## PHILADELPHIA EAGLES (4-0) VS. ARIZONA CARDINALS (2-2) State Farm Stadium | October 9, 2022 | 1:25 PM



### THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Cardinals challenging early-season gauntlet continues this week as they host the Philadelphia Eagles at State Farm Stadium on Sunday. It will mark the fourth game vs. a 2021 playoff team so far this season - and the Eagles enter the contest as the NFL's lone undefeated team.



This game comes with no shortage of storylines. It is a showdown between old foes, who meet for the 119<sup>th</sup> time during the regular season in a series that dates back to 1935. The Cardinals' 58 regular season wins vs. Philadelphia are more than they have against any other NFL franchise.

Sunday's matchup marks the sixth regular season meeting between the two teams in the last 10 years. Including postseason, the Cardinals have won six of the last eight vs. Philadelphia and enter Sunday's contest having won five consecutive home games against the Eagles.

The most recent of those wins came in Week 15 of the 2020 season when **Kyler Murray** led the Cardinals to a 33-26 victory over the Eagles and then-rookie QB **Jalen Hurts**, who was making just his second NFL start. Both former University of Oklahoma QBs who hail from the state of Texas, Murray and Hurts have developed into two of the league's most exciting young signal-callers.

Although both Murray and Hurts both put up impressive numbers in that 2020 contest (each had 3 passing TDs and a rushing TD), Arizona's defense left its mark on Hurts. The Cardinals defense piled up six sacks in that game, including two by LB **Dennis Gardeck**.

After playing 123 games with the Eagles over nine seasons (2013-21), TE **Zach Ertz** will face his former team for the first time. One of the top pass catchers in franchise history, Ertz set Philadelphia's single-season record for receptions in 2018 (116) and ranks second all-time in career receptions (579). He also scored the game-winning TD in the fourth quarter of the Eagles Super Bowl LII win vs. New England.

Next week the Cardinals are back on the road when they travel to face the division-rival Seahawks in Seattle.

### THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- **Under head coach Kliff Kingsbury, the Cardinals have never lost to a team from the NFC East. Arizona enters Sunday's game vs. Philadelphia with a 6-0 record vs. the NFC East dating back to 2019.**
- There are currently three former Oklahoma QBs starting in the NFL: **Kyler Murray**, **Baker Mayfield** (Carolina) and **Jalen Hurts** (Philadelphia). Murray has a combined 4-0 record against Mayfield (3-0) and Hurts (1-0).
- **When DL Zach Allen - a star of last week's win at Carolina - last faced the Eagles (Week 15 of 2020) he had 11 tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss, a QB hit and a pass defended. He joined NE's Willie McGinest (12/20/03 at NY Jets) and TB's Warren Sapp (8/31/97 vs. SF) as the only NFL defensive lineman ever to have at least 11 tackles, a sack and a pass defended in a game.**

# CARDS CELEBRATE VIOLET BIDWILL AND THE 1947 CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM

## VIOLET BIDWILL TAKES THE REINS

The 2022 season marks the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Cardinals historic 1947 season. It was a year in which **Violet Bidwill** made league history and one that ultimately ended in the team winning an NFL Championship over the Eagles.

The Cardinals suffered a big loss when team owner **Charles W. Bidwill** - having just recently assembled his "Dream Backfield" with the unprecedented signing of All-American running back Charley Trippi - passed away in April. He had run the franchise since purchasing it in 1933 and was credited with pulling the team - and on a larger scale the NFL - through the Great Depression.

### THE NFL'S FIRST FEMALE OWNER

**With the passing of Charles, his wife, Violet Bidwill - while raising the couple's two teenage sons Stormy (18) and William (16) - took over as team owner. It was a historic moment, as she became the first female owner in NFL history and one of the first females to serve as a primary owner in professional sports.**

"She was a wonderful person and was in a tough situation with losing her husband at a young age," Violet's grandson, current Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill**, said. "She decided she would take over the family businesses."

"Things worked out well," then-team president Ray Benningson said of the front office under Violet. "I ran the business end of it, (head coach) Jimmy (Conzelman) ran the team on the field and we both appreciated Vi's (Violet) counsel. I'll tell you one thing. She knew her football and she was a shrewd businesswoman."

"She didn't suffer fools, and she was right there in the meetings with the rest of the owners and held her own," said Michael Bidwill.

**Violet Bidwill's first year of ownership saw the franchise win the NFL Championship after defeating the Philadelphia Eagles 28-21 in the Championship Game.**



## MAKING HER MARK IN THE NFL

Born on January 10, 1900 in Red Bud, Ill, **Violet Bidwill** was raised by her mother, a waitress, following the death of her father when she was just four years old. Violet met Charles W. Bidwill - a popular Chicago sports figure and future Hall of Fame owner of the Cardinals - in the 1920s and the two were soon married. Even before Charles' death, Violet had a big impact on the Cardinals - and it would turn out the NFL as a whole.

### SIGNIFICANT FIGURE IN NFL HISTORY

**"Why Don't You Sell The Team To Charley?":** In 1932, then-Cardinals owner Dr. David Jones and his wife were dinner guests of the Bidwills. Jones was lamenting the state of his football franchise with Charley and Violet Bidwill, when Mrs. Bidwill asked Jones, "Why don't you sell the Cardinals to Charley?" In the following months, Charley Bidwill - who liked the idea but at the time was a Vice President with the Chicago Bears - and Jones negotiated on a price for the team. In 1933, Bidwill - after divesting himself of his Bears holdings - officially purchased the Chicago Cardinals for \$50,000 on October 24, 1933.



**Violet Refuses To Sell:** With both the Cardinals and Bears sharing the city of Chicago, Violet was approached repeatedly by various groups of businessmen with lucrative offers to buy the team. Although quiet by nature, Violet was well-known for her business acumen. Long before the league came to dominate the sports landscape in America, she believed strongly in maintaining control of the Cardinals and in the future of the NFL. "She wouldn't say much," said former Cardinals treasurer Charley Shea, "but when you sat down to discuss a business matter with her, that's when you realized how much she knew."

**Creating A Legacy Of Inclusion:** As the first female owner in NFL history, Violet Bidwill forged her own path in a male dominated industry. Her experiences greatly influenced her sons, especially future owner Bill Bidwill. During his tenure as owner, Bill Bidwill became a pioneer in the hiring of women and minorities.

"She shaped my father's life in a very meaningful way," **Michael Bidwill** said of his late father. "He grew up with a female owner of the team and he didn't look at women any differently than men and he didn't look at color of skin or diversity, equity, or inclusion as anything besides normal. He was way ahead of his time. I think he was shaped by seeing a woman run a business in an exclusively male-run industry, except for her. He had a perspective for seeing people on their merit. And his imprint on me was clear and I've tried to continue that legacy, but it all started with Violet."

## CARDS TAKE DOWN EAGLES IN TITLE GAME

NFL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME  
CARDINALS 28, Eagles 21

The Cardinals had beaten the Eagles 45-21 during the regular season and had a strategy designed to exploit Philadelphia's 5-2-4 defense. The Cardinals led all the way, scoring a touchdown in every quarter. They held Philadelphia's Steve Van Buren, the league's leading rusher, to 26 yards on the ground while Chicago's **Elmer Angsman** gained a total of 159 yards on the ground. Angsman and **Charley Trippi** each scored a pair of TDs for the Cardinals - including three that covered 40+ yards (44, 70 and 75 yards).

Midway through the opening quarter, on an icy field, the Cardinals double-teamed the Eagles defensive guard and sent Trippi roaring up the middle. Since there was no middle linebacker in the Philadelphia defense, Trippi went 44 yards for the TD.

The Cardinals scored again in the second quarter on another quick opener through the Eagles defense, when Angsman scored on a 10-yard run. Just before the half, Eagles quarterback Tommy Thompson's 70-yard TD pass to Pat McHugh made the score 14-7 going into intermission.

