JETS PLAY FOOTBALL

Saturday night's contest marks the Jets annual Play Football game, where several youth football teams will be honored and enjoy on-field experiences. Over 4,000 tickets have been distributed to local youth and high school football programs at no cost. The Jets will celebrate participants from several Play Football initiatives, including:

PLAY FOOTBALL FLAG FOOTBALL PROGRAM: Participants from the Jets Play 60 Flag Football Program will take part in the tunnel runout prior to the game. These 20 students represent 10 different middle schools from the towns surrounding the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center. Each year, the Jets provide flag jerseys and flag belts to local middle schools, so they can operate a flag football lesson at no cost. Following the flag football lesson, the Jets host a tournament for all 10 schools.

HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS FLAG FOOTBALL RING CEREMONY: The Jets will honor Ridgewood High School (NJ) and Tottenville High School (NYC) for winning their league championships in June 2025. The Jets purchased individually customized championship rings for all players and coaches. Both teams will show off their rings on-field during the game.

NFL FLAG NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP WINNERS: The Jets will honor their NFL FLAG National Championship winners at the Play Football game. These teams represented the New York Jets at the NFL FLAG National Championships in Canton, OH.

- 10uG winners – THT
- 12uG winners – Mass Elite
- 14u B-Bracket winners – OSG

11-ON TOURNAMENT WINNERS: Every summer, the Jets and Nike host a 7v7 and linemen challenge tournament – which is made completely free of charge to all participants. 11-ON allows teams from the Tri-State Area to compete at the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center over the course of three days. Each team receives free Jets shorts to wear during the competition.

JETS HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS FLAG INVITATIONAL: In March, the Jets hosted their 2nd annual Jets Flag Invitational Tournament. This eight-team tournament takes place at the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center and is made free of charge to all participants. This year's winner was St. Joseph by the Sea; they will be recognized on-field for their accomplishment.

HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS FLAG COACH OF THE WEEK/YEAR: In its third year, the Jets Girls Flag Coach of the Week presented by Visa award is given to a coach in the Tri-State Area who serves the best interests of the game through the teaching of sound football fundamentals, the motivation of young players to achieve, and the promotion of youth football by way of dedication to their community, their school, and their student-athletes. These coaches will be honored on-field for their accomplishments and will receive personalized Jets jerseys and suite tickets. The 2025 Jets HS Girls Flag Coach of the Year winner, Joe Sarno of Tottenville High School, will be recognized for his achievements.



GAME NOTES

SPECIAL TEAMS: First-year P **Austin McNamara** has punted nine times this preseason, placing a League-high six inside the 20-yard line and four inside the 10-yard line, tied for the most in the NFL amongst punters with two games played. 66.7% of his punts have been downed inside the 20-yard line, the highest mark by any punter in the League and the highest mark by a Jets punter in the preseason since at least 2017 (minimum five attempts).

The Jets special teams unit has surrendered only 15 return yards on nine punts for a 3.8 yards per punt return average, the second-lowest mark in the League.

RUSH HOUR: The Jets offense has rushed for 288 yards this preseason, the seventh most in the NFL, and has generated 17 first downs on the ground, tied for the fourth most in the League.

The starting offensive line combination in Saturday night's contest at NYG (LT **Fashanu**, LG **Simpson**, C **Tippmann**, RG **Vera-Tucker**, RT **Membou**) paved the way for the offense to average 4.2 yards per carry on the first two drives of the game. On the second possession, the offense averaged 4.7 yards per carry on 10 attempts, leading a 12-play, 47 yard drive, produced entirely on the ground, capped off by a K **Nick Folk** 38-yard FG.

"O-line, of course it starts up front, and then Breece (Hall) and Braelon (Allen), they had a few good runs in there and kept us moving the ball. So, like you said, they were toting the ball, but it also starts up front with our O-line."

PROTECTION LEADERS: The Jets are one of only three teams to not allow any sacks so far this preseason, and one of only two to not allow any through two games played. Both of the team's preseason opponents, GB and NYG, ranked in the top-10 in sacks last season (2024), registering 45.0 each.

WR **GARRETT WILSON** has played in every game since entering the League in 2022. He is one of only three Jet receivers since the merger to not miss a single game in his first three seasons, and he is one of only eight active receivers in the NFL to play every game over the last three years.

0

The **JETS OFFENSIVE LINE** is one of only three units in the NFL to not allow a single sack this preseason. Saturday's contest marked the second consecutive game and just the sixth since 2017 the Jets haven't allowed a sack in a preseason exhibition.

1

TE **MASON TAYLOR** made his preseason debut Saturday at NYG (8/16), starting and hauling in a reception on the offense's opening drive. In his final season at LSU (2024), Taylor became the all-time receiving leader among all TEs in school history, and the only TE in program history to total 100+ receptions and 1,000+ receiving yards.

On Saturday (8/16), K **NICK FOLK** successfully converted on both of his FG attempts (38 and 31). Folk has led the League in FG % in each of the past two seasons; 96.7% in 2023 and 95.4% in 2024. He has missed just two field goals since the start of the 2023 campaign.

2

The **JETS DEFENSE** registered two interceptions in Saturday's exhibition at NYG (8/16), marking the first time since 2021 the defense has registered a multi-interception game in the preseason.

3

On Saturday (8/16), UDFA S **DEAN CLARK** became one of only three players this preseason to register 1.0 sack and an interception in a single game. Clark is the first Jet since 2017 to register 1.0+ sack and one+ interception in a preseason game (Corey Lemonier).

3

Two-time first-team All Pro and former Defensive Rookie of the Year, CB **SAUCE GARDNER**, is one of only three active players in the NFL to register 40+ passes defended and 180+ tackles since he entered the League (2022).

DL **QUINNEN WILLIAMS** enters the 2025 season with 39.0 sacks and three consecutive Pro Bowl appearances. He is just the fifth Jets player since 2000 to earn three or more consecutive Pro Bowls.

The **JETS** +3 turnover margin is tied for the second-best mark in the League this preseason, while their four takeaways are tied for the third-most in the NFL.

Since entering the League in 2022, RB **BREECE HALL** has recorded 50+ rushing yards and 50+ receiving yards in the same game four times, tied for the third most in the League.

The **JETS OFFENSE** rushed 10 times for 47 yards on their second drive of Saturday night's game at NYG (8/16), averaging 4.7 yards per carry.

RB **BRAELON ALLEN** averaged 4.9 yards per carry in Saturday's second preseason exhibition at NYG (8/16). Allen is averaging 4.5 yards per carry this preseason, the fifth-highest mark in the League among all players with 15+ carries.

P **AUSTIN McNAMARA** has punted nine times this preseason, placing a League-high six inside the 20-yard line and four inside the 10-yard line, tied for the most in the League among all punters with two games played. 66.7% of his punts have been downed inside the 20-yard line, the best mark in the League (Min. five attempts).

Last season, the **JETS OFFENSIVE LINE** combination of LT Fashanu, LG Simpson, C Tippmann, and RG Vera-Tucker, all returning this season, allowed only 7.0 sacks, the fifth-least by any OL combination in the League amongst all combos with 100+ pass attempts.

CB **BRANDON STEPHENS** registered a pass defended on third down of the Giants second offensive possession of the game on Saturday (8/16), forcing a three-and-out. Stephens has notched 9+ PDs in back-to-back seasons (2023-24), one of only 15 players in the NFL with an active streak of two+ seasons with 9+.

The **JETS DEFENSE** has registered a sack on 10.0% of opponents pass attempts through two games this preseason, the second-highest mark in the NFL, while their six sacks are tied for the third-most in the League.

Among active players with at least 15 career postseason receptions, WR **JOSH REYNOLDS'** 16.7 yards per catch is the fifth highest. Reynolds has appeared in nine career postseason contests, totaling 318 yards on 19 receptions.

18

Last season (2024), the **JETS DEFENSE** finished in the top five in passing TDs and passing yards allowed (18 and 3,275), in addition to allowing the seventh lowest completion percentage to opposing QBs (62.8%).

24

DL **LEONARD TAYLOR III** registered a sack fumble leading to a defensive touchdown in the preseason opener at GB (8/9). After making the team as an undrafted free agent last season (2024), Taylor III registered 24 tackles, the fourth most among all Jets undrafted rookies since at least 2000.

38

RB **KENE Nwangwu** returned the opening kickoff 38 yards in Saturday's contest at NYG (8/16), setting the offense up at the 42-yard line. Since entering the League in 2021, his 2,036 kickoff return yards rank as the third-most in the NFL, while his four kickoff return touchdowns are the most by any player in the League.

