DEVONTA SMITH RECORDS THIRD CAREER 1,000+ YARD SEASON

- During the scoring drive that resulted in a 15-yard TD from **Tanner McKee** to **Grant Calcaterra**, **DeVonta Smith** eclipsed 1,000+ receiving yards for the third time in his career (also 2022 and 2023). He also reached 5,000+ career receiving yards, ranking 10th in team history (5,019).
 - Smith is the fifth player in Eagles history to record three 1,000+ yard receiving seasons, joining **A.J. Brown** (four) **Harold Carmichael**, **DeSean Jackson** and **Mike Quick**.
 - Smith (80 games) became the third fastest Eagle to notch 5,000+ career receiving yards with the team, behind **DeSean Jackson** (73) and **Mike Quick** (74).
 - Smith (team-high 1,008) and A.J. Brown (1,003) are the only WR duo in franchise history to each produce 1,000+ receiving yards in the same season (2022, 2023 and 2025).
 - According to *Elias Sports*, Philadelphia is the fifth team in NFL history to have two WRs with 1,000+ receiving yards and a TE with 10+ receiving TDs in the same season (also 1998 Broncos, 1999 Panthers, 2013 Broncos and 2014 Broncos).

JALYX HUNT BECOMES FIRST PLAYER TO LEAD TEAM IN SACKS & INTs

- **Jalyx Hunt** became the first Eagle to lead the team in both sacks (6.5) and INTs (3).
 - Hunt is also just the second player in franchise history to post 6.0+ sacks and 3+ INTs in the same season, joining **Seth Joyner** who accomplished the feat in 1991 and 1992.
- Hunt registered 2 takeaways vs. Washington, picking off Commanders QB **Josh Johnson** in the second quarter and recovering a fumble by Johnson in the third quarter. He became the first Eagle to have an INT and FR in the same game since **T.J. Edwards** on 11/21/21 vs. New Orleans.
 - Hunt is tied with **Laiatu Latu** for the most INTs among EDGE players this year.

ADDITIONAL NOTES

- Philadelphia finished the 2025 campaign with a league-leading 70.5% red zone TD efficiency, marking their best red zone offense since at least 2000 (previously 67.8% in 2022).