The Cardinals offense stalled early in the third quarter and the Eagles hoped to climb back into the game, but a 75-yard punt return by Trippi made the score 21-7. A Van Buren 1-yard touchdown run cut the Cardinals lead to 21-14 with 0:08 left in the third but Angsman's 70-yard run in the fourth quarter put the Cardinals up 28-14. The Eagles responded with a one-yard Russ Craft TD run, cutting the Cardinals lead to just seven points with just under five minutes remaining in the fourth quarter. However, the Cardinals got the ball back and converted three first downs that covered 40 yards, consuming the remaining time on the clock and securing the Championship.

## CARDS VS. EAGLES - AN 86 YEAR OLD RIVALRY

This week's game between the Cardinals and Eagles marks the 119<sup>th</sup> all-time regular season meeting between the two teams. The Cards lead the series 58-55-5. Arizona and Philadelphia have also met three times in the postseason - including in title games in 1947 and 1948 - with the Cardinals holding a 2-1 edge in those matchups.

The rivalry dates back to 1935, when the Cardinals defeated the Eagles 12-3 in front of 6,000 fans at Wrigley Field in Chicago in the first-ever meeting between the teams. The Cardinals and Eagles met at least once every season between 1947 and 2001, including twice annually from 1970-01 as members of the NFC East.

The Cardinals 58 regular season wins vs. Philadelphia are more than they have against any other NFL franchise.

Cardinals Director of Player Personnel **Dru Grigson** was a volunteer scout for the Eagles from 2005-06.

Cardinals Senior Vice President, Media Relations **Mark Dalton** is a West Chester, PA native and Temple University graduate. He was a member of the Eagles public relations staff from 1991-94.

Cardinals Senior Vice President, Business Development **Steve Ryan** was the Director of Corporate Sales for the Eagles for six seasons (1998-2003).

**Mark Whipple**, the father of Cardinals Co-Pass Game Coordinator **Spencer Whipple**, was an offensive assistant for the Eagles in 2008.

## TOUCHDOWNS FEED MORE

The Ertz Family Foundation (**Zach and Julie Ertz**) and The Athletes' Corner have teamed up again to fight hunger through the on-field performance of the Cardinals. The two foundations are running back their **Score More n' Feed More** initiative to help provide meals to Arizona food banks for every TD the Cardinals score this season.

Last year, the **Score More n' Feed More** initiative helped provide a total of 150,000 meals to food banks in Arizona. **This year, Zach and Julie are personally raising the bar, by pledging to help provide 500,000 meals to food banks via the Score More n' Feed More initiative.**



**Score More n' Feed More** launched in Week 3 and will last the duration of the 2022 season.

"Julie and I are proud to provide 500,000 meals this season with The Athletes' Corner," Ertz said of the initiative. "We are passionate about doing all we can to support the children and families who are affected by food insecurity in our home state of Arizona, and we are excited to support as many people as possible."

The 2022 season is the third in which the Ertz Family Foundation has partnered with The Athletes' Corner to help fight hunger. In the first two years of the program, the partnership resulted in a total of 1.4 million meals being provided to families in need with the help of Feeding America.

The Ertz Family Foundation and The Athletes' Corner have a goal to help provide over 1 million meals this season through the initiative.

## MURRAY AND HURTS MEET AGAIN

Sunday's game between the Cardinals and Eagles will be the second meeting between Arizona QB **Kyler Murray** and Philadelphia QB **Jalen Hurts**.



Both former Oklahoma signal-callers, Murray and Hurts first faced each other in Week 15 of 2020 when Murray led the Cardinals to a 33-26 victory in Hurts' second NFL start. **The game was a shootout in which the two combined for 836 total yards and 8 TDs.**

### MURRAY AND HURTS TAKE SIMILAR PATHS TO NFL

Both QBs played high school football in Texas. Murray led Allen High School (near Dallas) to a perfect 43-0 record and earned National Player of the Year honors from Gatorade, Parade and USA Today. Hurts was ESPN's top-ranked dual-threat QB in the state at Channelview High School (near Houston).

After beginning their college careers elsewhere, both had breakout campaigns at Oklahoma before entering the NFL draft in back-to-back seasons. In 2018, Murray won the Heisman Trophy before being selected #1 overall by the Cardinals. In 2019, Hurts finished as the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy and was then taken in the second round (53<sup>rd</sup> overall) by Philadelphia in the 2020 NFL Draft.

### MURRAY LOOKS TO IMPROVE TO 5-0 VS. FELLOW SOONER QBs

**Murray is a combined 4-0 against former Oklahoma QBs Baker Mayfield (3-0) and Jalen Hurts (1-0) during his NFL career.**

Murray inherited his starting job at Oklahoma in 2018 following the departure Mayfield. He then passed the starting job to Hurts after leaving for the NFL in 2019.

## A YEAR LATER - ERTZ FACES THE EAGLES

On Sunday - exactly 360 days after the Cardinals acquired him in a trade with the Philadelphia Eagles - TE **Zach Ertz** will face his former team for the first time.

Ertz played 123 games over nine seasons (2013-21) with Philadelphia, who selected him in the second round (35<sup>th</sup> overall) in the 2013 NFL Draft. A three-time Pro Bowl selection (2017-19) and 2018 All-Pro, Ertz totaled 579 receptions for 6,267 yards and 38 TDs with the Eagles. He also played in seven postseason games, catching 33 passes for 360 yards and two TDs.

Some highlights from Ertz's tenure with the Eagles:

- Caught the game-winning TD in Super Bowl LII that gave the Eagles a 38-33 lead with just over two minutes left in regulation.
- Set the NFL single-season record for receptions by a TE with 116 catches in 2018. His 116 catches that season remain an Eagles single-season record.
- His 579 receptions rank second on the Eagles all-time receptions list behind only Hall of Famer Harold Carmichael (589).
- His 6,267 receiving yards rank fifth on the Eagles all-time list behind Carmichael (8,978), Pete Retzlaff (7,412), DeSean Jackson (6,512) and Mike Quick (6,464).



## ZACH AND JULIE PROVIDE A HELPING HAND

Ertz and his wife, **Julie**, continue to have strong ties to Philadelphia through the Ertz Family Foundation, which launched in 2018.

A cornerstone program of the foundation is the House of Hope project. In partnership with Grace Peace Community Fellowship in Philadelphia, the House of Hope was the renovation of a building adjacent to the church that provides area youth a safe place to receive career support, Wi-Fi access, healthy food options, employment support, and financial literacy.

Through their foundation, Zach and Julie also raised funds for numerous area food banks and local charities through their annual Ertz Par-Tee Golf Tournament and Reception, the City of Love Auction Fundraiser and the Score More n' Feed More initiative.



## CRUCIAL CATCH: INTERCEPT CANCER

For the 14<sup>th</sup> consecutive year, the National Football League (NFL) and the American Cancer Society (ACS) are working together to support the fight against cancer through "Crucial Catch: Intercept Cancer."



The initiative, which kicked off in Week 4 and continues through Week 6, addresses early detection and risk reduction efforts across multiple types of cancers.

Since its inception, *Crucial Catch* has placed an emphasis on getting screened and catching cancer early when it may be easier to treat. New this year, through funding provided by the NFL as part of the Crucial Catch initiative, fans and members of the NFL Family will be able to easily find their nearest cancer screening center and additional screening resources at [NFL.com/CrucialCatch](http://NFL.com/CrucialCatch) or by texting "CATCH" to 635635. The site also provides resources for fans to determine the type of cancer screening they need, a cancer hotline and a 24-hour chat for anyone who needs their screening questions answered.

**The NFL has funded the American Cancer Society's Community Health Advocates Implementation Nationwide Grants for Empowerment and Equity (CHANGE) grants since 2012, which have contributed to more than 600,000 screenings in under-resourced communities and reached more than 1.3 million individuals through education, screening reminders and patient navigation.** Some of the services provided this season include providing funding for mobile mammograms, expanding screening services to the uninsured and operations outside of normal business hours, plus rides to those experiencing transportation barriers.