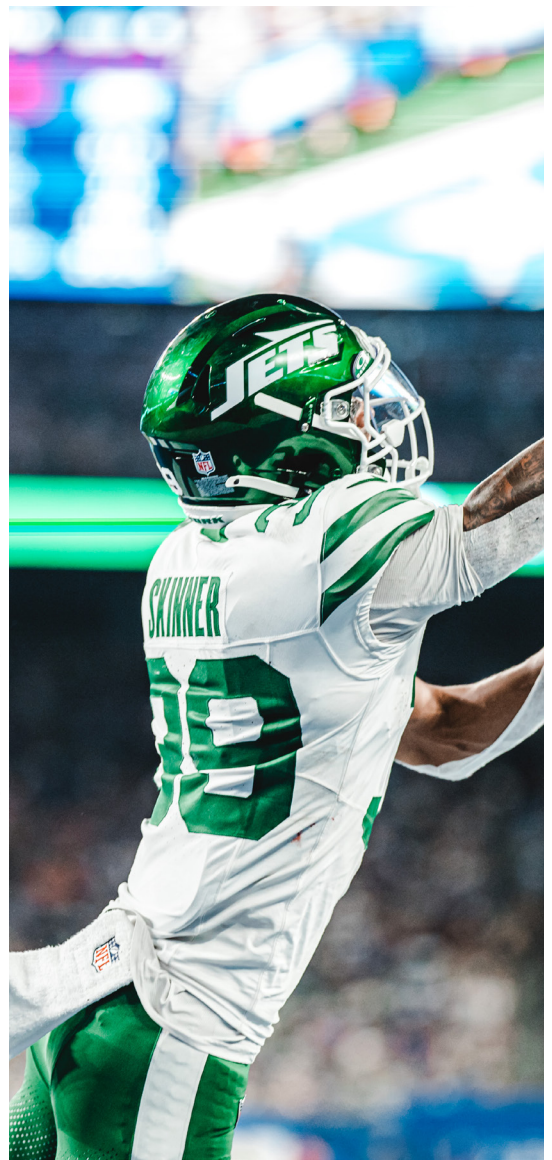
The longest tenured Jet, LS **THOMAS HENNESSY** has never missed a game in his eight-year career, and he is one of only 11 players in the NFL to appear in every regular season game (132/132) since entering the League (2017).

154

LB **JAMIEN SHERWOOD** finished last season tied for fourth in the League with 154 tackles. Sherwood registered six double-digit tackle performances, including recording a career-high 18 tackles at MIA (12/8).

ROBERT WOOD JOHNSON

“Let me say this first, it all starts with the owner. None of this gets done without our owner. Listen, I get it, I understand things that were talked about, things that were said back in the day, but I know who our owner is, I know what he’s trying to create, and we’re going to follow his lead... the things that he’s done, the way he talks, the way he operates, I can’t be happier to have him as an owner.”

“It’s unbelievable to see them make the effort, not even just the locker room, but to pay the players like you just seen, to get the locker room, you see those efforts and this organization and Woody (Robert Wood Johnson) as an owner wants to see this team be successful, want to see this team go in the right direction when it comes down to winning football games, when it comes down to being a healthy environment, when it comes down to doing the necessary things to put the players in position to win football games and you just take your hat off to that and just know that you got an owner that stands behind you and wants to see you be great on the field and off the field.”

AARON GLENN

“It’s been everything that I imagined, right, coming back and being the head coach of this team, and being out there on the field. Just hearing the fans, again, knowing exactly what they’re looking for. They’re behind us, I know that, and I’m very appreciative of that. There are fans that, when I was playing, that I still see that’s out there, and I think that’s outstanding. Listen, we have some guys that’s in it for the long haul and, listen, I appreciate that. Just don’t let go of the rope, I’ll say it for all you guys, don’t let go of the rope, alright, hold on tight. Be patient, and give the guys time. We’ll be just fine, we’ll be just fine.”

“I think when you shift in culture and start fresh, I think there are certain qualities that you have to have in a head coach, and I think coach Glenn has them all. He demands, well not really demands, he gets the respect from everyone in the locker room just by the way he presents himself. His message to the team has been consistent since day one. He’s a straight shooter, and he gets it from a player’s side. He knows how to take care of us. He also requires us to work as well, too. Our conversation is always transparent, and as a player, you can respect that. You know what you’re getting when you’re walking in the building. And it doesn’t just stop there, it bleeds through the rest of the coaching staff and it’s one message versus hearing multiple.”

“I’ve been coached by one of the greatest coaches of all time (Nick Saban) and I kind of know how it looks and I know how it feels being around people that can take me and the team to the highest level. He has every aspect in him. He has every quote, and the way he carries himself, I know he’s going to be one of the greatest coaches in this League, Aaron Glenn, just the way he goes about things.”

“I mean, for me, it was just getting in front of him and meeting him. He’s done this thing and he’s played at a high level. He’s been a Jet before, which for me is huge. Not to mention, he’s seen the blueprint for what it means to take a team that hasn’t had much success and turn them into that top of the League, premier team. He’s seen that blueprint twice or three times.”

“AG is great, he’s awesome, super personal when it comes to, not only speaking to me, not only our relationship, but everyone’s relationship. I’ve been saying this for a long time now, he’s straightforward with it, he keeps it very blunt, but I think our relationship is very good when it comes to that, personally, and just being on the same page on how we want to lead this team, so he’s great for sure.”

He already said what his standard is, and so when you’re watching film, now everyone’s having their own conversation as far as like, ‘Did I meet the standard that he set today?’”

“Big, physical, tough. Man, he has a workman mentality. He doesn’t say much, he just wants to work. Really good teammate, understands the situation that we’re all in when it comes to how we are going to progress with this team. And he’s not afraid to go play special teams. No matter what the situation is, even if he’s a starter, he understands that he still wants his job on special teams. So, I want a team of guys like that, and we have a team of guys like that.”

“Every guy has to have some type of characteristic that fits what we do and what we’re about, and Cisco does. Number one, he’s a really, really good person. He’s a really good football player here, he’s a player that can get the ball back for you. He believes in team and he’s a guy that, when he was at Syracuse, he made a lot of plays on the ball. Those things I like about him, and you watch him how he operates with his teammates, you could tell that he’s a true team guy, and I think that’s only going to get better once we continue to coach him, and once he understands the dynamics of everything that we got going on. He’s a guy, again, he’s been here for a couple of weeks, and he’s still trying to figure things out when it comes to how we operate, but he’s doing a good job for us and I’m happy that we got him.”

“Big, strong, tough. I tell you what, me and (Chris) Banjo were making a joke about this yesterday when they were doing the conditioning test. If there is any player that I would like to look like, it would be him. He is built the way that you want to have a football player built... But he’s a big, strong, defensive end that can set an edge, and he does have some rush ability. The way that he rushes is probably different than the way other guys rush. He is a power player, so I expect him to go out there and play with power.”

“He’s a little bit older than me, but all I can say is he is a man amongst boys. When he comes out to the practice field, his presence is felt. I admire the way he works, I admire his leadership as well, and I’m just excited for him. Having the chance to play with somebody who went to Auburn, the same school as me, means something to me. It makes it seem like I made a good choice in going to that school. So, again, I’m excited for him, he’s a great dude, great guy, and I’m glad he’s on our team.”

“He brings everything. I mean, he is a guy that we have to make sure we get him on the field as much as possible also. So, he’s a valuable, valuable piece of what we’re trying to do. Valuable.”

“Here is what I will say about Olu, and this started back in OTAs, he committed a number of days of just being here, and I’m not just talking about the times that he had to be here as far as the workouts, man he was here on the weekends like getting work in on his own, on his own. He is committed to making sure that he’s available, for one, and then also that he’s going to be a huge part of what we’re trying to build when it comes to the O-line.”

“Well, I think for one, he definitely got bigger in the offseason. I see that. It looked like he got a little bit faster, too, and then just overall, he just feels more comfortable. Like as a rookie coming into this League, you have so much on your mind that’s kind of hard to lock in and kind of get everything down, but with Olu having that offseason and that time to kind of recover and get his body right, I could see night and day from his first day of camp to now.”

