

## POST-GAME NOTES PHILADELPHIA EAGLES at WASHINGTON FOOTBALL TEAM January 2, 2022

**WINNING SEASONS:** Philadelphia is guaranteed a winning season for the fourth time since 2017 and 17th time under **Jeffrey Lurie**'s ownership. The Eagles' 17 winning seasons since 1995 are tied for the 5th-most in the league, behind New England (23), Green Bay (20), Indianapolis (19), and Pittsburgh (19\*). The last time Philadelphia registered at least four winning seasons over a five-year span was from 2006-10 under **Andy Reid**.

• Each of Lurie's five head coaching hires (all first-time NFL head coaches) have posted winning seasons within their first two years – **Nick Sirianni** (first, 9-7 in 2021), **Doug Pederson** (second, 13-3 in 2017), **Chip Kelly** (first, 10-6 in 2013), Reid (second, 11-5 in 2000), and **Ray Rhodes** (first, 10-6 in 1995).

**SIRIANNI'S TURNAROUND:** With today's victory over Washington, **Nick Sirianni** became just the fourth rookie head coach in league history to produce a winning season after starting 2-5 or worse through 7 games, joining **Frank Reich** (Indianapolis, 2018), **Mike Mularkey** (Buffalo, 2004), and **Mike Holmgren** (Green Bay, 1992).

- Sirianni's 9 wins are the most by any member of the NFL's 2021 head coach hiring cycle right now (L.A. Chargers' Brandon Staley also entered Week 17 with an 8-7 record). They are the most wins by an Eagles head coach in their first career season as a head coach (NFL or college) since Ray Rhodes in 1995, who finished 10-6 and earned a playoff appearance en route to AP NFL Coach of the Year honors.
- Currently, Reich is the only first-year head coach in NFL history to lead his team to a winning record *and* postseason berth following a 2-5 or worse start through 7 games (Colts opened at 2-5 and finished at 10-6). That season, Sirianni served as an offensive coordinator for the first time on Reich's coaching staff.

**HEATING UP IN DECEMBER:** Philadelphia has won each of its last 4 games, marking the Eagles' longest streak since the final month of the 2019 regular season (12/9/19-12/29/19), when they won 4 straight divisional matchups to earn a postseason berth and NFC East championship. It is tied for Philadelphia's longest streak since winning 9 in a row during the Super Bowl LII-winning campaign in 2017 (9/24/17-12/15/17).

• The Eagles (6-1 record since Week 10) have totaled 6+ victories during a 7-game stretch for the first time since 11/25/18-1/6/19, which includes the Wild Card victory over Chicago. The Eagles are currently tied with Kansas City (6-1), Miami (6-1), and Tampa Bay (6-2) for the most wins in the NFL since Week 10.

**RODNEY TO THE RESCUE:** With 30 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter and Washington approaching a first-and-10 from the PHI 20, **Rodney McLeod** (5 tackles, 1 INT, and 1 PD) registered a game-saving INT in the end zone on a pass from QB **Taylor Heinicke** intended for TE **John Bates** to seal Philadelphia's 20-16 victory.

McLeod, who is one of only two NFL safeties with 10+ INTs (16) and 10+ FFs (11) since 2013 (also Malcolm Jenkins), has produced INTs in back-to-back games for the first time since 11/3/19-11/24/19. His 2 INTs this season are tied for his most since 2017, when he totaled a career-high-tying 3 INTs.

**BOSTON "TD" PARTY: Boston Scott** produced his 3rd career game with multiple rushing TDs (also 2 TDs on 10/31/21 at Detroit and 3 TDs on 12/29/19 at N.Y. Giants). He led the Eagles with 86 scrimmage yards (2nd-highest total of the year), totaling 47 yards and 2 TDs on the ground and catching a season-high 4 passes for 39 yards.

• Scott, who has registered rushing TDs in each of the last 2 games (has produced a career-high 7 rushing TDs this season, which are the most by an Eagles RB since **Ryan Mathews** in 2016 (8).

**EAGLES RUSHING RECORDS:** Following today's 118-yard rushing performance, Philadelphia has now produced 2,566 rushing yards this season, which is tied with 2013 for the 2nd-highest total in single-season team history. Heading into the 2021 finale, the Eagles are only 42 yards shy of breaking their 1949 record (2,607).

- Additionally, with Boston Scott's pair of rushing scores today, Philadelphia has totaled the 3rd-most rushing TDs (24) in Eagles single-season history, trailing only the 1945 (26) and 1949 (25) campaigns.
- The Eagles have rushed for 100+ yards in 11 consecutive games, which is the longest active streak in the NFL as well as the team's longest streak since a 19-game stretch from 11/7/10-11/20/11.

**HURTS SO GOOD: Jalen Hurts** completed 17-of-26 (65.4%) attempts for 214 yards (8.2 avg.) and a 90.9 passer rating and added 44 yards on 7 carries (6.3 avg.) in today's victory. Hurts' 3,928 offensive yards are the 6th-most by

any Eagles QB since the 2000 season, trailing only **Carson Wentz** in 2019 (4,282), **Donovan McNabb** in 2004 (4,095), 2008 (4,063) and 2000 (3,987), and Wentz again in 2016 (3,932).

**ELLIOTT'S IMPACT:** Jake Elliott finished the game converting 2-of-2 FGs (42 and 41 yards) as well as 2-of-2 PATs for 8 points. He kicked a 42-yard, game-winning FG in the fourth quarter with 11:41 remaining to give the Eagles a 17-16 advantage. His 126 points this season are the 7th-most in single-season franchise history.

**SMITTY CLOSES IN ON D-JAX: DeVonta Smith** (3 catches for 54 yards) leads the Eagles in receptions (61), receiving yards (875) and receiving TDs (5) this season. He is now only 38 yards shy of breaking **DeSean Jackson**'s franchise rookie record for receiving yards set in 2008 (912). He has also produced the 3rd-most receptions in Eagles rookie history, trailing only **Keith Jackson** in 1988 (81) and **Jordan Matthews** in 2014 (67).

**GOEDERT BREAKS 800 RECEIVING YARDS: Dallas Goedert** recorded a team-high 6 receptions for 71 yards in today's win. Goedert now has 830 receiving yards this season, which are the 10th-most ever by an Eagles TE.

**SWEAT SETS CAREER HIGH: Josh Sweat** recorded 1.5 sacks against Washington QB **Taylor Heinicke**, bringing his season total to a career-high 7.5 sacks. Sweat has combined for 4.0 sacks in his last 4 games.

- Sweat's first QB takedown was split with Fletcher Cox, when the two combined to sack Heinicke for a 7-yard loss that forced a second-and-17 situation that removed Washington from the red zone. Cox now has 58.0 career sacks, which are the most ever by an Eagles DT. He also tied Justin Tuck (15.0) for the 3rd-most sacks ever against Washington, behind Lawrence Taylor (19.0) and Michael Strahan (17.0).
- Sweat's 2nd sack came on third-and-6 and resulted in a 9-yard loss that forced a punt.

**KELCE CLIMBS THE CHARTS: Jason Kelce** tied **Guy Morriss** (158, 1973-83) for the 3rd-most games played by an offensive lineman in franchise history, behind **Chuck Bednarik** (169, 1949-62) and **Tra Thomas** (166, 1998-2008). He also started his 121st consecutive regular-season game (longest active streak among NFL centers).