### CARDS HOST EAGLES IN CRUCIAL CATCH GAME

All 32 NFL teams are dedicating one home game during the month of October as their official *Crucial Catch* game. The Cardinals will host their Crucial Catch game presented by Cigna this week when the team faces the Eagles.

NFL-issued *Crucial Catch* gameday apparel will feature a multi-colored logo representing all cancers. New Era and Nike have created newly designed *Crucial Catch* gear, highlighting the NFL's commitment to drawing awareness to and supporting multiple cancer prevention efforts. ## CONNER IS CLOSE TO THE CAUSE

Pro Bowl RB **James Conner** is in his second season with the Cardinals in 2021 following a four-year run with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Years before his NFL career began, Conner's life - and football future - received a major scare when he was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma in 2015.

Conner was coming off a remarkable sophomore season at the University of Pittsburgh where he earned 1<sup>st</sup>-team All-American, 1<sup>st</sup>-team All-ACC and ACC Player of the Year honors after rushing for 1,765 yards and 26 TDs on 298 carries. His 26 TDs set an ACC single-season record.



However, just eight carries into his junior season Conner tore his MCL in the season-opener. It was during rehab that the injury helped save his life.

While rehabbing Conner began experiencing excessive fatigue and couldn't sleep, leading doctors to perform a chest x-ray that revealed the tumors around his heart. "The doctor told me I had about a week left," Conner said. "He said, 'You got about a week.' If you didn't get this treated, you had about a week at the rate it was growing."

While still rehabbing his knee, Conner endured 12 rounds of chemotherapy and on May 23, 2016 he announced that he was cancer free. He returned to Pitt for his senior season and was drafted by the Steelers in the third round of the 2017 NFL draft.

Sunday's contest vs. Philadelphia is the first of two regular season games in which the team will wear the alternate helmet.

## CARDS JOIN INTERNATIONAL FLAG INITIATIVE

The Cardinals are participating in the NFL's International Flag Decal initiative that allows players from across the league to wear an international flag decal alongside the American flag decal on their helmets in Weeks 4-5 of the 2022 season to celebrate players' nationalities and heritage.

There are 10 Cardinals players - representing eight different countries - participating: **Kyler Murray** (South Korea), **Will Hernandez** and **Max Garcia** (Mexico), **Marco Wilson** (Puerto Rico), **Leki Fotu** (Tonga), **Michael Dogbe** and **Victor Dimukeje** (Nigeria), **Tanner Vallejo** (Ecuador), **Jesse Luketa** (Canada) and **Bernhard Seikovits** (Austria).

"I'm proud to play with the flag of South Korea on my helmet," said Kyler Murray. "It's a great way to honor my mom, honor my heritage and highlight the diverse backgrounds that make up the NFL."

Participating Cardinals players began wearing their new international flag decals on their helmets at practice last week and will continue to showcase their respective flag through this week's game vs. the Philadelphia Eagles at State Farm Stadium.

There are over 200 athletes, coaches and executives across the NFL representing more than 50 nations in the player-led initiative that will help support the growth of football around the world. Athletes can choose to wear the flag of an international nation if they lived in that country for two years or more, or have a parent or grandparent who were born there.



## BY THE NUMBERS

Combined passes defended for DL Zach Allen (4) and DL J.J. Watt (3) this season. They are both among just seven NFL D-Linemen with at least three passes defended in 2022. Allen is tied with Carolina's Derrick Brown for the NFL lead among D-Linemen.

**28**

QB hits for DL Zach Allen in 36 career games. Half of those (14) have come in his last nine games played.

**11**

Tackles for Allen in his only career game vs. the Eagles (Week 15 of 2020). He finished the game with 11 tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss and a pass defended. Allen joined New England's Willie McGinest (12/20/03 at NYJ) and Tampa Bay's Warren Sapp (8/31/97 vs. SF) as the only NFL D-Linemen ever to have at least 11 tackles, a sack and a pass defended in a game.

Tackles for second-year LB Zaven Collins this season. He has more tackles in four games this season than he had in 17 games as a rookie in 2021 (25).



Last week, the Cardinals earned their first road win vs. the Panthers since the 2008 postseason and their first regular season road win since 2002.

**WEEK 2 WIN IN VEGAS WAS A WILD ONE**

Arizona's Week 2 win at Las Vegas resulted in one of the biggest comeback wins in franchise history.

**The Cardinals trailed 20-0 at halftime and came from behind to earn the OT victory. It marked just the fifth time in franchise history - and first time since 1999 - Arizona overcame a deficit of 20+ points to win a game.**

**ALLEN CONTINUES HIS RAPID ASCENT**

DL Zach Allen had perhaps the best game of his career in the Cardinals victory over Carolina, **finishing with six tackles, a sack, a career-high three passes defended, two QB hits and a tackle for loss.**

**It was a rare performance for a player at his position. Prior to Allen, the last Cardinals defensive lineman to have at least three passes defended in a single game was Andre Wadsworth (3) on 9/19/99 vs. Miami.**

The performance vs. the Panthers was the continuation of Allen's ascension dating back to last season. Last week's game was the 36<sup>th</sup> of Allen's career. A look at his first 21 career games compared to his last 15:

- 8** consisted of 5 plays or fewer
- 9** consisted of 1 first down or fewer
- 7** gained fewer than 10 net yards
- 1** covered more than 40 yards
- 5** consisted of 0 first downs
- 3** resulted in turnovers

**With the Cardinals trailing 10-3 at halftime, Arizona's defense held the Carolina offense to just 16 total net yards, one first down and 12 total plays in their first four drives of the second half combined. During that stretch, the Cardinals scored 23 unanswered points to take a 26-10 lead.**

**FRONT SEVEN GETS THE JOB DONE**

Players on the Cardinals front seven - consisting of the D-Line and LBs - **combined for 35 tackles, 2.0 sacks, an INT, seven passes defended, three tackles for loss, three QB hits and a fumble recovery in the win over the Panthers last week.**

**Arizona had a pair of D-linemen put up multiple passes defended: Zach Allen (3) and J.J. Watt (2). It marked the first time since at least 1994 the Cardinals had multiple D-Linemen with 2+ passes defended in a single game.**

Allen and Watt became the first set of D-Line teammates to each have multiple passes defended in a game since New Orleans' Cameron Jordan (2) and Alex Okafor (2) on 10/15/17 vs. Detroit.

**Allen (4) and Watt (3) are both among the seven D-Linemen in the NFL this season with at least three passes defended.**

**ENO PULLS TRIPLE DUTY IN CAROLINA**

Like he did in each of the first three games this season, RB **Eno Benjamin** served as both a RB and kickoff returner in last Sunday's win over the Panthers. **After K Matt Prater was forced from the game in the fourth quarter due to a hip injury, Benjamin added kickoffs to his job duties in Carolina. He kicked off following all three of the Cardinals fourth quarter scoring drives.**



**Benjamin became the first Cardinals player in the Super Bowl era to have a rush attempt, reception, a kickoff return and a kickoff in the same game.** He was the first NFL player to do so since Atlanta's Keith Jones on 11/12/89 at San Francisco.

**Prior to Benjamin, the last non-specialist to kick off for the Cardinals was S Pat Tillman on 12/15/01 at the N.Y. Giants following a knee injury to K Bill Gramatica. Benjamin and Tillman are the last two Arizona State players drafted by the Cardinals.**

## BROWN CLIMBS RECEIVING LEADERBOARDS

**WR Marquise Brown caught six passes for a game-high 88 yards against the Panthers, including a remarkable 23-yard TD catch in the fourth quarter. Brown - who established a career high with 14 catches in Week 3 vs. the Rams - now has 30 receptions in 2022.**

**Only two players in franchise history had more receptions through the first four games of a season.**



## GARDECK'S BIG GAME - AND OTHER WEEK 4 NOTES

LB Dennis Gardeck totaled two tackles, a sack, an INT, a tackle for loss and a pass defended in last week's win at Carolina.