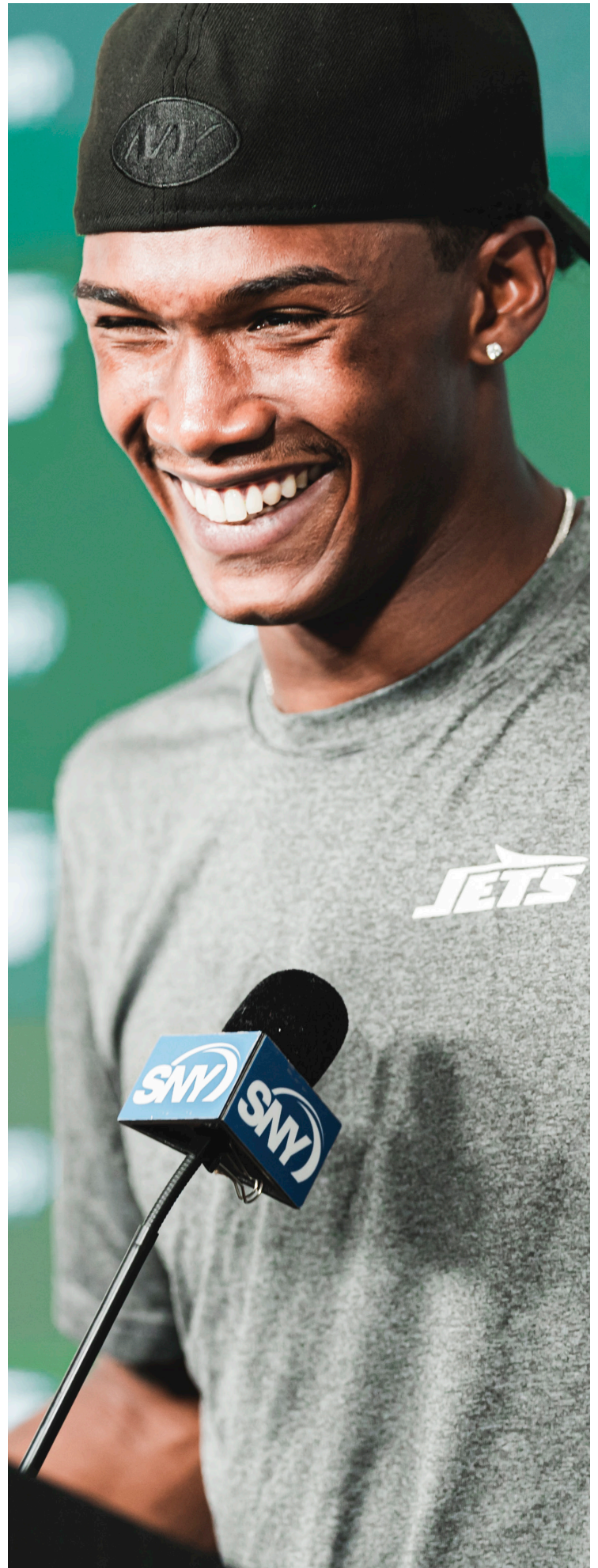
GARRETT WILSON

QUARTERBACKS

BRADY COOK... Rookie quarterback who signed with the Jets as an undrafted free agent (2024) following a decorated career at Missouri, leaving as the second-winningest quarterback in program history (26-13) and a three-year starter and captain.

JUSTIN FIELDS... Fifth-year quarterback who owns the third-most rushing yards by a QB in their first four seasons in NFL history (2,509), and the only QB in the League to register a 90.0+ passer rating in five consecutive games to start last season (2024), leading Pittsburgh to a 4-2 record as their starting quarterback where he accounted for 10 TDs and only one interception.

ADRIAN MARTINEZ... First-year quarterback who spent last season (2024) on the practice squad after a stint in the UFL where he won MVP of the League and the inaugural UFL Championship with the Birmingham Stallions (2024).

TYROD TAYLOR... 15-year veteran quarterback with experience on seven different teams, spanning 94 career appearances (58 starts), totaling 12,000+ passing yards and 2,000+ rushing yards.

RUNNING BACKS

BRAELON ALLEN... Second-year running back out of Wisconsin who finished his rookie season with the most rushing yards by a player before their 21st birthday in NFL history (334).

ISAIAH DAVIS... Second-year running back who contributed on both offense and special teams as a rookie, finishing the season with the fourth-best yards per carry mark in the NFL (5.8, among RBs with 30+ carries) and seven tackles on special teams, tied for the fifth-most among all RBs in the NFL.

DONOVAN EDWARDS... Rookie running back who signed with the team as an undrafted free agent (2024) following a four-year career at Michigan, where he won the 2023 CFP National Championship and rushed for over 2,000 career yards.

BREECE HALL... Fourth-year running back who owns the seventh-most scrimmage yards in the NFL (2,944) and the most receiving yards by a running back (1,074), across the past two seasons.

KENE NWANGWU... Fifth-year running back who leads the NFL in kick return touchdowns (four) since entering the League in 2021, including one in his Jets debut last season, marking the first time a Jet has returned a kickoff for a touchdown in their debut in franchise history.

LAWRENCE TOAFILI... Rookie running back who signed with the Jets as an undrafted free agent during training camp (2025) following a five-year career at Florida State (2020-24), where he totaled 2,800 scrimmage yards and 19 touchdowns.



WIDE RECEIVERS

IRVIN CHARLES... Third-year wide receiver who has appeared mainly on special teams, becoming one of just five players in the NFL to register 14+ tackles and a blocked punt since making his debut in Week Five (2023), despite missing the final four games of last season (2024) with a torn ACL.

MALACHI CORLEY... Second-year wide receiver out of Western Kentucky who was selected in the third round of the 2024 NFL Draft after leading the FBS in YAC as a sophomore (2022, 975) and finishing fifth in the same category as a junior (2023, 683).

XAVIER GIPSON... Third-year wide receiver who leads the NFL in total return yards (1,585) and is the only player in the League to tally 1,500+ return yards and 340+ yards from scrimmage since earning a roster spot as an undrafted free agent (2023).

TYLER JOHNSON... Sixth-year wide receiver and former Super Bowl champion who has made the playoffs in five consecutive seasons since entering the League in 2021, totaling 800+ receiving yards and four touchdowns across 48 appearances (eight starts).

ALLEN LAZARD... Seventh-year veteran wide receiver who has totaled 3,000+ receiving yards and 27 touchdowns throughout his career and was one of only five players in the League to haul in four+ touchdowns the first five weeks of last season (2024).

DYMERE MILLER... Undrafted rookie wide receiver who led Rutgers in receiving yards last season (757) following a four-year career at Monmouth, where he set program records for single-season receptions (90), single-season receiving yards (1,293), single-game receiving yards (333), and single-season 100-yard games (six).

JAMAAL PRITCHETT... Undrafted rookie wide receiver out of South Alabama who led the FBS in YAC (759) and finished third in receptions (91) last season (2024), while becoming one of only eight receivers in the country to total 1,000+ receiving yards and 80+ receptions.

JOSH REYNOLDS... Ninth-year veteran receiver who has racked up over 3,000 yards and 20 touchdowns across five different teams, including two+ seasons with Head Coach Aaron Glenn and Offensive Coordinator Tanner Engstrand in Detroit.

QUENTIN SKINNER... Five-year wideout at Kansas entering his rookie season as an undrafted free agent after appearing in 49 games (20 starts), totaling 1,584 yards and 11 touchdowns on 80 receptions.

BRANDON SMITH... First-year wide receiver who made his first career appearance last season (2024) primarily on special teams after originally entering the League as an undrafted free agent with Dallas in 2021.

ARIAN SMITH... Fourth-round rookie wide receiver who won two National Championships at Georgia and led the team in receiving yards last season (817), after starting his Bulldog career as a two-sport athlete with football and track.

GARRETT WILSON... Fourth-year wide receiver who became just the fifth player in NFL history to surpass 1,000+ receiving yards and 80+ receptions in three consecutive seasons to start career, totaling the second and third most receptions in a single season in franchise history (101 in 2024 and 95 in 2023) in the process.

ONTARIA WILSON... First-year wide receiver who signed with the Jets this offseason (2025) after playing 18 games in the CFL with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers, where he totaled 1,026 yards and three touchdowns on 71 receptions.



TIGHT ENDS & FULLBACKS

ANDREW BECK... Seventh-year fullback who has appeared in 70 career games (22 starts) on offense and special teams, totaling 220 scrimmage yards and four offensive touchdowns, plus four tackles, and two kick returns for 94 yards and a touchdown.

NEAL JOHNSON... First-year tight end who spent time on the practice squad last season following a five-year career at Louisiana Lafayette, where he accumulated over 1,000 receiving yards and 11 touchdowns, earning third-team All-Sun Belt in his final season (2023).

ZACK KUNTZ... First-year tight end who has spent the past two seasons (2023-24) on the practice squad, appearing in two career games, primarily on special teams, after registering a perfect 10.00 Relative Athletic Score (RAS) during the draft process (2023), the best score out of the 1,020 tight ends measured from 1987-2023.

JEREMY RUCKERT... Long Island native, fourth-year tight end, and former third-round pick (2022) out of Ohio State who reunites with QB Justin Fields and enters the season with 35 career receptions for 264 yards.

STONE SMARTT... FA signing (2025) who totaled 380 yards and one touchdown on 31 receptions in three seasons with the Chargers, after converting to tight end from quarterback midway through his college career.

MASON TAYLOR... Second-round rookie tight end, and son of NFL Hall of Famer and former Jet Jason Taylor who, in three seasons at LSU, broke the school record for receptions (129) and receiving yards (1,308) by a tight end, becoming the first tight end in program history with 100 receptions and 1,000 yards.



OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

OLU FASHANU... Second-year offensive lineman and former first-round pick (11th overall, 2023) out of Penn State who made starts at both left and right tackle last season (2024), allowing only one sack, the fewest among all rookie tackles with 300 offensive snaps.

