Brian Johnson enters his third season with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was promoted to offensive coordinator following the 2022 campaign, when the Eagles finished 14-3 en route to a Super Bowl LVII appearance.

Prior to being named offensive coordinator, Johnson coached Philadelphia’s quarterbacks from 2021-22. In that capacity, he played a crucial role in the development of **Jalen Hurts**, who posted the second-highest winning percentage (.733, 22-8) among NFL quarterbacks in that span, trailing only **Patrick Mahomes** (.765, 26-8). During Johnson’s time as the Eagles’ quarterbacks coach, Hurts finished second in *Associated Press* NFL MVP voting and received his first career All-Pro and Pro Bowl accolades.

In 2022, Johnson mentored Hurts to one of the most outstanding seasons in franchise history. Leading Philadelphia to Super Bowl LVII, Hurts became the second-youngest quarterback in league history to win 14 regular-season games, behind **Dan Marino** in 1984 (23 years old). He also ranked second in the NFL in touchdown-to-interception ratio (3.67), third in passer rating (101.5), yards per attempt (8.0) and total yards per game (297.4), and fourth in total touchdowns (35, tied **Randall Cunningham**’s franchise record set in 1990). Additionally, Hurts had the second-most rushing touchdowns (13) ever by a quarterback, trailing only **Cam Newton** in 2011 (14).

In his first full year as a starter in 2021, Hurts became just the eighth quarterback in league history to record 3,000 passing yards (3,144) and 750 rushing yards (784) in a season. The youngest Eagles quarterback to start a playoff game also combined for 26 total touchdowns.

From 2018-20, Johnson enjoyed a highly successful three-year stint at Florida. As the offensive coordinator, Johnson led the Gators to the most prolific passing offense (387.6 ypg) in the FBS while ranking seventh in total offense (509.8 ypg) and eighth in scoring offense (39.8 ppg).

Under Johnson’s direction in 2020, quarterback **Kyle Trask** completed 301-of-437 attempts (68.9 pct.) for 4,283 yards, 43 touchdowns, eight interceptions and a 180.0 efficiency rating, earning Heisman Trophy finalist and second-team All-America honors. The senior signal caller led the entire FBS in touchdown passes and ranked second in completions and passing yards, trailing only Alabama’s **Mac Jones** (311 completions and 4,500 passing yards) in each category. Tight end **Kyle Pitts** thrived in Florida’s offense and collected first-team All-America accolades after pacing all tight ends in receiving yards (770) and receiving touchdowns (12, tied). Wide receiver **Kadarius Toney**, who led the team in catches (70) and receiving yards (984) with 10 touchdowns, also garnered second-team All-America recognition.

In 2019, Johnson helped Florida make a seamless transition with Trask under center after **Feleipe Franks** sustained a season-ending injury. Taking meaningful snaps for the first time in his career, Trask led the Gators to an 8-2 record in games that he started, including a 36-28 victory over No. 24 Virginia in the Orange Bowl, and went 233-of-349 (66.8 pct.) for 2,901 yards, 25 touchdowns, seven interceptions and a 156.1 efficiency rating.

Florida saw sizeable improvement in the Gators’ passing attack during Johnson’s first season as the quarterbacks coach in 2018. Johnson tutored Franks to a breakout season as a sophomore, throwing for 2,457 yards, 24 touchdowns, six interceptions and a 143.3 efficiency rating.

Johnson spent the 2017 season as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Houston and helped the Cougars rank 35th nationally with 436.1 total yards per game.

From 2014-16, Johnson coached the quarterbacks at Mississippi State, where he mentored two players – **Nick Fitzgerald** (3,798 yards in 2016) and **Dak Prescott** (4,435 yards in 2014) – who each led the SEC in total offense. During his first two years with the Bulldogs, Johnson helped Mississippi State post the two highest single-season passing totals in program history.

Johnson was critical to the growth and production of Prescott, who became one of the best quarterbacks in SEC history. A two-time first-team All-SEC honoree, Prescott joined **Tim Tebow** as the only SEC quarterbacks to pass for 8,500 yards and rush for 2,000 yards. He also shattered 38 school records (15 career, 15 single-season, eight single-game).

Prescott was a finalist for the Manning and Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Awards after setting school records in completions (316), completion percentage (66.2 pct.), passing yards (3,793) and efficiency rating (151.7) in 2015. In 2014, he was a finalist for the Davey O’Brien Award (nation’s top quarterback) and ranked eighth in Heisman Trophy voting after breaking school records in total yards, total touchdowns (41) and touchdown passes (27).

Johnson began his coaching career at his alma mater, Utah, and spent four seasons (2010-13) with the Utes. In 2012, he became the youngest FBS offensive coordinator in the nation at just 24 years old after spending two years coaching Utah’s quarterbacks.

A native of Baytown, TX, Johnson was a three-year starter and two-time bowl MVP at Utah and finished with the most wins (26) in school history, including an undefeated 13-0 season during the 2008 campaign. For his career, Johnson threw for 7,853 yards and 57 touchdowns and ran for 848 yards and 12 scores. He gained even more acclaim when EA Sports put him on the cover of its *NCAA Football ’10* video game.

Johnson is married to his wife, Ashley. The couple has three children: Rossi, Harlow, and Pierce.
