degree in business from San Diego, and later received a master's degree in adult education from Southern California.

Jeff Zgonina (pronounced ska-KNEE-na) is entering his 22nd combined season as a player or coach in the NFL in 2020 after being named Washington's assistant defensive line coach on January 23, 2020.

Prior to joining Washington, Zgonina served as the San Francisco 49ers defensive line coach from 2017-18. During that time, Zgonina played a major role in the development of DT DeForest Buckner. Buckner increased his sack totals from 3.0 in 2017 to 12.0 in 2018. He finished 2018 No. 3 in the NFL in total sacks among defensive tackles and was selected to his first career Pro Bowl.

In 2017, Zgonina guided the 49ers defensive line as they improved throughout the season. Over the final eight weeks of the season, the 49ers defense ranked fifth in the NFL, allowing 91.4 rushing yards per game, while also allowing an average of 3.62 yards per carry, ranking tied for fourth in the league. Buckner led the defensive line with 61 tackles and tied for the most sacks among defensive linemen (3.0) with rookie DL Solomon Thomas.

While with the Giants, Zgonina worked with a defensive unit

that ranked second in the NFL, allowing 17.8 points per game. That unit also finished tied for third in opponent rushing yards per game (88.6). After signing with the Giants as a free agent, DE Olivier Vernon led the team with 8.5 sacks while NT Damon Harrison registered career highs in sacks (2.5) and tackles (86) while working with Zgonina and defensive line coach Patrick Graham.

Zgonina previously served as assistant defensive line coach with the Houston Texans for one season in 2013. In Houston, he worked with DE J.J. Watt, who led the team with 10.5 sacks and was named All-Pro for the second time in his career.

A seventh-round draft choice (185th overall) of the Pittsburgh Steelers in the 1993 NFL Draft, Zgonina played in 219 games (67 starts) and registered 448 tackles, 26 sacks, and 13 fumble recoveries, 11 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and one interception. The former defensive tackle played for the Steelers (1993-94), Carolina Panthers (1995), Atlanta Falcons (1996), St. Louis Rams (1997, 1999-2002), Indianapolis Colts (1998), Miami Dolphins (2003-06) and Houston Texans (2007-09) throughout his 17 NFL seasons.

Throughout his career, Zgonina played in nine career postseason games including an appearance in the Rams 23-16 victory over the Tennessee Titans in Super Bowl XXXIV where he registered three tackles. Zgonina played collegiately at Purdue University (1989-92) where he was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year as a senior.

Zgonina has two children: daughter, Bailey, and son, Carter.

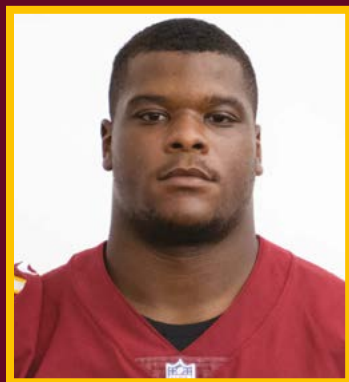

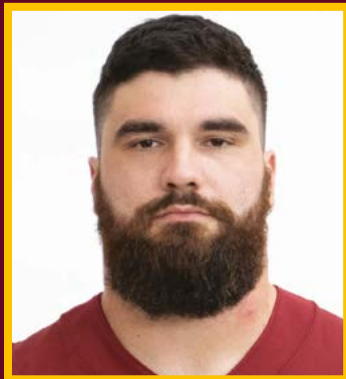

EAGLES 32, REDSKINS 27

PHILADELPHIA - DeSean Jackson's homecoming turned into a highlight show for the speedy receiver.

Carson Wentz threw a pair of deep touchdown passes to Jackson, and the Philadelphia Eagles overcame a 17-point deficit to beat the Washington Redskins 32-27 on Sunday.

Wentz was 28 of 39 for 313 yards and three TDs in his first game since Week 14 after not taking a snap in the preseason. Jackson had eight catches for 154 yards. The Eagles racked up 436 total yards.

Case Keenum threw for 380 yards and three TDs, helping the Redskins build a 17-0 lead in his first start with his fourth team in four seasons.

But Philadelphia's high-powered offense took over and the defense settled down after a sloppy start.

Playing his first game back in Philadelphia since former Eagles coach Chip Kelly cut him following his third Pro Bowl season in 2013, Jackson picked up where he left off six years ago and showed no signs of slowing down at age 32.

Jackson blew past the defense on a third-and-10 in the third quarter, caught Wentz's pass inside the 10 and strolled into the end zone to give the Eagles a 21-20 lead. The 53-yard TD reception was Jackson's second of 50-plus yards in the game and the 31st of his career. Only Hall of Famer Jerry Rice had more at 36.

Zach Ertz caught a 26-yard pass to set up Alshon Jeffery's first career rushing score on the first play of the fourth quarter. Jeffery caught a backward pass from Wentz and fought his way into the end zone. Darren Sproles ran in for the 2-point conversion to extend the lead to 29-20.

The Eagles trailed 17-0 in the second quarter when Jackson made an over-the-shoulder, 51-yard TD catch.

Wentz found Jeffery going across the back of the end zone for a 5-yard TD pass to cut Washington's lead to 20-14 in the third quarter.