His INT - which he returned 24 yards to the CAR 5-yard line - was the first of his NFL career and first since his sophomore year at West Virginia State in 2015.

**Gardeck became just the seventh player in the NFL this season to have a sack and INT in the same game.**

### A FEW OTHER WEEK 4 NOTES

**S JALEN THOMPSON:** Recorded his first INT of the season when he picked off a Baker Mayfield pass at the AZ 18-yard line in the second quarter last Sunday. **After recording one INT in his first 29 career games, Thompson now has four in his last 12 games played.** Last week's game was Thompson's second career outing vs. the Panthers. He has an INT in both contests.

**LB ZAVEN COLLINS:** The second-year LB - selected by the Cardinals in the first round (16<sup>th</sup> overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft - established a career high with 8 tackles in the Cardinals victory over the Raiders in Week 2. He matched that total in Carolina, leading the team with 8 tackles, including a career-high 6 solo tackles. **So far this season, Collins has 27 tackles (19 solo), two tackles for loss and a forced fumble. He already has more tackles in four games this season (27) than he had 17 games as a rookie last season (25).**



## WATT BRINGS BACK THE PRESSURE

After missing the season-opener, DL J.J. Watt returned in Week 2 and **in his three games played this season he has six tackles, 2.0 sacks, two tackles for loss, two QB pressures and three passes defended.**

**Last week in Carolina, Watt finished with three tackles and two passes defended, one of which was a deflection that led to the INT by LB Dennis Gardeck in the fourth quarter.**

His return has made a big impact. **Despite having played in just three games, Watt is one of just four defenders in the NFL this season with 2.0+ sacks and 3+ passes defended.**



Playing his first regular season game since Week 7 of 2021, Watt tallied two tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss, a QB hit and pass defended in the win over the Raiders in Week 2.

**He followed that performance with another sack in Week 3 vs. the Rams. Watt has 2.0 sacks in three games played this season and 3.0 sacks in his last five regular season games played.**

**His sacks vs. the Raiders and Rams gave him a sack in back-to-back games for the first time since Games 4-5 of the 2019 season.**



## CARDS HISTORIC COMEBACK IN VEGAS

### A LOOK AT HOW IMPROBABLE THE WIN WAS

- Prior to the victory over the Raiders in Week 2, the Cardinals had never won a game when trailing by 20+ points at halftime.
- **Including postseason, Arizona was 0-88-1 in games they faced a halftime deficit of at least 20 points prior to last week.**
- **The Cardinals (down 20-0) and Dolphins (down 28-7) each faced halftime deficits of 20+ points and came back to win in Week 2. It was the first time in NFL history that two teams overcame 20-point halftime deficits to win on the same day.**
- Down 16 points with just 12:07 remaining in regulation, the Cardinals scored TDs - and converted a pair of two-point attempts - on their final two drives. Those two drives combined for 26 plays, 127 net yards and 12 first downs.
- **Arizona became the first team in NFL history to score a TD on the last play of regulation, execute a two-point conversion to force OT, then go on to win in OT.**



### KYLER DIRECTS THE COMEBACK

**QB Kyler Murray put on a historic performance in leading the Cardinals second half comeback over the Raiders. In the second half/OT, he completed 25-of-40 pass attempts for 224 yards and a TD, while also rushing for 28 yards and a TD on five carries. He also ran for an unforgettable two-point conversion and threw for another.**



**He became the first player in NFL history to have a passing TD, rushing TD, a two-point conversion pass and a two-point conversion run in the same game.**

On his remarkable two-point conversion run that lasted nearly 21 seconds, he ran a total distance of 84.9 yards according to NFL Next Gen Stats.

**In the second half/OT, Murray accounted for 16 of the Cardinals 20 first downs. He threw for 11 first downs and all five of his rushing attempts resulted in first downs.**

### MURPHY WINS IT WITH A LONG RETURN

The score that won it in OT for the Cardinals in Las Vegas was a 59-yard fumble return TD by CB **Byron Murphy, Jr.** On a 2<sup>nd</sup>-n-10 play from the AZ 39-yard line, Raiders WR Hunter Renfrow caught a one-yard pass when LB **Isaiah Simmons** laid a hard hit that forced the ball loose. Murphy picked up the fumble and returned it for the game-winning TD.



**Murphy's 59-yard return is the longest OT fumble return TD in NFL history (regular season or postseason) - and just the second-ever of 50+ yards.**

**Murphy's TD was just the second OT fumble return TD in franchise history - and the first-ever during the regular season.** The only other OT fumble return TD in franchise history was LB Karlos Dansby's 17-yarder off an Aaron Rodgers fumble in the 51-45 victory vs. Green Bay in the 2009 NFC Wild Card matchup.

### MURPHY AND MURRAY NOW IN THE HALL OF FAME

After making history in the Cardinals comeback win over the Raiders, both QB **Kyler Murray** and CB **Byron Murphy, Jr.** are being honored at the Pro Football Hall of Fame, which has a game-used ball signed by Murray and the jersey of Murphy now on display in Canton.

Murray is being honored for becoming the first player in NFL history to have a passing TD, rushing TD, a two-point conversion pass and a two-point conversion run in the same game.

Murphy is being honored for his game-winning TD in OT, the longest OT fumble return TD in NFL history (59 yards).

## ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2022 season marks the 16<sup>th</sup> with owner **Michael Bidwill** steering the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

### Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Michael continues a tradition of Bidwill ownership of the Cardinals that dates back to his grandfather, Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill, who purchased the team in 1933.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Michael's tenure leading the organization. Arizona has played in 10 postseason contests over the last 15 seasons, after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).
- With an 11-6 record in 2021, the Cardinals reached 11+ wins in a season for the sixth time in franchise history. Three of those six 11-win campaigns came with Michael leading the team: 13 in 2015, 11 in 2014, 11 in 2021.
- Among Bidwill's most substantial accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. The world-class venue has proved a critical turning point for the franchise, an economic engine for the state of Arizona, and a crucial resource in the battle against the COVID-19 pandemic.
- At the conclusion of the 2022 season, State Farm Stadium will host Super Bowl LVII – the third Super Bowl held at the venue since it opened in 2006. State Farm Stadium also hosted Super Bowls XLII (following 2007 season) and XLIX (following 2014 season).
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land three Super Bowls, Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- Since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006, the Cardinals have sold out 156 games at the venue (which is every non-pandemic game played there).
- During the 2022 season, the Cardinals will make their first-ever appearance on *Hard Knocks*, television's most acclaimed sports reality franchise. Arizona will be the second team to be featured on *Hard Knocks In Season*, which will document the second half of the Cardinals season in real time.
- In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.

*Knocks In Season: The Arizona Cardinals* this fall for an all-access primetime docuseries on the franchise.

*The first episode will premiere on Wednesday, November 9. Additional episodes will premiere each Wednesday through the end of the Cardinals season.*

The 18-time Emmy-winning weekly series will deliver its signature all access coverage to document an NFL franchise in-season and in real time, following the Cardinals as the team navigates the challenges of an NFL season and battles to return to the post-season. The series will be available on HBO and to stream on HBO Max during the 2022 NFL season beginning in November.

*Hard Knocks In Season* debuted last fall with the engaging and eventful drama of the Indianapolis Colts' 2021 regular season journey.

"Last season *Hard Knocks* made an unprecedented leap, documenting an NFL regular season in real time for the first time ever with the Indianapolis Colts," said Keith Cossrow, NFL Films Vice President and Senior Coordinating Producer. "This season, we are eager to build on that success and go even further with one of the most exciting teams in the NFL."

This will mark the Cardinals first appearance as part of the *Hard Knocks* franchise, which originally launched in 2001.

"I think coaches and players, you're gonna want to be on your A-game and be well prepared anytime that camera's around and make sure that you're putting your best foot forward," head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** said of appearing on the show.

## KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

After 14 seasons working within the Cardinals personnel department, **Steve Keim** was elevated to GM on January 8, 2013.

