A coaching veteran with more than two decades of experience working in the NFL and collegiate ranks, **Clint Hurtt** was hired by the Philadelphia Eagles as the senior defensive assistant/defensive line coach in 2024 and added the title of associate head coach during the 2026 offseason.

Hurtt presided over a group of defensive tackles that achieved notable success in 2025. **Jalen Carter** was named to the Pro Bowl after totaling 33 tackles, 29 pressures, 12 quarterback hits and three sacks in just 11 games (all starts). **Jordan Davis** enjoyed a breakout year by setting career highs in tackles (72, third among defensive tackles), pressures (22), tackles for loss (nine) and sacks (4.5), while leading NFL interior defensive linemen in run stops (34) and tying Carter for the second-most batted passes (six). **Moro Ojomo** also finished second on the team in sacks (career-high six).

In his first campaign with the Eagles in 2024, Hurtt oversaw a young stable of defensive tackles that helped anchor the No. 1 total defense (278.4 ypg) in the NFL and played a crucial role in Philadelphia winning the **Super Bowl LIX** Championship. Additionally, the Eagles' interior defensive linemen led the league in both pass-rush grade (89.2) and pass-rush win rate (27.7 pct.) in the regular season, according to *Pro Football Focus*.

With Hurtt's assistance, Carter received second-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl accolades after pacing the defense in pressures (45), quarterback hits (career-high 16) and tackles for loss (career-high 12) while posting 4.5 sacks with two forced fumbles in 2024. **Milton Williams** also had the best season of his career, finishing second among NFL interior defensive linemen in *PF* pass-rush grade (90.4) and third in pressure percentage (14.6 pct.).

Before coming to Philadelphia, Hurtt spent seven years with the Seattle Seahawks (2017-23), including two as a defensive coordinator.

In 2023, Hurtt's group had three Pro Bowlers in linebacker **Bobby Wagner**, cornerback **Devon Witherspoon**, and safety **Julian Love**. A second-team All-Pro, Wagner led the NFL with a team-record 183 tackles. Witherspoon, who earned PFWA All-Rookie honors, had the fifth-most passes defended (16) in the league while logging 79 tackles, three sacks, and one interception returned for a touchdown. In his first year in Seattle, Love made 110 tackles with career highs in passes defended (10) and interceptions (four).

Leading significant changes to the Seahawks' scheme in the switch to a 3-4 defense, Hurtt's first season as defensive coordinator resulted in an improved pass rush, increasing Seattle's sack production from 34 in 2021 to 45 in 2022 (tied for seventh in the NFL). Linebacker **Uchenna Nwosu** and defensive end **Darrell Taylor** were the only pair of NFL teammates to each register at least nine sacks and three forced fumbles that year.

Under Hurtt's guidance, the Seahawks ranked third in forced fumbles (18) and eighth in takeaways (25, tied) in 2022. He played a key role in the development of rookie cornerback **Tariq Woolen**, who was selected to the Pro Bowl after tying for the league lead with six interceptions, which marked the most by a rookie in team history. Safety **Quandre Diggs** also received a Pro Bowl nod after logging 71 tackles with four interceptions.

Prior to being named defensive coordinator, Hurtt mentored Seattle's defensive linemen from 2017-21, including adding the title of assistant head coach in 2018. During the 2021 campaign, Hurtt's defensive line helped the Seahawks rank second in the NFL in opponent rushing average (3.8 avg.).

In 2020, Seattle's defensive line was boosted by the mid-season acquisition of defensive end **Carlos Dunlap**, helping Seattle post an NFL-best 37

sacks over the final 10 regular-season games. In 2019, defensive end **Jadeveon Clowney** ranked ninth in the league with 16 tackles for loss and scored two defensive touchdowns (one interception, one fumble recovery).

The Seahawks' defensive line in 2018 saw career years from defensive tackle **Jarran Reed**, who totaled career highs in sacks (10.5, third among NFL defensive tackles) and quarterback hits (24), and defensive end **Frank Clark**, who recorded a career-high 13.0 sacks. In 2017, Hurtt's group was led by Clark (9.0) and defensive end **Michael Bennett** (8.5), whose 17.5 combined sacks were the fifth-most by a defensive end tandem in the NFL.

From 2015-16, Hurtt served as the outside linebackers coach for the Chicago Bears under the direction of **Vic Fangio**. In 2015, **Lamarr Houston** (career-high 8.0), **Willie Young** (6.5), and **Pernell McPhee** (6.0) were the only trio of NFL linebackers with six-plus sacks. Before working with the outside linebackers, Hurtt was Chicago's assistant defensive line coach (2014), when Young led the team with a career-high 10.0 sacks as a defensive end.

Preceding his career in the NFL, Hurtt spent 13 years coaching college football. From 2010-13, he was Louisville's defensive line coach/recruiting coordinator, adding the duties of associate head coach in 2011.

Hurtt came to Louisville from Miami (FL), his alma mater, where he was the Hurricanes' defensive line coach from 2006-09 and took on the title of recruiting coordinator in 2007. It was his second stint in Miami after first beginning his coaching career as a volunteer strength and conditioning coach from 2001-02 before working as a graduate assistant from 2003-04.

In between stints at Miami, Hurtt spent the 2005 campaign as the defensive line coach at Florida International, where he mentored **Antwan Barnes**, who became the first player to ever be drafted out of FIU.

Hurtt was a three-year letterman at Miami (1997, '99-00) before his career ended prior to the 2001 season due to injury.

Born on November 7, 1978, Hurtt and his wife, Tanisha, have a daughter, Taylor, and son, Clayton.