Keenum hit Terry McLaurin perfectly in stride on a deep pass for a 70-yard TD to give the Redskins a 17-0 lead, inciting the first boos from fans anticipating a championship season.

The Redskins got the ball to start and scored a touchdown on the season's opening drive for the first time since 2004. Vernon Davis turned a short pass from Keenum into a 48-yard score after hurdling Ronald Darby and breaking a tackle on his way down the right sideline.

Cowboys 31, REDSKINS 21

LANDOVER, Md. [AP] — Dak Prescott probably could have kept running — maybe all the way to the end zone.

Instead, the Dallas Cowboys quarterback stiff-armed Washington Redskins cornerback Josh Norman to put an exclamation point on his longest run of the game. Prescott spent Sunday afternoon carving up the Redskins' defense with his arms and legs to the tune of 26 of 30 passing for 269 yards and three touchdowns and 69 yards rushing in a 31-21 Cowboys victory to improve to 2-0.

A week after putting up a perfect 158.3 QB rating, Prescott responded from an interception to lead Dallas on consecutive touchdown drives of 97, 83 and 75 yards. At one point, he completed 18 consecutive passes and wondered the last time he had an incompletion.

On the verge of a contract extension that's expected to guarantee him over \$30 million, Prescott connected with three receivers on the touchdowns: Devin Smith, Jason Witten and Cooper. Less than two weeks removed from ending his holdout and agreeing to a \$90 million, six-year deal, Ezekiel Elliott had his workload increased to 23 carries for 111 yards and ran for a touchdown.

It was a game that felt like it was being played deep in the heart of Texas — an entire side of the lower bowl was full of blue and white Cowboys jerseys, who just about outnumbered Redskins fans. Sounds of "Coop" filled the stadium after Cooper's catches, and there was a loud "DE-FENSE" chant when Washington had the ball.

The Redskins [0-2] got a rushing touchdown from Adrian Peterson and passing TDs from Case Keenum to Paul Richardson and rookie Terry McLaurin. But their banged-up defense playing without two starters struggled to contain Prescott or cover his receivers.

Prescott hasn't had a stretch as good as this in his NFL career, which comes at a perfect juncture amid contract negotiations.

BEARS 31, REDSKINS 15

LANDOVER, Md. [AP] — After the Chicago Bears' offense was slow to get going this season, Mitchell Trubisky was excited to speed things up.

Trubisky and the Bears used a no-huddle, hurry-up tempo to snap out of their offensive funk and score 28 first-half points on the way to beating the Washington Redskins 31-15 Monday night. After no passing touchdowns the first two games of the year, Trubisky connected with Taylor Gabriel on three of them in the second quarter alone.

The 2017 second overall pick looked at ease with a fast-paced approach and picked apart Washington's porous defense on 25 of 31 passing for 231 yards. It was the offensive explosion Trubisky predicted would happen this week.

Chicago [2-1] had just a 1-yard touchdown run to show for its first two games, and Trubisky entered the night with a completion percentage of 58.3 and ranked near the bottom of the league in yards per attempt. Facing the Redskins [0-3] brought out some of the best in Trubisky. Trubisky had 173 yards in the first half alone before throwing an interception at the goal line in the third quarter.

With scores of 1, 3 and 36 yards, Gabriel joined Mike Ditka in 1963 as the only Bears receivers with three TD catches in the first half of a game. Gabriel made six catches for 75 yards before leaving in the second half with a concussion.

The Bears took advantage of five turnovers by Redskins quarterback Case Keenum: two interceptions by Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, including a pick six, another by Kyle Fuller and fumbles forced by Khalil Mack and Danny Trevathan.

With the offense up to the defense's speed in the first half, Chicago put up 28 points in two quarters after scoring a total of 19 the past two weeks, 12 of which came on field goals from Eddy Piñeiro.

Mack had two of the Bears' four sacks to continue a dominant start by the defense that didn't give up a Washington TD until midway through the third quarter. Keenum's two TD passes came long after fans chanted for rookie quarterback Dwayne Haskins and booed the Redskins off the field at halftime.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. [AP] — Daniel Jones provided the spark and the New York Giants are feeding off it on what they hope is the path back to the playoff hunt.

Jones threw a touchdown pass and created excitement with his arm and legs, Saquon Barkley's replacement Wayne Gallman scored two touchdowns, and Jabrill Peppers scored on a 32-yard interception return to lead the suddenly revived Giants to 24-3 victory over the winless Washington Redskins on Sunday.

The mistake-prone Redskins [0-4] are heading the other way. They were limited to 176 total yards by the much-maligned New York defense and they didn't get a boost when embattled coach Jay Gruden inserted first-round pick Dwayne Haskins Jr. at quarterback for Case Keenum.

New York intercepted the pair four times, with Haskins throwing the last three.

The Redskins' start is their worst since losing their first five in 2001.

Jones, the No. 6 pick overall in the draft, has the Giants thinking about the here and now since replacing two-time Super Bowl MVP Eli Manning as the starting quarterback. He rallied New York from an 18-point deficit in his first start against the Buccaneers last week, and was solid early, leading New York to touchdown runs on its first two series.