LIAM FORNADEL... First-year offensive lineman who has spent time with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers (CFL), DC Defenders (XFL and UFL), and the New England Patriots practice squad (2024) after notching 41 career starts over a five-year career at JMU (2017-21).

MARQUIS HAYES... Second-year offensive lineman who signed with the team following a tryout at mandatory minicamp (2025) after spending time on the practice squad with Arizona, Washington, and Green Bay.

SAMUEL JACKSON... First-year offensive lineman who notched 45 career starts at UCF (2017-22) before stints with JAX (UDFA), the Ottawa Redblacks (CFL), and the Houston Roughnecks (UFL).

KOHL LEVAO... First-year offensive lineman who spent the majority of last season (2024) on the team's practice squad after playing for the UFL's San Antonio Brahmas, where he was named to the inaugural All-UFL Team.

ARMAND MEMBOU... First-round rookie offensive lineman who was selected with the seventh overall pick, following a standout three-year career at Missouri, where he was one of only three Power Four tackles to not allow any sacks on 400+ pass blocking snaps in his final season with the Tigers (2024).

MAX MITCHELL... Fourth-year offensive lineman who has appeared in 30 career games with 14 starts at left tackle, right tackle, and guard, following a standout four-year career at Louisiana where he was named a third-team All-American (2021).

JOSH MYERS... UFA signing (2025) and fifth-year offensive lineman who started in 50 out of a possible 51 regular-season games at center for Green Bay the past three seasons (2022-24), tied for the second most among all centers in the NFL.

XAVIER NEWMAN... Fourth-year offensive lineman who has appeared in 20 career games (four starts) at both center and guard with Tennessee and the Jets since 2022.

CHUKWUMA OKORAFOR... Seventh-year veteran offensive lineman and UFA signing (2025) who has appeared in 78 career games (60 starts) with Pittsburgh (2018-23) and New England (2024) at right tackle.

JOHN SIMPSON... Sixth-year offensive lineman who started all 17 games at left guard last season (2024), allowing just 20 QB pressures, tied for the sixth fewest in the League among all guards with 1,000+ offensive snaps.

JOE TIPPMANN... Third-year offensive lineman who started all 17 games at center and played all but one offensive snap last season (2024), becoming one of only five NFL centers to start all 17 games and play at least 99% of the team's offensive snaps in 2024.

ALIJAH VERA-TUCKER... Fifth-year offensive lineman who appeared and started in 15 games at right guard last season (2024), allowing just eight QB hurries, tied for the fourth fewest among all guards with 500+ snaps.

CARTER WARREN... Third-year offensive lineman and former fourth round pick (2023) who has appeared in 14 career games (six starts), making starts at both left and right tackle.



DEFENSIVE LINE

TYLER BARON... Rookie defensive lineman who was selected in the fifth round after a five-year college career at Tennessee (2020-23) and Miami (2024), registering 139 tackles, 38 tackles for loss, 19.0 sacks, and two forced fumbles.

MICHEAL CLEMONS... Fourth-year defensive lineman who started all 17 games for the first time in his career last season (2024), registering 34 tackles, one tackle for loss, 4.5 sacks, 23 QB pressures, eight QB hits, and one forced fumble.

BYRON COWART... Fifth-year defensive lineman who appeared in 15 games and made seven starts with Chicago last season (2024), recording 26 tackles, 2.5 sacks, four QB hits, and 12 QB pressures.

MICHAEL FLETCHER... Rookie undrafted free agent who registered 72 tackles, 13.5 tackles for loss, 12.0 sacks, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries, and one blocked kick across a six-year college career with Michigan State (2018-22) and Appalachian State (2023-24).

JERMAINE JOHNSON... Fourth-year edge rusher returning from an Achilles injury suffered in Week Two (2024), where in the prior year, earned his first Pro Bowl nod after registering career-highs in all categories, including tackles (55), TFLs (11), sacks (7.5), and a pick-six.

KINGSLEY JONATHAN... Third-year defensive lineman who signed with the Jets as a free agent following mandatory minicamp (2025) after spending the majority of last season (2024) on Buffalo's practice squad.

PHIDARIAN MATHIS... Fourth-year defensive lineman who spent the first three seasons of his career with Washington (2022-24), recording 25 tackles, two tackles for loss, seven QB pressures, one QB hit, one pass defended, and one fumble recovery in 23 career games.

WILL McDONALD IV... Third-year edge rusher who led the defense with 10.5 sacks last season (2024), marking the third-most by a Jet since 2015, sitting just behind Muhammad Wilkerson (2015, 12.0) and Quinnen Williams (2022, 12.0).

BRAIDEN MCGREGOR... Second-year edge rusher who appeared in seven games last season (2024), recording six tackles and three QB pressures after making the team as an undrafted free agent.

FATORMA MULBAH... Undrafted rookie defensive lineman who played five years in college with Penn State (2020-22) and West Virginia (2023-24), registering 79 tackles, eight tackles for loss, and 1.5 sacks across 45 career games.

DERRICK NNANDI... Eighth-year defensive lineman who signed with the team as a UFA (2025) after spending the first seven years of his career with Kansas City (2017-24), where he was a three-time Super Bowl Champion (LIV, LVII, LVIII) and registered 233 tackles, seven tackles for loss, and 5.0 sacks across 115 career games, including 87 starts.

PAYTON PAGE... Rookie defensive lineman who signed with the team as an undrafted free agent after spending four years at Clemson, where he appeared in 53 career games (14 starts), registering 59 tackles, a 0.5 sack, one interception returned for a touchdown, two passes defended, and two fumble recoveries.

LEONARD TAYLOR III... Second-year defensive lineman who appeared in 14 games and recorded 24 tackles last season (2024), marking the fourth-most in franchise history since at least 2000 among all undrafted free agents in their rookie season.

JAY TUFELE... Fifth-year defensive lineman and UFA signing (2025) who spent the past three years in Cincinnati (2022-24) after his rookie season in Jacksonville (2021), registering 44 tackles, three tackles for loss, a 0.5 sack, four QB hits, seven QB pressures, and one pass defended in 34 career games (five starts).

ERIC WATTS... Second-year defensive lineman who appeared in 14 games, registering 12 tackles and six QB pressures, adding one special teams tackle after making the team as an undrafted free agent (2024).

RASHAD WEAVER... Fifth-year defensive lineman and UFA signing (2025) who joins the team after playing last season in Houston (2024) and the first three years of his career in Tennessee (2021-23), registering 45 tackles, 11 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, 15 QB hits, and 44 QB pressures across 36 games (four starts).

QUINNEN WILLIAMS... Seventh-year defensive lineman who has appeared in 90 career games (86 starts) with the team and has earned three consecutive nods to the Pro Bowl (2022-24), becoming just the fifth Jet since 2000 to make three or more consecutive appearances.



LINEBACKERS

ZAIRE BARNES... Second-year linebacker who spent all of last season (2024) on injured reserve after appearing in four games on special teams as a rookie (2023).

JAMIN DAVIS... Fifth-year linebacker who was claimed at the end of last season (2024) after originally entering the League as a first-round pick by Washington (2021).

KIKO MAUIGOA... Fifth-round rookie linebacker who played in 51 career games (39 starts) at Washington State (2021-22) and Miami (2023-24), recording 255 tackles, 35 tackles for loss, 13.0 sacks, three interceptions, nine passes defended, six forced fumbles, and one fumble recovery.

MARCELINO McCRARY-BALL... Second-year linebacker who appeared in 12 games last season (2024), registering seven tackles on special teams, including the first of his career in Week Four vs. Denver (9/29).

JAMIEN SHERWOOD... Fifth-year linebacker and 2024 Curtis Martin Team MVP who earned a contract extension after recording a team-high 154 tackles, marking the fourth-most tackles in a season in franchise history.

JACKSON SIRMON... First-year linebacker who spent the majority of last season (2024) on the team's practice squad after signing as an undrafted free agent.

BOOG SMITH... Undrafted rookie linebacker who spent five years at South Carolina State (2020-24), appearing in 45 career games and registering 241 tackles, 9.5 sacks, two interceptions, four passes defended, and one forced fumble.

JA'MARKIS WESTON... Rookie linebacker who signed with the team as an undrafted free agent after spending six years at Florida (2019-24) where he saw action at wide receiver, safety, edge, and on special teams with the Gators.

QUINCY WILLIAMS... Seventh-year linebacker and 2023 Curtis Martin Team MVP who has registered 100+ tackles in each season since joining the Jets in 2021, tied for the sixth-longest streak in the League, and who is one of just three players in the NFL to record 250+ tackles and five+ forced fumbles since 2023.



CORNERBACKS

JARRICK BERNARD-CONVERSE... Third-year cornerback who has appeared in 15 career games, recording six tackles on special teams and one tackle on defense.

