Shane Steichen enters his second season as the offensive coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles after originally joining the team in 2021.

In his first year with the Eagles, Steichen coordinated the league’s most productive rushing offense, as Philadelphia ranked first in the NFL with a franchise record in rushing yards (2,715). The Eagles also led the league in explosive plays (163) and ranked fourth in third-down percentage (team-record 45.7 pct.) and fifth in giveaways (16).

Steichen played an integral role in the growth of first-time starter **Ja-len Hurts**, who combined for 3,928 yards and 26 touchdowns. Hurts, one of just eight quarterbacks in NFL history to register 3,000 passing yards (3,144) and 750 rushing yards (784) in a season, also became the youngest Eagles quarterback to ever start in a playoff game. In addition, Steichen guided wide receiver **DeVonta Smith** to a franchise rookie record in receiving yards (916) and helped **Lane Johnson** and **Jason Kelce** earn All-Pro recognition.

Before coming to Philadelphia, Steichen spent the previous seven seasons (2014-20) with the Los Angeles/San Diego Chargers. During that period, he worked alongside Eagles head coach **Nick Sirianni**.

In 2020, Steichen’s first full season as the Chargers’ offensive coordinator, Los Angeles registered the ninth-ranked offense in the league, averaging 382.1 yards per game. Steichen’s unit allowed the fourth-fewest giveaways (16, tied) in the NFL and ranked sixth in passing yards per game (270.6) as well as ninth in third-down efficiency (44.2 pct.).

Under Steichen’s tutelage, quarterback **Justin Herbert** was voted 2020 PFWA Rookie of the Year after completing 396-of-595 attempts (66.6 pct.) for 4,336 yards, 31 TDs, 10 INTs and a 98.3 passer rating. He set NFL rookie records in completions and passing touchdowns, while producing the second-most passing yards by a rookie in league history, trailing only **Andrew Luck** in 2012 (4,374). In total, Herbert recorded top-10 finishes in completions (fourth), passing yards (sixth) and passing touchdowns (10th). He also helped guide wide receiver **Keenan Allen** to the Pro Bowl after ranking seventh in the NFL with 100 catches for 992 yards and eight touchdowns.

Steichen assumed the Chargers’ offensive coordinator duties in an interim capacity in 2019. For the final eight contests, he directed an offense that ranked fifth in the league in total yards per game (384.3), sixth in passing yards per game (272.1) and seventh in third-down conversions (42.7 pct.).

Prior to becoming offensive coordinator, Steichen served as the Chargers’ quarterbacks coach from 2016-19. In that span, **Philip Rivers** earned three straight Pro Bowls following the 2016-18 seasons and ranked second in passing yards (17,824) and fourth in completions (1,446) and touchdown passes (116). In 2017, Los Angeles led the NFL in passing (276.9 ypg) and Rivers totaled the league’s second-most passing yards (4,515), behind **Tom Brady** (4,577). He also threw for 4,386 yards and 33 touchdowns (second-most in his career) during the 2016 season.

From 2014-15, Steichen was an offensive quality control coach for the Chargers, working primarily with the wide receivers. In 2014, San Diego saw four players, including three wide receivers (Allen, **Eddie Royal** and **Malcolm Floyd**), reach 50-plus receptions for just the fourth time in team history.

Steichen assisted the quarterbacks as an offensive quality control coach with the Cleveland Browns during the 2013 campaign. Despite multiple injuries at the position, three starting quarterbacks (**Jason Campbell**, **Brian Hoyer**, and **Brandon Weeden**) each posted 300-yard passing performances for the first time in franchise history (sixth instance in NFL history).

Steichen first entered the NFL as a defensive assistant with the Chargers (2011-12) after spending one season as a full-time offensive assistant at Louisville (2010). He also worked as a student assistant and offensive graduate assistant at his alma mater, UNLV, where he played quarterback and left as the school’s 12th all-time leading passer.

A native of Sacramento, CA, Steichen earned his degree in journalism and media studies from UNLV. He attended Oak Ridge High School in El Dorado Hills, CA, earning area MVP honors from the Sacramento Bee after leading his squad to a conference sectional title in 2002.

Steichen and his wife, Nina, have a son, Hudson, and a daughter, Stella. Steichen’s older brother, Sean, was a punter at Boise State.