The Duke product was 23 of 31 for 225 yards with two interceptions. Winning tends to overshadow the mistakes.

Gallman, who is going to start for the foreseeable future with Barkley battling a high ankle sprain, caught a 6-yard TD pass and scored on a 1-yard run to stake New York to a 14-0 lead.

Keenum was 6 of 11 for 37 yards and an interception when Haskins came on midway through the second quarter. The move came after Quinton Dunbar picked off Jones on consecutive passes, but Haskins went 9 of 17 for 107 yards and could produce only a 21-yard field goal by Dustin Hopkins on his initial series. He was picked off three times, the last two by Janoris Jenkins.

Keenum, who had battled a foot injury this week, did not sound happy being lifted. He said he was surprised.

Rookie linebacker Ryan Connolly's second interception in as many weeks set up an opening 32-yard drive that Gallman ended with his reception. Gallman's short run ended a 13-play, 94-yard march the Redskins kept alive when a third-down holding penalty on cornerback Fabian Moreau nullified a sack.

Washington was flagged 12 times for 58 yards.

Jones kept the first drive alive with a 5-yard pass to Sterling Shepard on a gutsy decision by coach Pat Shurmur to go for it on fourth-and-2 at the Redskins 24.

Aldrick Rosas kicked a 30-yard field goal on the final play of the first half and Peppers closed out the scoring with his interception return.

PATRIOTS 33, REDSKINS 7

LANDOVER, Md. [AP] — Playing before an appreciative audience in a place far from home, Tom Brady helped the New England Patriots stay unbeaten by picking apart the lowly Washington Redskins.

While he was at it, the 42-year-old quarterback climbed past a former star in the NFL record book.

Brady threw for 348 yards and three touchdowns, and the Patriots got another strong performance from their defense in a 33-7 rout of the winless Redskins on Sunday.

Now in his 20th season, Brady whisked by Brett Favre into third place on the career list with 71,923 yards passing. Brady now trails only Peyton Manning [71,940 yards] and Drew Brees [74,845].

Brady also edged closer to Manning's record 539 touchdown passes, connecting with Julian Edelman, Brandon Bolden and Ryan Izzo to bring his total to 527. His prowess on the football field is rarely surprising, but the reaction he received was certainly unexpected. Thousands of fans in the crowd wore blue Patriots jerseys — many of them No. 12 with BRADY on the back — and were cheering for the reigning Super Bowl champions from warmups to well after the final whistle. Shrugging off four sacks, Brady completed 28 of 42 passes — including a 15-yarder to Edelman in the third quarter to eclipse Favre.

This is the fifth time in franchise history that New England has started the season 5-0, and only the second time since 2007.

Playing for the first time since breaking his leg against Philadelphia last December, Redskins quarterback Colt McCoy went 18 for 27 for 119 yards and an interception. McCoy began the season behind Case Keenum and rookie Dwayne Haskins Jr., but got the start over the injured Keenum and inexperienced Haskins for the Redskins [0-5].

Washington had only 220 yards in offense and was 1 for 11 on third-down conversions. It's the first time in franchise history New England has four straight games with at least five sacks. In addition, the Patriots completed a fifth consecutive game without allowing a touchdown pass, the first team to pull off that feat since the 1988 Cleveland Browns.

The defeat kept the pressure on Redskins coach Jay Gruden, whose job status appears to be tenuous in the wake of his team's 0-5 start. Gruden is 35-49-1 over five-plus seasons with Washington.

"No one's told me anything," Gruden said. "I don't have a concern. If the key works Monday, keep working, go attack the Miami Dolphins and plan on getting our first win next week."

Washington travels to Miami next week to face the winless Dolphins, who absorbed a 43-0 beatdown from New England on Sept. 15.

After Brady's 10-yard TD pass to Izzo with 9:14 left made it 33-7, the chant "Brady! Brady!" rose from the stands while thousands of Redskins backers fled to the exits. McCoy completed a 12-yard pass on Washington's first play from scrimmage. Two short runs and a sack followed, but New England's opening possession also ended with Brady getting dumped in his own backfield.

The Redskins jumped on top when Steven Sims Jr. scored on a 65-yard end around, but the Patriots led 12-7 at halftime and tacked on two touchdowns in the third quarter.

The difference between the seasoned Brady and untested McCoy [now 1-6 as a starter with Washington] was made evident late in the second quarter. With 58 seconds left, McCoy forced a pass that was intercepted by Jason McCourty, who took it 16 yards to the Washington 11.

Brady cautiously completed a short pass and twice threw the ball away before accepting a field goal try that kept New England's momentum flowing into halftime.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. [AP] — It's no surprise a matchup between winless teams was decided by a dropped pass.

Running back Kenyan Drake couldn't handle Ryan Fitzpatrick's quick throw in the flat on a 2-point conversion try with 6 seconds left Sunday, allowing the Washington Redskins to escape with their first victory of the year by beating the Miami Dolphins 17-16.

Drake had four defenders between him and the end zone and probably wouldn't have scored even if he had secured the ball. But the drop put the brakes on a frantic comeback by the Dolphins, who trailed 17-3 when Fitzpatrick replaced Josh Rosen to start the fourth quarter.