MICHAEL CARTER II... Fifth-year cornerback who earned a contract extension prior to the 2024 season, and has appeared in 60 career games, registering 207 tackles, nine tackles for loss, three quarterback hits, 17 QB pressures, 24 passes defended, one forced fumble, three fumble recoveries, and two interceptions.

JORDAN CLARK... Undrafted rookie cornerback, and the son of former NFL defensive back Ryan Clark, who notched 173 tackles, 8.5 tackles for loss, 22 passes defended, and four interceptions, including one returned for a touchdown, across a six-year college career with Arizona State (2019-23) and Notre Dame (2024).

BUMP COOPER... First-year cornerback who was claimed by the Jets from MIA during training camp (2025) after spending his rookie season (2024) on the practice squad with BLT and SEA.

SAUCE GARDNER... Fourth-year cornerback and the first player since the merger to be named to the AP first-team All-Pro list in each of his first two seasons in the League who is just one of nine players in the NFL to register nine or more passes defended in three consecutive seasons since 2022, and one of three active players to post 40+ passes defended and 180+ tackles since he entered the League in 2022.

MARIO GOODRICH... First-year cornerback who has appeared in four career games since entering the League as an UdFA with PHI in 2022, in addition to spending time in the UFL with the Birmingham Stallions.

ISAIAH OLIVER... Eighth-year cornerback who appeared in all 17 games for the Jets last season (2024), recording 56 tackles, two tackles for loss, two QB hits, five QB pressures, three passes defended, and one tackle on special teams.

BRANDON STEPHENS... Fifth-year cornerback and UFA signing (2025), who started all 17 games for Baltimore last season (2024) and was one of only four players in the League to record at least 10+ passes defended and 1.5+ sacks.

QWAN'TEZ STIGGERS... Second-year cornerback who tallied five tackles on defense and three tackles on special teams with the Jets last season (2024), after becoming the first player in NFL history to be drafted out of the CFL with no prior college experience.

AZAREYE'H THOMAS... Rookie cornerback who was selected in the third round after a three-year tenure at Florida State, where he was the only CB in the country to allow zero TDs and under 20 receptions as a junior (2024).

SAFETIES

TONY ADAMS... Fourth-year safety who was one of only six players, and the only former undrafted free agent, to register 82+ tackles, one+ interception, 1.0+ sacks, six+ passes defended, and five+ QB pressures last season (2024).

ANDRE CISCO... Fifth year safety who grew up in Long Island less than 50 miles from MetLife Stadium, signing to the Jets as an UFA after four seasons in Jacksonville, where he registered eight interceptions, tied for the eighth most in their franchise history.

DEAN CLARK... Rookie undrafted safety who registered 301 tackles, 6.5 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, five interceptions, 14 passes defended, one forced fumble, and one fumble recovery across his six-year collegiate career with Kent State (2019-22) and Fresno State (2023-24).

TANNER McCALISTER... First-year safety who has appeared in six career games with CLV (2023) and DEN (2024), spending most of his career on the practice squad with both after entering the League as an undrafted free agent with CLV (2023).

JARIUS MONROE... Second-year safety who appeared in five games last season (2024), registering two tackles and one pressure, in addition to four tackles on special teams.

MALACHI MOORE... Team's fourth-round pick, he was a five-year starter and 2020 CFP National Champion with Alabama. One of only 15 players in the Crimson Tide's 132-year program history (since 1892) to be named a two-time permanent captain (2023-24), he also earned All-SEC first-team and AP second-team All-American honors last season (2024).



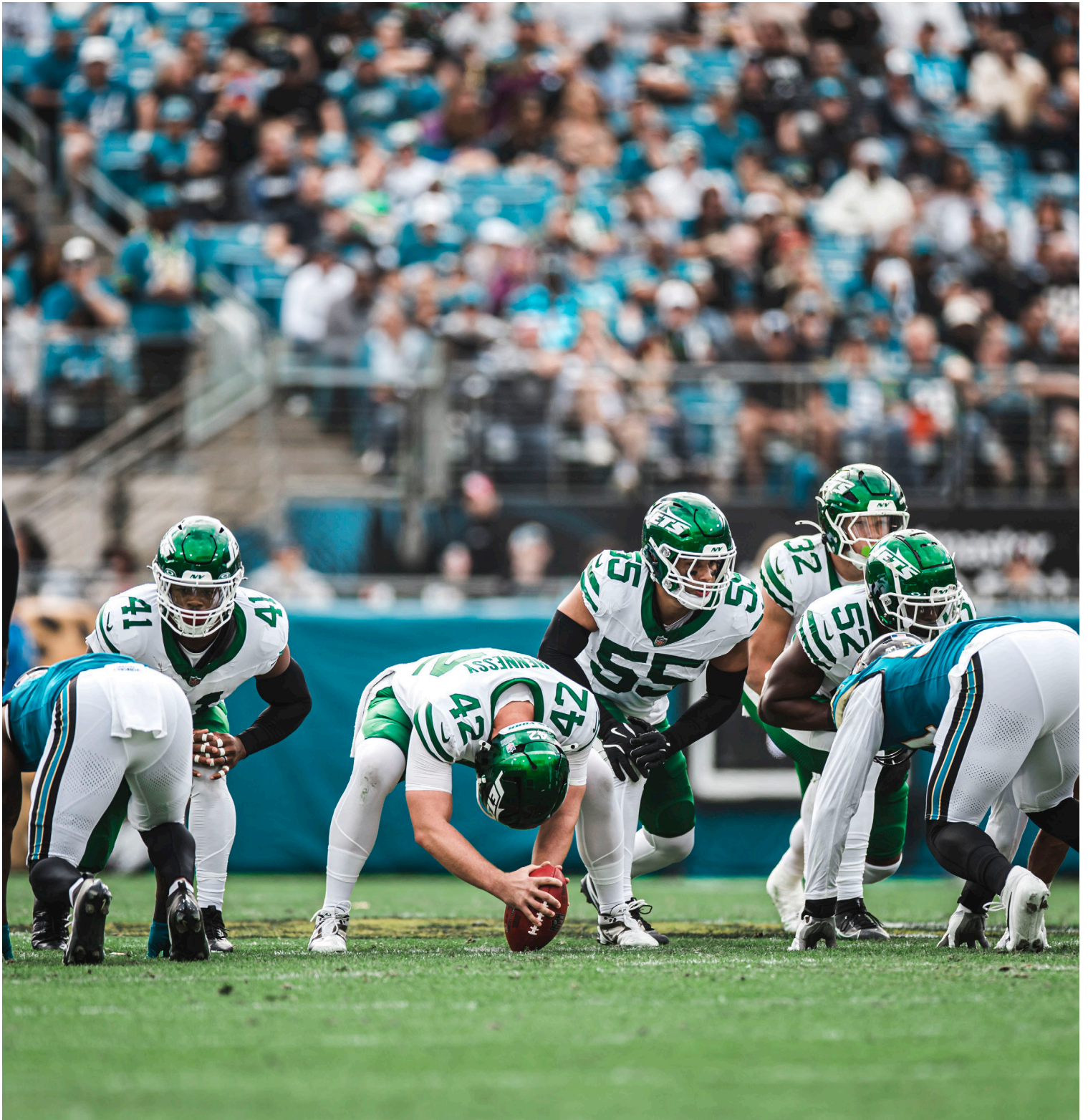
SPECIAL TEAMS

NICK FOLK... The 16th-most tenured kicker in the NFL since the merger who has appeared in 242 contests and reunites with the Jets as the team's all-time leader in field goal percentage (82.2%) after spending seven seasons in New York (2010-16), highlighted by a trip to the AFC Championship game (2010 season).

HARRISON MEVIS... First-year kicker who signed with the team as a free agent (2025) after converting 20-of-21 field goals with the Birmingham Stallions in the UFL last season (2024).

THOMAS HENNESSY... Ninth-year long snapper and the longest-tenured Jet who has never missed a game in his career, appearing in 132 consecutive games and registering 27 special teams tackles, the most among all long snappers in the League since 2017.

AUSTIN MCNAMARA... First-year punter who spent training camp with Cincinnati last season (2024), following an illustrious career at Texas Tech (2019-23) where he earned All-Big 12 first-team honors three times and graduated with the 12th-highest yards per punt average (45.1) in FBS history.