### AMONG THE NFL'S BEST IN 2021

In 2021, the Cardinals posted an 11-6 record and secured their first playoff berth since 2015.

*In addition to winning 11 games during the regular season, the Cardinals also ranked in the top 10 in both offensive points scored and defensive points allowed per game.*

### CARDINALS HIGHLIGHTS IN KEIM'S TENURE

- The 2021 season marked the fourth time in his tenure the Cardinals have won 10+ games. That includes the 2015 season when Arizona won a franchise record 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.
- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).
- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense four times dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger. In 2021, Arizona ranked 10<sup>th</sup> in the NFL in offensive points scored (435) and eighth in defensive points allowed (349).
- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the 2019 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and followed up with Pro Bowl selections in each of the last two years (2020-21), becoming the first QB in team history to earn multiple Pro Bowls in his first three seasons.
- The 2021 free agency period was one of Keim's busiest as GM. The players the Cardinals acquired have a combined 20 Pro Bowl selections and 11 All-Pro nods. Arizona brought in five different Pro Bowlers in the offseason: DL **J.J. Watt**, WR **A.J. Green**, OL **Rodney Hudson**, K **Matt Prater** and RB **James Conner**. Conner was selected to the Pro Bowl in 2021.
- Named Sporting News 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

"The BetMGM Sportsbook at State Farm Stadium gives us a chance to engage current and potential fans on a year-round basis in a fun, entertaining and responsible way."



Located on The Great Lawn, the BetMGM Sportsbook at State Farm Stadium operates on both event and non-event days, offering guests a massive 265-square-foot video wall, 38 TVs and indoor-and-outdoor dining options.

Throughout the year, the BetMGM Sportsbook at State Farm Stadium also will serve as an outdoor music and comedy concert amphitheater, hosting events for audiences gathered on The Great Lawn.

## SUPER BOWL RETURNS TO AZ

### Valley Will Host 4th Super Bowl in February

The final game of the 2022 NFL season will take place in Arizona when State Farm Stadium plays host to Super Bowl LVII on Sunday, February 12, 2023.



It will be the fourth Super Bowl played in the state of Arizona and the third time the nation's most popular sporting event will be played at State Farm Stadium. The Cardinals home venue last staged the mega event when it hosted Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season.

Arizona joins South Florida, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Tampa Bay as the only sites selected to host the Super Bowl at least four times.

**ECONOMIC IMPACT:** The last time the game was staged in Arizona, it produced a record economic impact for the state. A 2015 study by the Seidman Research Institute, W.P. Carey School of Business at Arizona State University determined that Super Bowl XLIX, the 2015 Pro Bowl and related events produced a gross economic impact of \$719.4 million for the region. That was the largest economic impact of any special event ever held in Arizona. In addition to the games played in Glendale, more than 1 million people visited Verizon Super Bowl Central in downtown Phoenix and more than 500,000 people enjoyed events in downtown Scottsdale.

In a span of just over 26 months in 2015-17, State Farm Stadium hosted a Pro Bowl, Super Bowl, College Football National Championship Game and the NCAA Men's Final Four.

It was an unprecedented stretch for a stadium that generated \$1.3 billion in economic impact for the state during that 26-month span.

## "MR. B" ENTERS RING OF HONOR

In a halftime ceremony during the season-opener vs. the Chiefs, the Cardinals inducted former owner Bill Bidwill into the team's Ring of Honor.

Bidwill, who passed away in October of 2019 at the age of 88, had a life-long association with the Cardinals which spanned eight decades. After his father, Hall of Fame owner Charles W. Bidwill, Sr. purchased the team, Bill worked as a ball boy when he was a child. Upon graduating from Georgetown University and serving proudly in the United States Navy, Bidwill took on a full-time role with the Cardinals in 1960.



While well-known for his understated nature and a preference for staying out of the spotlight, "Mr. B" was recognized often for his contributions and accomplishments as Cardinals owner. In 2017, he was enshrined in the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame which honors those who have made significant contributions to the state's athletics community. In 2010, Bidwill was inducted into the Sports Faith Hall of Fame in Lake Forest, IL. At its December 2010 commencement exercises, Northern Arizona University awarded Bidwill an honorary doctor of humane letters degree for "his contributions to the university, his community and his profession."

During his time as owner, Bidwill was also at the forefront of diversity in employment practices, which was evidenced by the hiring of the NFL's first African American female executive (Adele Harris), first African American contract negotiator (Bob Wallace) and first African American head coach/GM tandem (Dennis Green and Rod Graves). In 2015, the team established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship to increase diversity and provide opportunities to gain NFL coaching experience. At the 2010 annual NFL Combine in Indianapolis, Bidwill was honored with the Paul "Tank" Younger Award from the Fritz Polard Alliance, whose purpose is to promote diversity and equality of job opportunity in the NFL.

Bidwill became the 19<sup>th</sup> individual inducted into the Cardinals Ring of Honor. Created in 2006 to coincide with the opening of State Farm Stadium, the Ring of Honor also includes Charles W. Bidwill, Sr. (Owner), Jimmy Conzelman (Coach), T Dan Dierdorf, HB John "Paddy" Driscoll, HB/DB Marshall Goldberg, WR Roy Green, QB Jim Hart, CB Dick "Night Train" Lane, HB Ollie Matson, HB Ernie Nevers, QB Carson Palmer, S Pat Tillman, HB Charley Trippi, QB Kurt Warner, CB Roger Wehrli, CB Aeneas Williams, S Adrian Wilson and S Larry Wilson.

## CARDS COMING OFF 11-WIN SEASON IN '21

**The Cardinals finished the 2021 regular season with an 11-6 record.**

**It marked just the sixth time in franchise history Arizona won at least 11 games in a season, with half of those coming during Michael Bidwill's 15 seasons (2007-21) running the team.**

**Kliff Kingsbury became the fifth coach in franchise history to win 11+ games in a season.**

## A REMARKABLE TURNAROUND IN THE DESERT

When he took over the Cardinals in 2019, head coach Kliff Kingsbury inherited a team with the league's worst record and one of the NFL's least-productive offenses.

**The Cardinals had an NFL-low three wins and were ranked last in nearly every offensive category in 2018. In 2021, Arizona secured a playoff spot, posted 11 wins in the regular season and ranked in the top-10 in total offense, passing offense and rushing offense.**

## KYLER MURRAY - AT A GLANCE

• Selected #1 overall by the Cardinals in the 2019 NFL Draft. Signed the largest contract in franchise history when he agreed to an extension in July of 2022 that will keep him under contract through the end of the 2028 season.

## CONNER BACK IN PRO BOWL FORM IN 2021

Signed to a one-year contract as a free agent, RB James Conner had perhaps the best season of his NFL career en route to his second career Pro Bowl selection in 2021.

In his first season with the Cardinals, Conner totaled 1,127 scrimmage yards (752 rushing, 375 receiving) and 18 TDs (15 rushing; 3 receiving).

## AZ ACQUIRED DEEP THREAT IN HOLLYWOOD

On the first day of the 2022 NFL Draft, the Cardinals sent their first-round pick (#23 overall) to the Baltimore Ravens in exchange for WR Marquise "Hollywood" Brown and the Ravens '22 third-round pick (#100 overall).

Baltimore's first round pick (25<sup>th</sup> overall) in the 2019 NFL Draft, Brown has 225 receptions for 2,700 yards and 23 TDs in 50 games (45 starts) in his career. The 25-year old set career highs with 91 receptions for 1,008 yards last season while starting all 16 games in which he played.

Has also played in three postseason games and totaled 18 receptions for 322 yards.

Since he entered the league in 2019, only two players in the NFL have more TD receptions of 20+ yards (12) and 40+ yards than Brown (7).

### BROWN'S TD CONNECTIONS

• Dating back to his two seasons (2017-18) at Oklahoma, Brown has 40 TD receptions, 39 of which have come from three different Heisman Trophy winning QBs (Kyler Murray, Baker Mayfield, Lamar Jackson) and the other coming from QB Trace McSorley - his former teammate in Baltimore and current teammate with the Cardinals.