Redskins rookie Terry McLaurin caught two touchdown passes, and veteran Adrian Peterson more than doubled his season rushing total with 118 for Bill Callahan in his first game as interim coach.

Washington [1-5] looked like a different team after firing coach Jay Gruden, although the caliber of the opposition had something to do with that. The Dolphins [0-5] remained winless under rookie coach Brian Flores but helped their chances of securing the No. 1 draft pick in April.

When asked about the two-point conversion, Flores said he was going for the win.

Drake, however, said another running back practiced that play, and not him.

Fitzpatrick led two touchdown drives, including a climactic 75-yard march that began with 2:02 left. After he hit DeVante Parker for an 11-yard score to cut the deficit to one point, Flores decided to go for 2.

Drake split wide left, went in motion and had traffic around him when the pass was thrown his way.

Although Miami's defense mustered its best effort of the season, McLaurin slipped behind the secondary to catch scoring passes of 25 and 33 yards from Case Keenum, who returned after missing one game because of a foot injury.

McLaurin, a third-round draft pick who has been one of the Redskins' few bright spots this year, totaled four receptions for 100 yards.

Callahan gave Peterson a significant workload as expected, and the four-time All-Pro running back carried 23 times to reach the 100-yard mark for the 56th time. After making a diving interception, Redskins linebacker Shaun Dion Hamilton rose and trotted 35 yards to the end zone, waving for his teammates to join him. More than a dozen did to strike a pose for photographers.

Miami's offense generated few cheers from the half-empty stadium until the end, and remained on pace for the lowest-scoring 16-game season in NFL history.

The Dolphins used six offensive linemen at times and converted two fourth downs, one with special teams trickery. They attempted an onside kick, which was foiled by a penalty.

Nothing could reverse their fortunes. Miami never led and has been ahead for only 3 minutes, 49 seconds this season.

Washington intercepted Rosen twice and sacked him five times before Flores benched him.

REDSKINS: Callahan said Keenum will remain the starter when the Redskins play host to San Francisco on Oct. 20. Washington won the last time the teams met two years ago.

49ers 9, Redskins 0

LANDOVER, Md. [AP] — Nick Bosa sacked Case Keenum to run out the clock, belly flopped onto the field and rode it like a Slip 'N Slide.

Bosa and the San Francisco 49ers Slip 'N Slided their way to an ugly 9-0 win at the Washington Redskins in steady rain and driving wind Sunday to remain undefeated. It wasn't pretty, but San Francisco is 6-0 for the third time in franchise history, and first since 1990.

San Francisco coach Kyle Shanahan thought about flopping onto his old home field with his players, but watched them gleefully instead after beating the team that fired him and his father, Mike, in 2013. Shanahan knew from his time as Washington's offensive coordinator how bad the FedEx Field surface can be in normal weather and adjusted along the way.

Shanahan's bunch didn't look like an unbeaten powerhouse in horrific conditions that made life difficult on quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo and the entire offense. Garoppolo bounced back from a dreadful first half to finish a passable 12 of 21 for 151 yards passing. Robbie Gould made field goals from 28, 22 and 29 yards to provide the only offense of the game.

San Francisco's defense continued its dominant run after holding the Los Angeles Rams to seven points last week and the Cleveland Browns to three before that. The Niners are the first team since 2005 and sixth since 1990 to limit an opponent to seven or fewer points and fewer than 200 net yards of offense in three consecutive games.

After the team's first shutout since Week 1 of the 2016 season — forcing Adrian Peterson to fumble in the third quarter — defensive lineman DeForest Buckner was upset the defense only got one turnover.

The weather seemed a perfect fit for interim Redskins coach Bill Callahan's run-first, run-second and run-third mentality. Washington [1-6] started the game with 10 rushing plays and Peterson ran for 81 yards on 20 carries, but they were shut out for the first time this season.

Redskins lineman Ereck Flowers wasn't sure why 49ers players did mud angels and slid all over the field in celebration, but put it on Washington for letting it happen.

Among those who braved the rain, more than half were 49ers fans — a trend that has haunted the Redskins this season. A "Let's go Niners!" chant broke out in the fourth quarter among those in Jerry Rice, Ronnie Lott, Joe Montana and other jerseys from the organization's storied past.

Linebacker Kwon Alexander, who forced Peterson's fumble, said, "It definitely felt like a home game."

The Redskins had alumni in town for their annual "Homecoming Weekend," but lost their eighth in a row at FedEx Field. Both offenses struggled mightily in a sloppy first half.

Washington took the opening drive and chewed up more than eight minutes on nine rushes and just one pass, but came up empty when Dustin Hopkins missed wide right from 39 yards. Peterson gained 57 yards on the ground for Washington but just 8 after the first drive.

Gould missed from 45 yards in the second quarter. For the half, the 49ers totaled 68 yards as Garoppolo finished 3 of 10 with 10 yards passing and were shut out in the game's first 30 minutes for the first time this year.

It was the first 0-0 first half in the NFL since Week 17 in 2017 between the Cowboys and Eagles.

Vikings 19, Redskins 9

MINNEAPOLIS [AP] — Near the end of this methodical victory for the Minnesota Vikings, the crowd directed a loud cheer toward a player on the visiting team.