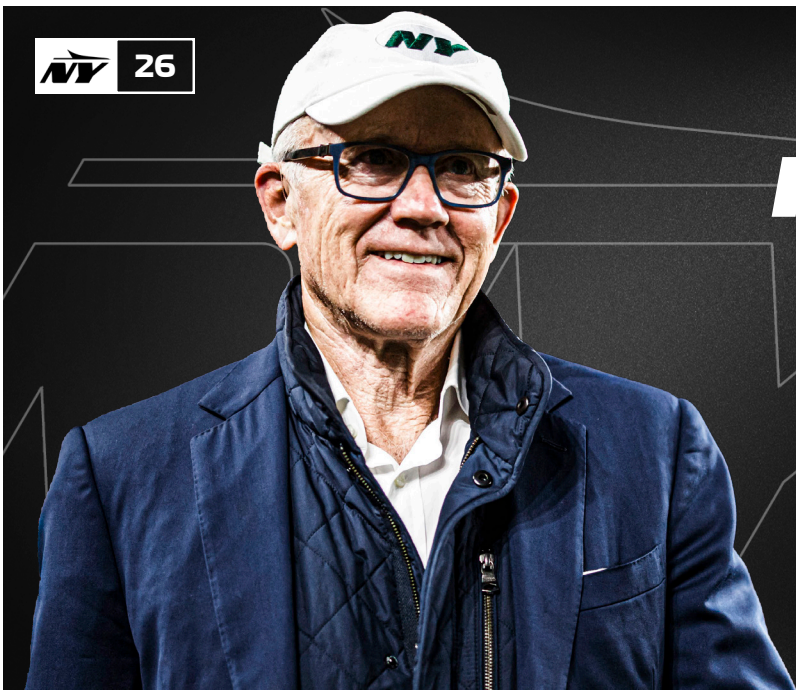

ROBERT WOOD JOHNSON

CHAIRMAN

ROBERT WOOD JOHNSON, a member of the founding family of Johnson & Johnson, has built upon his family’s proud legacy of achievement as a successful businessman, compassionate philanthropist, civic leader, and diplomat.

Upon purchasing the team in 2000, Johnson established his commitment to a culture of success built on three key elements: passionate players, supportive fans, and a new stadium. Under his leadership, the Jets entered their new home field, MetLife Stadium, an award-winning venue that has been ranked as the #1 highest grossing venue in the world, recognized by Billboard as stadium of the decade, and the host of the 2026 FIFA World Cup Final. He also moved the Jets into the Atlantic Health Jets Training Center, a world-class 224,000 square-foot complex that united the entire organization, and provided the perfect facility for everyone—players, coaches, and staff—to continually improve and excel.

Ambassador Johnson led the search process for the team’s head coach and general manager vacancies, which began during the 2024 season. He implemented a comprehensive, 360-degree hiring approach, focused on researching, identifying, and interviewing qualified candidates to gain a thorough understanding of their capabilities, cultural fit, and potential to lead the organization to a world championship. Johnson also embraced emerging technologies, incorporating artificial intelligence to provide an additional layer of insight. He held informational meetings with former NFL head coaches and executives and partnered with psychological professionals who worked alongside the team to assess each candidate’s strengths and weaknesses, and to develop models that could predict their likelihood of success.

Johnson’s approach led to a modernized, data-informed hiring process that integrated football expertise with advanced analytics and behavioral insights, setting a new standard for how teams and businesses approach leadership searches. His strategic vision ushered in a new era for the organization, now under the direction of Head Coach Aaron Glenn and General Manager Darren Mougey. Glenn, a 15-year NFL veteran, was selected by the Jets in the first round of the 1994 NFL Draft and previously worked with the Ambassador as both a player and as a scout. Mougey got his start in the League as a scouting intern with the Denver Broncos and worked his way up to assistant general manager in just 10 years.

In 2017, Johnson was appointed the U.S. Ambassador to the United Kingdom. As ambassador, he strengthened the ‘Special Relationship’ between the US and the UK, by promoting security and economic prosperity over a range of issues from trade to cyber security policies.

While in London, the Ambassador resided in the historic Winfield House, receiving world leaders including Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and on multiple occasions, President Donald Trump. Ambassador Johnson led the relocation of over 1,000 employees from the Embassy’s historic location at Grosvenor Square to a new state-of-the-art headquarters at Nine Elms. When the pandemic struck London, he then directed those employees in the remote, effective, and efficient operation of the Embassy to continue to serve and promote the United States’ interests in the United Kingdom. Throughout his tenure at the Embassy, Ambassador Johnson engaged with government leaders and the British people, traveling extensively throughout the United Kingdom and Northern Ireland to hear local concerns and emphasize the ‘Special Relationship.’



Beyond the field, Ambassador Johnson's philosophy of a successful team celebrates the crucial role of fans, as well as the significant role the team plays in the community. In this spirit, the team, through the New York Jets Foundation, positively influences the lives of young people in the area by expanding youth football, preventing bullying, and promoting social justice, particularly in disadvantaged communities. Among the Foundation's programs is the Jets and Nike Girls Flag Football League, encompassing both New York and New Jersey. Launched in 2021, the league has seen over a 1,000% increase in participating teams in just four seasons, sparking New York and New Jersey to officially sanction the sport a varsity and pilot program in each state respectively. Ambassador Johnson's support for girls' flag football garnered industry recognition, as the Jets were honored with a 2024 Front Office Sports Most Impactful Award and received an ESPY nomination for Sports Humanitarian Team of the Year in 2023. Most recently, Johnson supported the creation of the first NFL Girls Flag Football League in both the United Kingdom and Ireland.

In 2022, the Jets announced a \$1 million donation to help aid the people of Ukraine, with the money distributed among various organizations, each receiving \$100,000, over the course of a year. For Johnson, the events in Ukraine are personal; his wife, Suzanne, grew up in a Ukrainian neighborhood in New York. Her mother, Marie, was born to Ukrainian immigrant parents while Suzanne's father, Stefan Ircha, was originally from Ternopil, a town outside of Kyiv, and immigrated to the United States after WWII. In 2022, the Johnson family traveled to Poland to meet with Ukrainian refugees and understand firsthand how the unprovoked invasion has impacted their lives.

Chief among Ambassador Johnson's healthcare initiatives is the support for lupus research. In 1999, he founded the Alliance for Lupus Research (now the Lupus Research Alliance). This was the first organization devoted exclusively to finding new methods to prevent, treat, and ultimately cure lupus. Thanks to his leadership, the organization has dedicated more than \$259 million for research grants and achieved the major milestone of funding research which set the stage for the recent FDA approval of three new treatments for this autoimmune disease.

Over many years, Ambassador Johnson has been active in philanthropy and civic affairs, including past roles as an Honorary Trustee of the Wildlife Conservation Society and a past board member of the National September 11 Memorial & Museum at the World Trade Center and the Peregrine Fund. The Ambassador also served as a Trustee and a Trustee Emeritus of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the nation's largest philanthropic organization devoted exclusively to promoting health and healthcare for Americans.

Currently, the Ambassador is an active member of the NFL's Finance Committee, Investment Committee, and Stadium Committee.





CHRISTOPHER JOHNSON

VICE CHAIRMAN

CHRISTOPHER JOHNSON has overseen pivotal changes within the organization and has been a key part of the New York Jets leadership since 2000.

Most recently, Johnson played an instrumental role in the search process that led to the hires of Head Coach Aaron Glenn and General Manager Darren Mougey.

Johnson is well respected and has built strong relationships with people throughout the NFL. In 2020, during the global pandemic and social unrest, Johnson addressed the team and discussed how they all—Johnson, coaches, executives, and players—could use their powerful platform to influence positive change. He proudly stood with the players and worked with them on initiatives promoting more inclusivity. These efforts continue today.

Johnson currently serves as an active member of the NFL's Media Owned and Operated committee.

Johnson is active in various educational endeavors and local philanthropy, supporting a range of initiatives, including charter school construction, youth sports and the encouragement of public discourse and exchange of ideas through debating societies.

HYMIE ELHAI (pronounced HI-me EL-hi) begins his seventh season as the president of the New York Jets after his appointment in 2019. Now in his 26th year with the team, Elhai’s impact is felt throughout the organization.

Under Elhai, who has garnered League and industry respect by his peers during his tenure, the Jets have solidified their business staff’s senior leadership, as he oversees all team business operations. Elhai’s leadership has helped the Jets reach unprecedented growth through all aspects of the business, including sponsorship, sales, and content, leading to several organizational accolades and industry recognitions, including a 2023 NJBIZ Best Places to Work honor. Entrusted by Chairman Robert Wood Johnson, Elhai has helped form the foundation that has moved the Jets toward their goal of being a sustained, winning, and innovative franchise on and off the field.

Elhai has remained committed to redefining the organization through his steady hand of leadership and strategic planning, by setting clear goals and a mission that fosters a cohesive environment and a standard of excellence. To that end, this offseason, Elhai worked closely with team ownership on the search process that led to the hires of Head Coach Aaron Glenn and General Manager Darren Mougey, signifying a new era for the team. Elhai has played a pivotal role in facilitating a seamless transition for the newly hired football leadership, ensuring organizational alignment across ownership, football operations, and the business staff.

Throughout his tenure as President, Elhai has prioritized organizational efficiency by fostering and encouraging cross-departmental collaboration. He recognizes that the mission extends beyond internal operations alone, placing a strong emphasis on business initiatives that elevate fan engagement and deliver a more personalized fan experience.