• Of his 17 TD receptions at Oklahoma, 11 came from Murray - including Brown's first TD with the Sooners (87-yarder from Kyler on 9/16/17 vs. Tulane).

• Brown's 11 TD catches from Murray at Oklahoma averaged 51.0 yards. Only one covered fewer than 20 yards and seven covered 50+ yards.

### THE RELATIONSHIP RUNS DEEP

WR Marquise Brown received his nickname "Hollywood" during his time at the University of Oklahoma. It was with the Sooners that Brown met - and became best friends with - Cardinals QB Kyler Murray.



Brown and Murray played together with the Sooners for two seasons (2017-18), including in 2018 when Brown had 75 receptions for 1,318 yards and 10 TDs. That season, Brown led the nation in receptions of 40+ yards (11), 50+ yards (7) and 60+ yards (4) and Murray won the Heisman Trophy.

They were both selected in the first round of the 2019 NFL Draft - Murray #1 overall to Arizona and Brown #25 overall to Baltimore. Even though they were not playing together, the two continued to work out together in the offseason.

"In college you go through more with your quarterback than in the NFL," Brown said of the tight bond. "Me and Kyler, we got in together, we were on the 'B' squad against the starting defense (at Oklahoma) to all the way to both of us playing."

## MOORE READY FOR LEAP IN YEAR TWO

Despite playing just 14 games in a limited role as a rookie last season, WR **Rondale Moore** totaled 973 all-purpose yards: 435 receiving; 76 rushing; 171 punt return; 291 kickoff return. That tied for eighth among NFL rookies in 2021.

Despite his success last season - including a franchise single-game rookie record 11 catches at Seattle in Week 11 and scoring the Cardinals longest TD of the year in Week 2 vs. Minnesota (77-yard TD catch) - much is being expected of the second-year pro in 2022.

"We utilized him in different ways than we will this year," head coach Kliff Kingsbury said this offseason. "But he's a dynamic route runner. I think that's what people are going to see. He's really good getting out of his cuts, good at the top of routes, so I think people are going to see a different side of him."

### OFF THE FIELD

- Wife, Kealia, plays for the Chicago Red Stars of the NWSL and his brothers, Derek (FB) and T.J. (LB), play for the Pittsburgh Steelers.

- In response to the devastation in Houston as the result of Hurricane Harvey in 2017, organized what would become the largest crowd-sourced fundraiser in history. Originally set a goal of \$200,000 but within 19 days, more than 200,000 individuals collectively donated \$37 million to the cause. Contributions continued, and the final tally reached \$41.6 million.







## SIMMONS' BIG SEASON IN 2021

Following a standout season in 2021, third-year LB Isaiah Simmons - the Cardinals first round (8<sup>th</sup> overall) pick in the 2020 NFL Draft - is expected to make another big leap this season.

**A rare athlete for his position, Simmons is one of the fastest players on the team - having run a 4.39 40-yard dash at the 2020 NFL Combine.**

He will continue to be used all over the field in 2022, seeing action at LB, nickel and safety according to defensive coordinator Vance Joseph.

"He's a big man who can tackle, run and chase, he can blitz, he could play that edge," Joseph said at the start of training camp. "But also he's covered guys in the slot like CeeDee Lamb and those guys and he likes it. That's different from most linebackers."

In 2021 Simmons proved to be the versatile defensive weapon the Cardinals hoped he would be. **He finished the regular season with 103 tackles, 7 passes defended, an INT, 4 forced fumbles, 4 tackles for loss, 4 QB hits and 1.5 sacks.**

**Simmons become the first Cardinals defender since Tim McDonald in 1988 to have 100+ tackles and 4+ forced fumbles in a season.**

**He also joined Colts All-Pro LB Darius Leonard as the only players in the NFL last season with 100+ tackles, 4+ forced fumbles and 7+ passes defended.**



## ARIZONA'S OWN INTERCEPTION LEADER

Third-year CB Byron Murphy Jr. - a native of Scottsdale and a product of Sauguo High School - was one of the Cardinals top defenders in 2021.

**In 16 regular season games, he totaled 64 tackles, 4 INTs (one returned for a TD), 12 passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.**

**Murphy's 4 INTs and 12 passes defended both set career-highs. He had one INT and 18 passes defended in his first two NFL seasons combined (31 games).**

**Murphy was one of just 11 players in the NFL with 12+ passes defended and 4+ INTs in 2021.**

## ALLEN BECOMES A PLAYMAKER ON "D"

Like LB Isaiah Simmons - DL Zach Allen is a young defender who had a breakout season for the Cardinals in 2021. Selected in the third round (65<sup>th</sup> overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft, Allen emerged as a playmaker last season.

**In 15 games (14 starts) last season, Allen established career highs in tackles (48), sacks (4.0), tackles for loss (5), QB hits (14), passes defended (4), fumble recoveries (3) and also recorded his first career INT. He scored his first career TD with a 16-yard fumble return in the regular season finale vs. the Seahawks.**

**Allen had twice as many sacks in 2021 (4.0) as he had in his first two years combined (2.0) while also more than doubling his previous career high for QB hits (from 6 in 2020 to 13 in 2021). Allen's three fumble recoveries were tied for the NFL lead among all defenders in 2021, and he was the only defensive lineman in the NFL with three fumble recoveries.**



**Michael Dogbe** – Selected by Arizona with its second pick in the seventh round (249th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Temple. Has appeared in 31 games (three starts) in his NFL career.

**Leki Fotu** – Cardinals first pick in the fourth round (114th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. Has appeared in 32 games (three starts) for the Cardinals during his first three NFL seasons. Family hails from the island of Tonga.

**Rashard Lawrence** – Arizona's second pick in the fourth-round (131st overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of LSU, where he was a three-time team captain including for LSU's 2019 National Championship team.

**Jonathan Ledbetter** – Originally signed with Miami as an undrafted free agent in 2019, has played in three NFL games with the Dolphins and Cardinals.

**J.J. Watt** – Five-time first-team All-Pro, five-time Pro Bowl selection, three-time NFL Defensive Player of the Year and 2017 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year. Signed a two-year contract with Arizona in 2021 after 10 years in Houston.

## LINEBACKERS

**Zaven Collins** – Selected by the Cardinals in the first round (16th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Tulsa where he received the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, the Chuck Bednarik Award and the Lombardi Award.

**Victor Dimukeje** – Selected by Arizona with their first pick of the sixth round (210th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Duke. Earned All-ACC honors as a junior and senior and named a semifinalist for the 2020 Lott IMPACT Trophy.

**Dennis Gardeck** – Named a Pro Bowl alternate on special teams in 2019 and selected as a team captain each of the last three seasons (2020-22). Signed by Arizona as a rookie free agent out of Sioux Falls in 2018 and has played 62 games in five seasons.

**Markus Golden** – Arizona's 2015 second-round pick (58th overall) out of Missouri has appeared in 98 games for the Cardinals (2015-18; 2020-22) and Giants (2019-20). Led the Arizona defense with 11.0 total sacks during the 2021 season.

**Devon Kennard** – Nine-year NFL veteran and Phoenix native has played 115 games (72 starts) with the Giants (2014-17), Lions (2018-19) and Cardinals (2020-22) after being selected by New York in the fifth-round (174th overall) of the 2014 NFL Draft.

**Jesse Luketa** – Selected by the Cardinals in the seventh round (256th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Penn State. A native of Ottawa, Ontario, played four seasons (2018-21) at Penn State and appeared in 46 games.

**Ben Niemann** – Undrafted free agent out of Iowa, signed with Kansas City in 2018 and appeared in 66 games with the Chiefs (2018-21) and Cardinals (2022) and was a member of the Super Bowl LIV championship team.