When Adrian Peterson appeared on the giant video screens during the 2-minute warning with an announcement of his latest climb up the NFL's all-time rushing list, the Washington Redskins running back took off his helmet, kissed two of his fingers and waved them to the fans who rooted for him in purple not that long ago.

The star of the show, though, was Peterson's successor. Dalvin Cook gave the Vikings yet another stellar performance.

Cook had 171 total yards and the game's only touchdown, helping Kirk Cousins beat his old team on the first try and carrying the Vikings to a 19-9 victory over the Redskins on Thursday night.

Cook, the NFL leader in yards from scrimmage, rushed 23 times for 98 yards and caught five passes for 73 yards for the Vikings [6-2] in their fourth straight win. Cousins went 23 for 26 for 285 yards without a turnover against the Redskins [1-7], who drafted him in 2012 and made him the full-time starter in 2015 before he became a free agent and signed with the Vikings in 2018.

Nobody on the Redskins lately warrants that assessment. Case Keenum, the quarterback Cousins replaced, had his return to Minnesota spoiled by a concussion that kept him out of the second half and thrust rookie Dwayne Haskins back into action. Two plays after Daron Payne and Landon Collins stuffed Cousins for no gain on a fourth-and-1 quarterback sneak at the Minnesota 34, Haskins overthrew Terry McLaurin, and Anthony Harris intercepted.

Keenum's last time in the stadium was nearly two years ago, when his last-play touchdown pass to Stefon Diggs gave the Vikings a victory over New Orleans in a divisional round playoff game, but there was little reason to make this game a memory. Keenum went 12 for 16 for 130 yards.

Diggs caught all seven passes that came his way from Cousins, racking up 143 yards in his own tribute of sorts to the "Minneapolis Miracle." This game was for the guys in the ground game, though. Alexander Mattison added 61 yards on 13 rushes, and Minnesota more than doubled Washington's total yardage, 434-216.

Peterson had 14 carries for 76 yards and in the process moved up to sixth place on the NFL's career rushing list with 13,701 yards by passing Jerome Bettis and LaDainian Tomlinson. Cook hugged Peterson on the field after the game.

The same goes for Cook, who was drafted in the second round in 2017.

The screen pass to Cook was the favored weapon, highlighted by a zigzagging 31-yard gain late in the second quarter that set up his 4-yard run for a score with 11 seconds left on third down. Offensive coordinator Kevin Stefanski made a bold inside zone call for Cook, who rewarded the confidence by powering his way through safety Troy Apke and cornerback Fabian Moreau at the goal line.

The Vikings ran a third-and-15 draw play to Cook from the 25 early in the fourth quarter before settling Dan Bailey's fourth field goal of the night, another conservative decision that even drew some boos from a crowd that was probably a bit bored at that point by a game bogged down by penalties and ball-control play.

Diggs went without a fumble over each of the last three seasons, and the Vikings recovered the two he had as a rookie in 2015. This year, he has already fumbled four times, the most in the league among non-quarterbacks, and the Vikings have lost three of them. Diggs also dropped what would have been a touchdown pass last week at Detroit, a catchable ball that slipped through his hands on third down in the fourth quarter.

MINNEAPOLIS [AP] — ORCHARD PARK, N.Y. [AP] — Micah Hyde sees no reason why the Bills should apologize for taking advantage of a soft season-opening schedule.

The Buffalo safety needed only to point to how the Bills have flipped their record, going from 2-6 a year ago to 6-2, following Sunday's 24-9 win over the Washington Redskins, who dropped to 1-8 in rookie quarterback Dwayne Haskins' first career start.

Buffalo is off to its best start since going 7-1 in 1993. But skeptics can point out the Bills' six wins have come against teams that entered this weekend with a combined 7-31 record.

The Bills didn't exactly ease concerns following an inconsistent performance against an opponent that has already changed coaches and turned to Haskins with starter Case Keenum in the NFL's concussion protocol.

After leading 17-3 following its first three possessions, Buffalo allowed Washington to cut it to eight before rookie Devin Singletary scored on a 2-yard run with 2:21 left.

Washington matched its worst start to a season since 1998. Its offense has now gone 13 quarters since scoring a touchdown, dating to Keenum's 33-yard TD to Terry McLaurin in a 17-16 win at Miami.

Haskins was efficient in going 5 of 8 for 57 yards in the first half, when running back Adrian Peterson was exposing holes in Buffalo's suspect run defense by gaining 101 yards on 10 carries.

But the Ohio State product was unable to fill the offensive void in the second half, when Peterson was limited to 7 yards on eight carries.

Haskins finished 15 of 22 for 144 yards while Dustin Hopkins accounted for all of Washington's points with three field goals, the longest from 39 yards.

The Bills endured issues on both sides of the ball.

Buffalo's run defense started the game by continuing its porous performance from a week earlier, when it allowed a season-worst 218 yards rushing in a 31-13 loss to Philadelphia.

The defense responded in the second half by limiting Washington to 78 yards of offense and a field goal.

Up 17-9, the Bills finally put the game away in the final six minutes, starting with cornerback Tre'Davious White sacking Haskins for a 9-yard loss. That forced Washington to punt from its own 4 to set up Singletary's score on the following drive.