In partnership with the New York Giants and MetLife Stadium, Elhai helps oversee MetLife Stadium, the home of the Jets and the host of premier events including the 2026 FIFA World Cup Final. He played a pivotal role in the building’s naming rights deal, a 25-year agreement established in 2011. The venue has been named the “Highest Grossing Stadium of the Year” nine times by Billboard during Elhai’s tenure, the most by any stadium in the world since its opening in 2010.

Ahead of the 2024 season, Elhai oversaw the launch of the organization’s rebrand, featuring three versions of the new “Legacy Collection” uniforms, in addition to updated primary and secondary logos. Throughout the process, Elhai emphasized a commitment to progress, remaining innovative, and delivering excellence to players and fans with a timeless look that honors the team’s heritage.

Elhai originally started with the organization as an intern in 2000 and has since held a variety of leadership positions, culminating in his appointment as team president. Most recently, he served as the club’s senior vice president, business affairs and general counsel, where he was responsible for all legal aspects of the team, including sponsorship, licensing, event, digital media, production and broadcasting agreements, and all employment related matters. Additionally, in that capacity, Elhai helped the football administration on all planning initiatives.

A Sports Business Journal Forty Under 40 honoree, Elhai received the Distinguished Alumni Award from Rutgers School of Law at their Alumni Recognition Gala in October 2021. He currently serves as a member of the NFL’s CBA player benefits plans committee.

Elhai is a graduate of Rutgers Law School and The Johns Hopkins University.

DARREN MOUGEY (pronounced: MOO-GEE) was named general manager of the New York Jets on Saturday, January 25th, 2025. Mougey brings over a decade of NFL personnel experience to the Jets after working with the Denver Broncos for the last 13 seasons, where he rose from scouting intern to assistant general manager in just 10 seasons.

“Darren is a trusted NFL executive who has experience working with an impressive collection of football leaders,” said Jets Chairman Robert Wood Johnson. “He is a proven talent evaluator who impressed us with his vision for this team. His partnership with Coach Glenn will revitalize this organization. I am proud of the thorough search we undertook and that it led us to the two best individuals to lead our football team going forward.”

Mougey’s front office journey started in 2012 as a scouting intern, as he climbed the ranks to assistant general manager (2022-24). For the Broncos, he held six different roles within the personnel department for three different owners/chief executives, two different general managers, and six different head coaches. Notably, he worked as an area scout in 2015 when the Broncos won Super Bowl 50. In his 13 seasons with the club, Mougey was part of four AFC West titles (2012-15), two AFC Championships (2013, ‘15), and one World Championship (2015).

“I could not be more excited to take on this responsibility with Aaron Glenn as we work to build a championship team that will make the Jets fans proud,” Mougey said. “Every successful team has alignment with its leadership, and it starts at the top, with ownership. It includes the head coach, and the general manager, and the president to build a world class organization, and we have that here with the Jets.”

“I will lead our personnel staff as we acquire, develop, and work to retain players that fit our team and culture, and we will do this in complete partnership with the coaches. Our philosophy will be to draft, develop, keep our own, and be disciplined and strategic in free agency. There is no more important part of any sports organization than the players, period. It’s about the players, and we have a good foundation of players here right now that we’re going to continue to add to, and we’re going to give those players everything they need to be successful and reach their potential.”

In his most recent role as assistant general manager (2022-24) for the Broncos, Mougey assisted general manager George Paton in all personnel decisions, and before that as the director of player personnel (2021), he oversaw the day-to-day operations of the pro and college scouting departments. Since 2021, the Broncos have had nine All-Pro seasons by six different players, with five of them, Zach

Allen, Nik Bonitto, Quinn Meinerz, Marvin Mims, and Patrick Surtain II, drafted or signed in that span.

As Denver snapped an eight-year postseason drought in 2024, Mougey helped acquire all but four of the 26 players that started at least five games for the Broncos in his four years as director of player personnel and assistant general manager.

Of those 26 players, 13 were drafted or signed as undrafted free agents, with seven of the 13 selected in rounds four through seven or signing after not being selected. The Broncos had only two first-round picks in the last four years, selecting All-Pro cornerback Surtain II (2021) and starting quarterback Bo Nix (2024).

Among his key pro defensive acquisitions, defensive lineman Allen registered a single-season best in sacks (8.5) in 2024 after signing in 2023, while safety Brandon Jones logged a single-season high in interceptions (three) in 2024 after signing in the same offseason.



A former player himself, Mougey was a quarterback and wide receiver at San Diego State (2004-08). A quarterback his first three seasons, he threw for 615 yards and two touchdowns, sharing a quarterback room in 2004 with Vikings Head Coach Kevin O’Connell and Jets Offensive Coordinator Tanner Engstrand. He spent his final two seasons with the Aztecs at wide receiver, where he caught 66 passes for 805 yards and six touchdowns.

An undrafted free agent signing by Atlanta following the 2009 NFL Draft, Mougey spent time in training camp with the Falcons (2009) and Cardinals (2010) before beginning his career in the front office with the Broncos (2012).

A Scottsdale, AZ native, Darren and his wife, Hannah have two children, Emmett and Marlow.

“I believe there is a type of brand that we want our players to play with and it’s a physicality, it’s a toughness. You’re going to feel it, but it’s smart, tough, aggressive, resilient players.”

31 years after he was selected by the team in the first round of the 1994 NFL Draft, **AARON GLENN** was named the 22nd head coach of the New York Jets. Glenn brings 28 years of NFL experience, 15 as a player (eight with the Jets), two as a scout (both with the Jets), and 11 as a coach before beginning his time as head coach.

“This place is special for me. From the time I was drafted and practiced on Long Island, to the time I came back as a scout in New Jersey, this organization has always felt like home. There is nothing better than having my start here as a player, here as a scout, and now here as a head coach. I am ready for it.”

Glenn will work closely with newly appointed General Manager Darren Mougey to lead the organization at the highest level. “Coach Glenn’s partnership with Darren will revitalize this organization,” said Chairman Robert Wood Johnson.

Aligned in their vision and approach, Glenn and Mougey share the common goal of building a winning organization that is built on sustained success. “We have a shared vision on how we’re going to do things,” said Glenn. “There’s nothing better in the world than having ownership that’s committed to winning, and then being able to partner it with a GM that has a shared vision that you have.”

Leading the Jets is something Glenn does not take lightly, something he embraces.

“We are the freaking New York Jets, we are built for this (expletive),” Glenn said during his introductory press conference. “Listen, I wanted this job, I interviewed for a number of them, but I wanted THIS job. I look forward to it, it is going to be a great ride, it really is.”

Throughout his career, Glenn never skipped a step – as a player, scout or coach. He started in junior college before Texas A&M. As a first-round pick with the Jets in 1994, he was part of a team that won 10 total games over his first three seasons. His next five, the Jets never had a losing record, making the postseason twice, including the AFC Championship Game in 1998.

When he wanted to get into coaching, he called his former head coach, Bill Parcells, who said, “You’re not going to coach yet. First, I want you to scout. I think you have a chance to be a head coach with your personality. But in order to be a head coach, you have to understand the personnel part of football.”

As prescribed, he started his scouting career on the bottom rung, joining the Jets as a pro scout (2012) for a year before going on the road as an area scout (2013). The 2013 Jets draft produced five

eventual NFL starters, including two future Pro Bowl selections in Geno Smith and Sheldon Richardson, the 2013 Defensive Rookie of the Year.

As a coach, he was an assistant defensive backs coach (CLV 2014-15), before becoming a defensive backs coach (NO 2016-20), and finally a defensive coordinator (DET 2021-24). He is one of only two active NFL head coaches to have been drafted by and played for the team they coach, joining Houston Texans head coach DeMeco Ryans.

The defensive coordinator with the Lions (2021-24), Glenn’s unit improved every season. After a 3-13-1 season in his first year (2021), Detroit won 36 games between 2022-24, the fourth most in the League, including a League best 27 in his final two seasons (2023-24).

In his final year (2024), Glenn’s defense finished in the top 10 in scoring defense and takeaways. A strong compliment to the offense, Detroit led the League with a +13.1 point per game differential - the fifth-highest margin by any team in the last 25 NFL seasons. The Lions finished fifth in the NFL in rushing yards allowed (1,672) and fourth in percentage of rushing first downs allowed (23.3%), while allowing the lowest opposing passer rating (82.0), and second lowest completion percentage allowed (61.1%). Detroit finished with the lowest third-down conversion rate allowed (32.4%), despite placing a number of key defensive players on injured reserve throughout the season, including five Week One starters.

Through his commitment to their development and success, Glenn elevated his players to reach individual accolades and milestones during his time in Detroit. Safety Kerby Joseph was named first-team All-Pro (2024) after leading the NFL in interceptions (nine), safety Brian Branch earned his first Pro Bowl honor (2024) after he recorded the most forced incompletions among safeties (12) and finished tied for fifth in passes defended (16), and defensive lineman Aidan Hutchinson earned Pro Bowl honors (2023) after recording 11.5 sacks and 83 pressures, the fifth most in the NFL.