**Myjai Sanders** – Selected by Arizona with its second pick in the third round (100th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Cincinnati. Finished 2021 leading the AAC with 62 total QB pressures and was a two-time first-team AAC selection (2020-21).

**Isaiah Simmons** – Named to the 2020 PFWA All-Rookie team after being selected eighth by the Cardinals out of Clemson. One of two NFL players with 100+ tackles, 4+ forced fumbles and 7+ passes defended last season.

**Cameron Thomas** – Arizona's first pick in the third-round (87th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of San Diego State. Last season he led the conference with 11.5 sacks, 21 QB hurries and tied the conference record with 20.5 tackles for loss.

**Ezekiel Turner** – Signed with Arizona as an undrafted rookie free agent out of Washington in 2018. Has blocked two punts and has 44 special teams tackles in 51 career games.

**Tanner Vallejo** – Buffalo's 2017 sixth-round (195th overall) pick out of Boise State has played 69 games with Buffalo (2017), Cleveland (2018), Washington (2019) and Arizona (2019-22).

**Nick Vigil** – Signed a one-year contract with Arizona in the offseason. Spent first six seasons with the Vikings (2021), Chargers (2020) and Bengals (2016-19).

## DEFENSIVE BACKS

**Budda Baker** – Arizona's 2017 second-round pick (36th overall) out of Washington is a four-time Pro Bowler (2017, '19-21), three-time team captain (2020-22) and a 2020 first-team All-Pro honors.

**Christian Matthew** – Arizona's first pick in the seventh-round (244th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Valdosta State becoming the sixth player to be drafted in school history.

**Trayvon Mullen Jr.** – Las Vegas' second round (40th overall) selection of the 2019 NFL Draft and has appeared in 39 games (31 starts) since entering the NFL. Was teammates with Isaiah Simmons at Clemson.

**Byron Murphy Jr.** – Scottsdale native and Arizona's 2019 second-round pick (33rd overall) out of Washington. Has recorded 203 tackles, five INTs and 30 passes defended in 51 games (43 starts) during his first four NFL seasons.

**Jalen Thompson** – Selected by Arizona in the fifth-round of the 2019 NFL Supplemental Draft out of Washington State. Signed a three-year contract extension in September 2022.

**Marco Wilson** – Selected by Arizona in the fourth-round (136th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Florida. Has started 17 of 18 games played so far in his NFL career.

The Cardinals opened the 2022 regular season against the Kansas City Chiefs at State Farm Stadium. The contest reunited AZ head coach Kliff Kingsbury with KC quarterback Patrick Mahomes, whom he recruited to Texas Tech and coached for three seasons there. On this particular afternoon, it was the pupil who led his team to victory with an impressive passing effort. The 2018 league MVP threw for 360 yards and 5 touchdowns with no INTs in steering the Chiefs to a 44-21 win. Kansas City jumped out early with TDs on their first three drives and never looked back. Playing without several regular starters – including DE JJ Watt, WR DeAndre Hopkins, G Justin Pugh – the Cards battled and late in the first half had opportunities to make it a one score game but could not take advantage of them. The victory gave the Chiefs their eight consecutive season with a week 1 win while the Cardinals fell in the regular season opener for the first time in four seasons under Kingsbury and QB Kyle Murray.

Kansas City received the opening kickoff and proceeded to move 75 yards in 11 plays as Mahomes capped the drive with a 9-yard TD pass to TE Travis Kelce. The next Chiefs drive was equally effective, covering 86 yards in 7 plays. It ended on a Mahomes shovel pass to RB Clyde Edwards-Helaire for a 3-yard score that made it 14-0 late in the opening quarter. The Cards desperately needed a scoring drive and Murray delivered. He completed 4 of 5 pass attempts on the ensuing series, the biggest of which was a 24-yarder to WR Greg Dortch that moved it to the KC35. Shortly thereafter, Kyle scampered 21 yards up the middle to the 2, setting up James Conner's TD run that cut the lead in half at 14-7 two minutes into the second quarter. The next drive saw the Chiefs move 71 yards in 10 plays before facing a 4th-n-2 at the 4; KC went for it and Edwards-Helaire's 4-yard completion from Mahomes made it 20-7 after the PAT failed. With 1:05 to go in the half, the Chiefs continued to lead by 13 and took over at their own 20. On the first play from scrimmage, Mahomes connected with WR Juju Smith-Schuster before LB Dennis Gardeck forced a fumble that CB Byron Murphy recovered at the KC43 with :58 left. AZ soon faced a 4th-n-2 at the 34 but turned it over on downs when Murray's pass attempt was incomplete. The Chiefs quickly moved into position for a 54-yard FG try from Harrison Butker, who returned to action after exiting the game via cart in the first quarter. The kick was good and Kansas City took a 23-7 lead into the halftime locker room.

Kansas City's opening possession of the second half also resulted in a TD, this one a 1-yard pass from Mahomes to TE Jody Fortson. The Chiefs increased their lead to 37-7 late in the third on Mahomes' fifth TD pass of the day, this one a 2-yarder to WR Mecole Hardman. Early in the fourth, Murray's 2-yard TD pass to new Cardinals WR – and Murray's former Oklahoma teammate – Marquise Brown was followed by a successful two-point toss to TE Zach Ertz that made it 37-15. After a TD run by Chiefs RB Isiah Pacheco capped the next KC possession, Ertz's 6-yard TD catch from Murray provided the game's final score with 5:11 remaining.

The Cardinals made their first-ever appearance at Allegiant Field for a week 2 showdown with the Raiders and it was one for the ages. Vegas jumped out to a 20-0 halftime lead and led 23-7 after 3 quarters. But the gritty Cardinals battled back. And QB Kyle Murray engineered one of the greatest and most improbable comebacks in franchise history. Arizona would score the game's final 22 points, send the contest to overtime with a TD and 2-point conversion as regulation expired, and win it in the extra period with the longest OT return of a fumble in NFL history. It was the franchise's biggest comeback since 1999 and 5th largest ever; it was also the greatest comeback ever against the Raiders.

While the game ended in thrilling fashion for Arizona, its beginning was inauspicious. The Raiders took the opening kickoff, moved 75 yards in 15 plays and Derek Carr's 1-yard TD pass to WR Davante Adams made it 7-0. The next Vegas drive reached the AZ12 in 8 plays before Daniel Carlson's 32-yard FG made it 10-0. The Raiders increased it to 17-0 on their next possession when Carr capped a 7-play, 59-yard drive with his 3-yard scoring pass to TE Darren Waller. With just over 2 minutes to go in the first half, the Cards faced a 3rd-n-2 at the LV42 when Murray's pass attempt to Hollywood Brown was intercepted by CB Amik Robertson. The return set Vegas up at its own 27 with 1:51 to go. That was enough time to move into position for a 55-yard Carlson FG as the half expired that made it 20-0 at intermission. In their history, the Cardinals were 0-88-1 in games they trailed by 20+ points at halftime.

The AZ comeback began on its 2nd offensive series of the 3rd quarter. Murray completed 5 of 7 passes for 66 yards and ended the 79-yard drive with a scoring pass to WR Greg Dortch, a 5-yarder that was his first NFL TD catch. A 47-yard pass interference penalty on the ensuing Vegas possession led to a 25-yard Carlson FG that made it 23-7 late in the 3rd quarter. Two minutes into the 4th, the Cards trailed by 16 but were at the LV11 when they went for it on 4th-n-1. It ended there, though, as Murray's pass was just beyond the reach of TE Zach Ertz. However, 3 straight incompletions led to a punt and more importantly took just 9 seconds off the clock. An 18-yard Dortch punt return set AZ up at its own 46 with 12:07 to play. Murray marched the Cards to the LV25 where they faced a 4th-n-4 midway thru the 4th and down 16. They went for it and converted when Brown made a spectacular 1-handed grab at the 1. A play later, RB Darrel Williams punched it in and the Cards went for 2. What happened on that try was unforgettable and vintage Murray; the QB kept the pass play alive for 20 seconds, snaking around in the backfield for almost 85 total yards before finally outracing the defense to the pylon for a successful conversion. After another Vegas punt, the Cards took over at their own 27, down 8 with 4:43 to play. Needing to cover 73 yards and another 2-point conversion to force OT, AZ soon faced a 4th-n-1 at the LV43. A Murray scramble picked it up. With :30 left it was 4th-n-4 at the 6 when a defensive holding foul kept the drive going. It set up a 1st-n-goal at the 3 but after 3 incompletions it was 4th-n-goal from there with time for one more shot. Murray again delivered, scrambling to his left and into the end zone to cap the incredible 18-play drive. AZ still needed a 2-point conversion to send the game to OT and a delay penalty pushed the try back to the 7. It didn't matter. Murray fired a dart to WR AJ Green in the back of the end zone and the game was tied.