Singletary finished with a season-best 95 yards rushing and 140 yards from scrimmage — the most since LeSean McCoy had 147 two years ago. The rookie took advantage of his most playing time this season, appearing to displace Frank Gore as Buffalo's featured running back.

Jets 34, Redskins 17

MINNEAPOLIS [AP] — LANDOVER, Md. [AP] — Sam Darnold more than made up for an ill-timed interception by throwing for 293 yards and a career-high four touchdowns, and the New York Jets routed rookie quarterback Dwayne Haskins and the Washington Redskins 34-17 Sunday for their second consecutive victory.

Darnold was 19 of 30 passing and tossed touchdowns to Daniel Brown, Robby Anderson, Ryan Griffin and former Redskins receiver Jamison Crowder. Despite getting picked off deep in his own territory by Jon Bostic, the 2018 third overall pick bounced back and now has 11 TDs and 10 INTs this season.

The Jets [3-7] sacked Haskins six times, including three by safety Jamal Adams, and linebacker Neville Hewitt intercepted him in his return to the lineup. Le'Veon Bell ran for a 1-yard TD, Griffin had a career-high 109 yards receiving and New York eclipsed 400 yards of offense for the first time in 20 games.

Washington [1-9] set a franchise record by going 16 consecutive quarters without a touchdown before Derrius Guice scored on a 45-yard screen pass early in the fourth. Haskins was 19 of 35 passing for 214 yards and threw TD passes to Guice and tight end Jeremy Sprinkle in his first game since being named starter for the rest of the season.

That feels like a long time away for two teams on pace for a top-five draft pick. The Jets look like they've made some semblance of progress under first-year coach Adam Gase, while the Redskins are 1-4 under interim replacement Bill Callahan and off to their worst 10-game start since 1961, when they were 0-9-1.

The Redskins' 16 quarters without a touchdown were the most by any team since the 2000 Baltimore Ravens. They broke the franchise record of 13 quarters set by the 1936 Boston Redskins before Guice finally broke out in his return from a Week 1 knee injury.

Adams became the second defensive back in the past decade with three sacks in a game, matching what Mike Hilton of the Pittsburgh Steelers did in 2017. With six sacks, he set the Jets single-season franchise record for the most by a defensive back.

The 24-year-old is on a roll. Adams led the Jets with nine tackles and two forced fumbles last week against the Giants.

After coming in 0 for 3 on coach's challenges, Gase went 2 for 2 against the Redskins. He correctly challenged the first play of the game — an 8-yard pass from Darnold to Crowder that was initially ruled to have hit the ground — and even got officials to overturn offensive pass interference against New York early in the fourth.

Redskins owner Dan Snyder and president Bruce Allen already pulled the plug on Jay Gruden, but could another coaching staff change be coming? Washington allowed 34 points to a team that entered with the worst offense in the league and continues to be dead last on third down, putting defensive coordinator Greg Manusky's job in jeopardy.

Redskins 19, Lions 16

LANDOVER, Md. [AP] — Dwayne Haskins picked up his first NFL victory but inexplicably didn't take the final snap in victory formation.

Haskins was celebrating the Washington Redskins' 19-16 comeback win over the Detroit Lions by taking a selfie with a fan who was in the first row. The only problem: The game wasn't quite over, and backup Case Keenum went on the field to kneel down and run out the clock in Washington's second win of the season.

The rookie quarterback made his share of mistakes on the field — and forgetting to get back on the field — during an ugly game against the Lions, but he was there when the Redskins needed him most. Haskins was able to brush off a wrist injury that contributed to some overthrows and the bad look of missing the final play in large part because he guided Washington into field-goal range to finally get in the win column.

The 15th overall draft pick was 13 of 29 for 156 yards and an interception and could approach it like all's well that ends well after Dustin Hopkins connected on a 39-yard field goal with 16 seconds left and the Redskins snapped a four-game skid and won their first game at home in 13 months.

Haskins scrambled for 11 yards and completed passes of 5 yards to Kelvin Harmon and 17 to Terry McLaurin to set up Hopkins' go-ahead field goal. Cornerback Fabian Moreau's interception of Jeff Driskel — the third thrown by the Lions quarterback — got the Redskins [2-9] the ball back with 2 seconds left and set in motion the weird ending that confused even interim coach Bill Callahan.

Haskins drew criticism for overthrowing McLaurin and other wide-open receivers, and Washington had to settle for a field goal each time. He said his right wrist was pretty banged up, but responded "I'm good" when asked to elaborate.

In his third start since taking over for injured Lions starter Matthew Stafford, Driskel was picked off twice by Moreau and once by Quinton Dunbar. The interception by Dunbar in the final minute hurt the most because it gave Haskins and the Redskins the ball back to win it in regulation.

Undrafted rookie Steven Sims muffed the catch on his kickoff return early in the second quarter. Then he took advantage of the Lions' blown coverage to go 91 yards for a touchdown.

It was Washington's first kick return touchdown since 2015 and another bright spot in a lost season because Sims has shown he can be a difference-maker on offense and special teams.

Redskins cornerback Josh Norman was in uniform but only saw the field on special teams. After multiple reports Sunday morning that he'd be inactive, it was a bit of surprise Norman played at all.

