Kevin Patullo, who enters his fifth year with the Philadelphia Eagles, was promoted to offensive coordinator during the 2025 offseason.

Patullo previously served as the Eagles’ passing game coordinator from 2021-24, including holding the added title and responsibilities of associate head coach for two years (2023-24). During that stretch, Philadelphia’s passing attack ranked second in the league in receiving average (11.7), third in yards per attempt (7.1) and sixth in interception rate (2.0 pct.).

In 2024, Patullo helped an Eagles offense that played a critical role in capturing the **Super Bowl LIX** Championship. Quarterback **Jalen Hurts**, who was named Super Bowl LIX MVP after registering a 119.7 passer rating in the 40-22 victory over the Kansas City Chiefs, tallied career highs in completion percentage (77.3 pct.) and passer rating (103.7) in the regular season. **A.J. Brown** earned second-team All-Pro honors after finishing as the top-graded wide receiver (91.2) by *Pro Football Focus*. Brown, who ranked first in the NFL with a 16.1 receiving average (min. 60 catches), amassed 1,079 receiving yards despite missing three games due to injury, becoming just the second player in franchise history to post three straight seasons with 1,000-plus receiving yards. In addition, wide receiver **DeVonta Smith** led Philadelphia with 68 receptions and a career-high eight receiving touchdowns.

Patullo contributed to the seventh-best scoring offense (25.5 ppg) and eighth-best total offense (354.4 ypg) in the NFL in 2023. With his assistance, Hurts threw for career highs in passing yards (3,858) and passing touchdowns (23) en route to his second career Pro Bowl nod. Brown collected second-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl accolades for the second year in a row after recording 1,456 yards (fifth in the NFL) and seven touchdowns on 106 catches (most by a wide receiver in Eagles history). Smith also logged his second career 1,000-yard campaign with 1,066 receiving yards.

When Philadelphia earned a Super Bowl LVII berth after posting a 14-3 regular-season record in 2022, Patullo aided a passing attack that ranked second in the league in yards per reception (12.1). He also aided the growth of Hurts, who was second in *Associated Press* NFL MVP voting after ranking second in touchdown-to-interception ratio (3.67) and third in passer rating (101.5) and yards per attempt (8.0). Furthermore, Patullo helped Brown eclipse a 38-year club record with a career-best 1,496 receiving yards, while Smith had career highs in catches (95) and receiving yards (1,196).

During his first season with the Eagles in 2021, Patullo helped Hurts become just the eighth quarterback in league history to produce 3,000 passing yards (3,144) and 750 rushing yards (784) in a season. He also saw Smith establish an Eagles rookie record for receiving yards (916).

Prior to Philadelphia, Patullo spent three seasons with the Indianapolis Colts as a pass game specialist (2020) and wide receivers coach (2018-19), working on the same staff as Eagles head coach **Nick Sirianni**.

In 2020, Patullo was a key contributor to the Colts’ offensive success. Indianapolis gave up the second-fewest sacks (21, tied) and third-fewest giveaways (15) in the NFL and ranked ninth in passing yards per attempt (7.6). Quarterback **Philip Rivers** also produced the eighth-highest completion percentage (68.0 pct.) and 10th-most passing yards (4,169) in the league.

During his first season with Indianapolis in 2018, Patullo supported an offense that averaged the sixth-most passing yards per game (278.8) in the NFL. Under his guidance, wide receiver **T.Y. Hilton** combined for 1,270 yards and six touchdowns on 76 receptions (16.7 avg.).

Patullo was a senior offensive analyst at Texas A&M in 2017, working closely with the offensive staff on game planning and offensive strategy.

From 2015-16, Patullo served as the New York Jets’ quarterbacks coach. During the 2015 campaign, Patullo guided **Ryan Fitzpatrick** to a career-high 3,905 passing yards and a career-high, team-record 31 touchdowns.

Before joining the Jets, Patullo served as the assistant wide receivers coach for the Tennessee Titans in 2014. He also spent the 2010-12 seasons as an offensive quality control coach with the Buffalo Bills, including adding assistant wide receivers coach duties in 2012. Patullo started his NFL career with the Kansas City Chiefs as an offensive assistant and quality control coach from 2007-08, including a stint with the team’s wide receivers.

While earning his master’s degree at Arizona, Patullo worked as an offensive graduate assistant from 2004-06. He began his coaching career as an offensive graduate assistant at his alma mater, South Florida (2003-04).

Patullo graduated from South Florida and played quarterback and wide receiver from 1999-2002. He won the Golden Bull Award in 1999 as the program’s outstanding scout team player and was a four-time Academic All-Conference USA selection. Patullo was also a member of the USF Business School Dean’s List from 2001-03, earning a degree in business marketing and graduating in the top 10 percent of his class.

A native of Hillsborough, NJ, Patullo attended Western High School in Weston, FL, where he was selected to compete in the Dade-Broward County All-Star Game as a senior in 1998.

Patullo is married to his wife, Nichole. The couple has a daughter, Lauren, and a son, Logan.