AZ won the OT coin toss and advanced to the LV37. They went for it on 4th-n-1 from there but Brown could not hold onto a Murray pass down the left side and the Raiders took over. On the edge of FG range, they faced 2nd-n-10 at the AZ39 when Carr hit WR Hunter Renfrow with a short pass but LB Isaiah Simmons dislodged the ball with a devastating hit. CB Byron Murphy scooped the loose ball and returned it 59 yards down the sideline to clinch the amazing comeback victory.

In a match-up of 1-1 teams, the defending Super Bowl champion Rams came to State Farm Stadium and jumped out to an early 13-0 lead, thanks to a pair of field goals and a TD. The Cardinals would respond with the game's next three scores. They were lengthy drives of 19, 17 and 16 plays that produced FGs rather than TDs but it still got AZ to within 4 points late in the third quarter. However, LA's second TD of the day made it 20-9 and the Cards would only be able to close to within 8 before running out of time. QB Kyle Murray set career highs in completions (37) and attempts (58) and his favorite target was Marquise Brown. The WR racked up 140 yards on a career-best 14 receptions, a total that tied the 2nd most in franchise history.

The Rams forced a punt on the Cardinals' game opening drive and LA's Michael Hoecht got a hand on it to set the visitors up at the AZ35. Arizona's defense rose to the challenge and limited the Rams to a 22-yard Matt Gay FG that made it 3-0. Following a 3-n-out from the AZ offense, the Rams took over their own 42. Six plays later they had it at the AZ20 when WR Cooper Kupp went in motion, took a handoff from QB Matthew Stafford and raced around the left end for 20 yards and a TD that made it 10-0. Gay's 40-yard FG capped LA's next drive and put the Rams up 13-0 early in the 2nd quarter. With 11:21 left in the half, AZ took over at its own 30 and down 13-0. The Cards would move 65 yards in 19 plays, converting a pair of 4th downs on a much-needed drive. It would reach the 5 but no further and Matt Prater's 23-yard FG made it 13-3 with 1:51 before halftime. After forcing another 3-n-out by the LA offense, the Cards took over at their own 28 with :48 left in the first half. Murray moved them 47 yards, the biggest chunk of which came on a 30-yard completion to WR Greg Dortch on the last play before Prater's 45-yard FG made it 13-6 at intermission.

Arizona opened the 2nd half by forcing a 3-n-out that included a JJ Watt sack of Stafford. The Cards offense then took over at its own 11 and soon faced a 4th-n-1 at the 20; they went for it and RB James Conner converted. The drive would reach the LA31 and Prater's 3rd straight FG – this one from 49 – made it a 4-point game with 5:10 to go in the 3rd quarter. On the ensuing LA possession, the Rams soon faced a 3rd-n-11 from their own 24 when Stafford escaped a sack from LB Zaven Collins and hit Cupp for 11 and the first down. A screen to TE Tyler Higbee picked up 26 yards and Cam Akers' 14-yard TD run ended the drive to put LA up 20-9 with 16 minutes to play. With 11:30 remaining, the Cards had reached the LA26 where they went for it on 4th-n-4 but Murray's pass attempt to Brown was batted away. Up 11 with 7 minutes to go, the Rams advanced to AZ1 and poised to put the game away; however, S Budda Baker forced an Akers fumble that Jalen Thompson recovered to keep it a 2-possession game. Murray would move AZ to the LA13 in 16 plays – the longest of which was 14 yards – and Prater's 31-yard FG with 1:07 pulled the Cards to within 8. They would need an onside kick recovery to keep their hopes alive but the Rams dashed them by successfully corraling the kick.

## WEEK 4

### Arizona Cardinals 26, Carolina Panthers 16

The Cardinals traveled to Carolina for a week 4 match-up of teams desperately trying to even their record at 2-2. Arizona had not won a regular season game there since 2002 and the Panthers had won 6 straight in the series. Through two quarters, it looked like they were on their way to making it 7 and took a 10-3 lead into halftime. But the Cards ran off 23 points in the second half as Kyle Murray threw two TDs and ran for another. The AZ defense, meanwhile, was exceptional throughout; it created three takeaways and generally harassed Panthers QB Baker Mayfield all afternoon while limiting RB Christian McCaffrey to 27 rushing yards on 8 attempts. Leading that effort was DE Zach Allen who had a career-day; he finished with 6 tackles, a sack, three knockdowns, two QB hits and a tackle for loss. All of it added up to a 26-16 win that continued Arizona's success on the road with 10 wins in its last 11 opportunities.

On their first possession of the game, the Panthers were stopped on a 3rd-n-1 Mayfield QB sneak and went for it on 4th-n-inches from their own 39; led by LB Zaven Collins, the Cards D stopped McCaffrey and the offense took over. The Cards reached the Carolina 10 where they faced a 4th-n-1 themselves but WR Rondale Moore was tackled behind the line of scrimmage and the threat was extinguished. The game remained scoreless into the 2nd quarter before the Panthers defense created its first points. On 3rd-n-6 from the AZ31, LB Frankie Luvi intercepted a Murray pass intended for Hollywood Brown and returned it 33 yards for a TD. The next series saw the Cards go for it again on 4th-n-1 - this time from their own 42 - but turned it over on downs when the snap went over Murray's head. That gave it back to the Panthers at the AZ42 with 9:02 to go before halftime but they would soon return it. A fumbled exchange between Mayfield and WR Rashard Higgins was recovered by Arizona LB Ben Niemann at the AZ35. The Cards offense then went 50 yards in 8 plays and pull to within 7-3 on Matt Prater's 33-yard FG with 3:34 left in the 2nd quarter. S Jalen Thompson's INT gave the offense the ball back at the AZ18 with 1:05 to go in the half. After a 3-n-out, Carolina took over at its own 35 with :21 left and advanced to the AZ36 on 4 completions before Eddy Pineiro's 54-yard FG as the half expired made it 10-3.

Carolina got the ball to start the 2nd half but on its 3rd play from scrimmage, Allen's 9-yard sack of Mayfield forced a punt. The Cards would then tie the game with a 9-play, 89-yard TD drive. Key plays were a 22-yard reception by TE Zach Ertz and a 37-yard defensive pass interference penalty drawn by WR Marquise Brown. Ertz ended it with a TD pass from Murray on 3rd-n-goal from the 2. After again forcing a Panther punt, the Cards embarked on another long drive, this one consuming 9:26 and extending into the 4th quarter. Matt Prater capped it with his 39-yard FG that gave AZ its first lead at 13-10. On the next play from scrimmage, DE J.J. Watt deflected a Mayfield pass into the air where LB Dennis Gardeck caught it and returned his first career INT 24 yards to the Carolina 5. A play later, Murray ran it in around the right side for a 4-yard TD that made it 20-10 with 10:26 left in the game. Carolina's ensuing series ended when Allen knocked down another Mayfield pass, this time on 4th-n-1 at the CAR 31. Two plays later on 3rd-n-3 from the 23, Murray hit Brown with an over-the-shoulder throw and the WR artfully tapped his toes just inside the end zone. The connection put AZ up 26-10 with 7:37 to play and the game's only other score came on a Mayfield-to-McCaffrey TD pass of 13 yards.