Callahan said he met with defensive coordinator Greg Manusky, secondary coach Ray Horton and Norman on Thursday when the decision was made to demote him. Callahan said it was Norman's choice to be in uniform even though the 31-year-old was only set to play if another injury occurred.

Norman has drawn his share of criticism during a rough season, his fourth since signing a \$75 million, five-year deal with Washington. Manusky said he "couldn't tell you why" Norman has struggled.

Redskins 29, Panthers 21

CHARLOTTE, N.C. [AP] — The Washington Redskins have struggled all season to run the ball and score points.

But veteran running back Adrian Peterson believes the Redskins have finally found “the right recipe” with a two-pronged rushing attack, one they used to overpower the Carolina Panthers on Sunday.

Derrius Guice racked up 129 yards and two touchdowns on the ground, Peterson ran for 99 yards and a score and the Redskins made a late goal-line stand to secure a 29-21 victory over the Panthers for their second straight victory.

The Redskins piled up 248 yards rushing and scored a season high in points.

Guice, who had only 74 yards rushing and no touchdown in his entire NFL career coming in, averaged 12.9 yards per carry against a Carolina defense that came into the game ranked 27th in the league against the run.

Peterson likes the shared approach, calling it “relaxing.”

The Panthers' (5-7) fourth straight loss could put coach Ron Rivera's job in jeopardy.

The Redskins spotted the Panthers a 14-0 lead after quarterback Kyle Allen opened the game 8 of 8 passing for 106 yards with touchdown passes to wide receivers Curtis Samuel and D.J. Moore on Carolina's first two possessions.

But what looked like a Carolina rout quickly turned.

The Redskins upped the pressure on Allen and the Panthers, forcing eight punts and an interception on the next nine possessions. Washington limited the Panthers to 65 yards on those nine drives and neutralized Christian McCaffrey, holding the NFL's leader in yards from scrimmage to 102 total yards, well below his season average.

Allen broke the string when he scrambled for a 17-yard touchdown with 1:51 left to cut the lead to 29-21.

Then, after most of the Carolina fans had left the stadium, the Panthers executed a perfect onside kick with Jermaine Carter recovering near midfield to give Allen one more chance. The second-year QB moved the Panthers to the 1-yard line, but Washington stopped Carolina on four straight downs with Chris Odum sacking Allen after a 23-yard loss and Nate Orchard recovering the loose ball giving the Redskins their first win here since 1998. Both Odum and Orchard were signed to the active roster earlier this week.

This was the fourth time this season the Panthers have reached an opponent's 3-yard line needing a touchdown for the tying or go-ahead score, but come away with nothing with the game on the line.

As in the previous three, it was McCaffrey who was stopped short of the goal line — this time on first and second down in the final seconds. The Panthers tried to throw on third and fourth down but Allen eventually was sacked and fumbled, ending the drive.

GREEN BAY, Wis. [AP] — Aaron Jones rushed for a season-high 134 yards and a touchdown on just 16 carries, Aaron Rodgers threw for 195 yards and the Green Bay Packers did enough to beat the Washington Redskins 20-15 Sunday.

Jones had his third 100-yard rushing game of the season and hauled in six catches for 58 yards. With fewer than 3 minutes left in the game, the third-year running back had more total yards (192) than the Redskins (187).

Dwayne Haskins completed 16 of 27 passes for 170 yards and a touchdown with an interception for Washington (3-10), which was officially eliminated from playoff contention. The rookie quarterback was sacked four times.

Adrian Peterson became just the sixth back in NFL history to reach the 14,000-yard mark, running for 76 yards and a score. He now has 14,036 yards in a 13-year career. Curtis Martin is fifth all-time with 14,101 yards.

Derrius Guice exited after only five carries with a knee injury.

Kenny Clark and Kyler Fackrell combined for a sack of Haskins on Washington's opening drive for an 11-yard loss. Haskins and the Redskins started the day with three straight 3-and-outs in the franchise's first-ever December trip to Lambeau Field.

Jones scored from 4 yards out on the Packers' opening drive. It was Jones' 12th rushing touchdown and 15th TD of the season. Rodgers found Robert Tonyan for a 12-yard touchdown on Green Bay's other first-quarter score.

Haskins led Washington on an 11-play, 95-yard drive that was capped by a 2-yard score by Peterson with 3:44 to play in the first quarter. Dustin Hopkins missed the extra point.

Green Bay (10-3) led 14-6 at halftime.

After Mason Crosby's field goal, Hopkins nailed a 52-yarder to cut it to 17-9 before the end of the third.

Crosby was good on a 33-yard attempt with 2:34 to go to seal the win.

Haskins linked up with Terry McLaurin on a 13-yard score late. Haskins was stopped by Blake Martinez on the two-point conversion.

Eagles 37, Redskins 27

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) —

Carson Wentz recovered from a disastrous fumble by leading a 75-yard, go-ahead scoring drive and throwing his third touchdown pass of the day to keep the Philadelphia Eagles' NFC East hopes on track with a 37-27 victory at the Washington Redskins on Sunday.

Wentz threw TD passes to running back Miles Sanders, tight end Zach Ertz and receiver Greg Ward and was 30 of 43 for 266 yards. The 4-yard pass from Wentz to Ward with 26 seconds left put Philadelphia up for good and electrified a stadium full of green-clad Eagles fans.

Wentz's ability to bounce back from some accuracy issues and a turnover means the Eagles (7-7) are still in the thick of the division race with a game against the division rival Dallas Cowboys coming next week.

Of course, Wentz didn't do it by himself. Sanders rushed for 122 yards and a touchdown and caught six passes for 50 yards. The Eagles' defense that struggled to stop Washington's Dwayne Haskins most of the afternoon got him to fumble for a touchdown by Nigel Bradham on the game's final play.

Coming off an overtime victory against Eli Manning and the New York Giants, a loss to Washington (3-11) could've had the Eagles facing elimination next week. Allowing an early 75-yard TD pass from Haskins to Terry McLaurin and falling behind 7-3, 14-10, 21-17 and 27-24 made that a distinct possibility.

Instead, Wentz was able to work some magic when it mattered most.

PETERSON TIES PAYTON

Adrian Peterson's 10-yard touchdown early in the fourth quarter gave him 110 for his career and tied him with Walter Payton for fourth on the all-time list. Peterson had 16 carries for 66 yards.

Giants 41, Redskins 35

LANDOVER, Md. [AP] — Daniel Jones put together the best performance of his rookie season fresh off an ankle injury, throwing for 352 yards and five touchdown passes in the New York Giants' 41-35 overtime victory against the Washington Redskins on Sunday.

Jones was 28 of 42 in his first action since missing the past two games with a sprained right ankle. He tossed two TDs to Kaden Smith — including the game-winner — and also connected with Sterling Shepard, Saquon Barkley and Cody Latimer. His career-best fifth TD pass, 3 yards to Smith, came with 4:15 left in overtime after the Redskins [3-12] tied it in the final minute of regulation.

Barkley was the perfect complement for Jones and tormented a Redskins secondary missing several regulars. He was responsible for 279 total yards: 189 rushing and 90 receiving and a score each way.

The trio of Jones, Barkley and Shepard showed further evidence that whoever is running the Giants [4-11] next season has talented building blocks to work with on offense, along with a high draft pick.

With the loss, the Redskins moved into the driver's seat to draft Ohio State pass rusher Chase Young.

The Chase Young Bowl was a showcase of prolific playmaking and porous defense. Barkley ran for 108 yards on his first four carries, while Redskins quarterback Dwayne Haskins was 12 of 15 for 133 yards and two TD passes before injuring his left ankle on the first play of the second half.

Veteran Case Keenum relieved Haskins and threw his first passes since Oct. 24, when he was concussed at Minnesota. He was 16 of 22 for 158 yards and rushed for the tying score with 29 seconds left in the fourth.

With and without Haskins, the Redskins offense similarly showed off some young weapons to entice a strong coaching candidate. Undrafted free agent receiver Steven Sims caught two TD passes, and third-round steal Terry McLaurin had seven receptions for 86 yards.

Cowboys 47, Redskins 16

ARLINGTON, Texas. [AP] — Jason Garrett says he doesn't know if he'll be coach of the Dallas Cowboys next year, and owner Jerry Jones won't even acknowledge that there's a decision to make regarding the leadership of an underachieving club.

The mystery of a team that sagged under the weight of high expectations now becomes the mystery of what happens to a coach who has an expiring contract and never took the Cowboys beyond the divisional round of the playoffs in nine full seasons.

The Cowboys were eliminated from the postseason despite a 47-16 win over Washington on Sunday because Philadelphia won the NFC East by beating the New York Giants.

Dallas [8-8] lost control of its postseason fate with a 17-9 loss to the Eagles last week. Now the fate of Garrett is in the hands of Jones.

Dak Prescott threw four touchdown passes, three of them to Michael Gallup, while falling 1 yard short of Tony Romo's club record of 4,903 yards passing in a season. Dallas could have made the playoffs without a winning record for the third time in franchise history. Instead, the Eagles won the division for the second time in three years by beating the Giants 34-17.

Case Keenum had a TD toss as the Redskins [3-13] secured the No. 2 pick in the draft in what could be their final game under interim coach Bill Callahan. The former Dallas assistant replaced Jay Gruden, fired in October with Washington at 0-5.

About the time the Cowboys put away the Redskins on Prescott's second TD pass to Gallup for a 37-16 lead late in the third quarter, Philadelphia went up 10 with a TD after the Giants lost a fumble at their 2-yard line.

In Gallup's first career game with multiple touchdowns, the second-year player had five catches for 98 yards.

Ezekiel Elliott, who helped fuel Super Bowl hopes by signing a \$90 million extension to end a long holdout days before the opener, had a 32-yard touchdown run and a 13-yard scoring catch.

The Cowboys won their first three games after Elliott signed the big contract, but lost eight of the next 12 to put their postseason fate in the hands of the Eagles.

Dallas was hoping to build on the first playoff win for Prescott and Elliott last season before a divisional-round loss to the Los Angeles Rams that ended the club's 23rd consecutive season without reaching the NFC championship game.

It's the fourth time in Garrett's nine full seasons that Dallas has finished .500. The first three ran consecutively from 2011-13, with the Cowboys losing the finale each time when a win would have put them in the playoffs.