As the defensive backs coach for the Saints (2016-20), Glenn developed key defensive playmakers in the secondary: Marcus Williams, Vonn Bell, C.J. Gardner-Johnson, and Marshon Lattimore, who was named Defensive Rookie of the Year (2017) and was selected to three Pro Bowls in his first four seasons. In his final season in New Orleans (2020), the defense finished fourth in the NFL in yards allowed per game (310.9) and fifth in points allowed per game (21.1). Additionally, New Orleans finished tied for first in the NFL in interceptions (18) and tied for the third-most takeaways (26).

In his first season coaching in the League (2014), Glenn, the assistant secondary coach with Cleveland, worked with a secondary unit that earned three Pro Bowl selections. It marked the first time the franchise sent three defensive backs to the League's all-star game in the same season. That year, the Browns led the NFL in opponent passer rating allowed (74.1), completion percentage allowed (57.1), and passes defended (99).

During his brief retirement from football, Glenn owned eight restaurants in the Houston area, before returning to the game he loves in 2012 as the general manger of the Houston Stallions of the Lone Star Football League, an indoor league in Texas.

A three-time Pro Bowl selection himself, Glenn entered the League as the 12th overall selection in the 1994 NFL Draft by the Jets. In his 15-year career (the first eight with the Jets), he played 205 games (176 starts) for five different teams and posted 41 interceptions, six of which he returned for touchdowns. Those 41 interceptions are still a top 25 total since 1994. He is one of just four cornerbacks in Jets history to play 100+ games for the team, joining James Hast, Ray Mickens, and Darrelle Revis. His 24 interceptions with the Jets are tied for the second-most in franchise history since the AFL-NFL merger.

A Humble, TX native, Glenn was a four-year letterwinner in football, basketball, and track at Nimitz (TX) HS, before going on to Navarro College in Corsicana, TX and then Texas A&M. A 1993 graduate with a degree in business management, Glenn was a two-time All-American and the Aggies' all-time leader in passes defended in a season (20), season punt-return average (19.9), and punt return yards in a game (131). He was selected to the Texas A&M Athletic Hall of Fame in 2000.

Glenn and his wife, Devaney, have a son, Aaron II, and two daughters, Tristen and Rheagen. One of 11 children, he and his brother, Jason – a six-year NFL linebacker, spent a season as teammates on the Jets (2001).

CHRIS BANJO begins his first season with the Jets as the special teams coordinator, having joined Aaron Glenn's staff in February. A 10-year NFL veteran, Banjo most recently served as a special teams assistant for the Denver Broncos (2023-24).

Last season (2024), Banjo helped Broncos returner Marvin Mims Jr. lead the League in yards per punt return (15.7), earning First-Team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors. Additionally, under Banjo's lead, kicker Will Lutz recorded the fourth-best field goal percentage (91.2%) in the NFL, among kickers with at least 30 attempts.

As a unit, Banjo helped his group finish again near the top of the League in multiple special teams categories last season, including field goal percentage (sixth – 91.2%), yards per punt return (first – 15.7), and opponent yards per punt return (10th – 8.7).

In his first season with the Broncos (2023), Banjo's special teams unit ranked at the top in multiple categories, including punt return average (first- 16.3), punt return average against (second- 6.3), kickoff return average (eighth- 24.9), and kickoff return average against (ninth- 21.5).

Prior to beginning his coaching career, Banjo played 10 seasons in the NFL (2013-22), spending time with Green Bay (2013-16), New Orleans (2016-18), and Arizona (2019-22).

Banjo entered the League as an undrafted free agent with Jacksonville in 2013. Throughout his career, Banjo appeared in 131 regular season games (seven starts), totaling 85 tackles (59 solo), three interceptions, eight passes defended, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries, and 58 special teams tackles (49 solo).

During the 2020 season, Banjo set career highs in games played (13) and tackles (47), while logging 610 snaps on defense and special teams that season for Arizona.

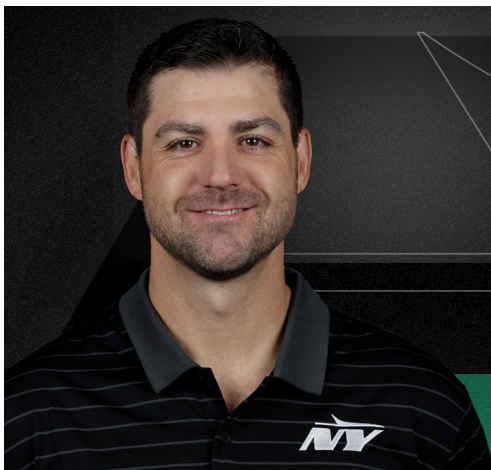

While in New Orleans (2017-18), Banjo was part of a team that won consecutive NFC South Division titles and advanced to the NFC Championship game in 2018. Banjo was a key contributor on special teams, recording 13 tackles (12 solo) in the two-year span.

A graduate of Southern Methodist, Banjo appeared in 51 games (47 starts) for the Mustangs (2008-11), totaling 321 tackles (195 solo), four interceptions, 17 passes defended, three forced fumbles, and three fumble recoveries. He earned second team All-Conference USA honors as a junior (2010) and was an honorable mention All-Conference USA following his senior season.

A native of Houston, TX, Banjo and his wife, Jasmine, have two sons, Christopher Jr. and Cairo, and one daughter, Celine.

TANNER ENGSTRAND begins his first season as offensive coordinator for the New York Jets, after joining Aaron Glenn’s staff in February.

Engstrand brings over five years of NFL coaching experience, after previously serving in various offensive roles on Detroit’s coaching staff. Most recently, Engstrand held the role of passing game coordinator for the Lions (2023-24).

This past season (2024), Engstrand helped the Lions offense finish top of the League in multiple categories, including most points scored (564), most touchdowns scored (70), second-most total net yards (6,962) and the most first downs (410). Under Engstrand, Detroit became only the fifth team in NFL history to produce at least 6,500 total net yards and 70 touchdowns in a season (2024). Individually, Engstrand saw Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown and WR Jameson Williams reach 1,000 receiving yards, with St. Brown earning First-Team All-Pro honors for the second consecutive season.

Additionally, Engstrand helped the 2024 Lions record the second most net passing yards (4,474), the highest completion percentage (72.4%), fourth most passing touchdowns (39), second highest passer rating (112.6), and second most yards per pass attempt (8.56).

Detroit’s pass game last season, led by QB Jared Goff, reached new heights under Engstrand with Goff ranking among the NFL’s most efficient quarterbacks in NFL history. Goff’s nine games with a 75.0%+ completion percentage established a new single season-best in NFL history (min. 15 attempts/game). Additionally, Goff recorded six games with a 130.0+ passer rating, one of only eight quarterbacks in NFL history to do so in a season (min. 15 attempts/game). Engstrand helped Goff finish second in the NFL in passing yards last season (4,629), second in completion percentage (72.4%), and second in passer rating (111.8).

During Engstrand’s first season as passing game coordinator (2023), Detroit finished second in the NFL in net passing yards (4,401), tied for fourth in passing touchdowns (30), and fifth in yards per attempt (7.60). Under Engstrand’s guidance, First-Team All-Pro St. Brown led the NFL in 100-yard receiving games (nine), ranked second in receptions (119), and third in receiving yards (1,515). Engstrand also saw Goff lead the NFL in passing first downs (227), finish second in passing yards (4,575), and fourth in passing touchdowns (30).

Prior to solely serving as the team’s passing game coordinator, Engstrand oversaw Detroit’s tight ends in 2022, in addition to elevated responsibilities in the team’s passing game. That season, Detroit’s tight ends combined for 12 touchdown receptions on the year, establishing a new single-season franchise record. Additionally, the Lions also had three different tight ends produce a multi-touchdown game in 2022, becoming the first team in NFL history to do so.

Engstrand began his NFL coaching career in 2020 as an offensive assistant with the Lions before being promoted to Offensive Quality Control for the 2021 season. Prior to that, he served as the offensive coordinator for the XFL’s DC Defenders (2019-20) after previously spending time at the University of Michigan as an offensive analyst (2018-19).

Engstrand earned a master’s degree in business administration from the University of San Diego in 2007.

STEVE WILKS

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

STEVE WILKS enters his first year with the New York Jets as the team's defensive coordinator, after joining Aaron Glenn's staff in February. Wilks joins the organization with more than 30 years of coaching experience, including 16 at the NFL level, and three Super Bowl appearances.

Wilks most recently served as the defensive coordinator for the San Francisco 49ers (2023), where he helped lead the unit to 12 wins, tied for the most in the conference, an NFC West title, an NFC Championship title, and an appearance in Super Bowl LVIII. Wilks' unit forced 39 three-and-outs of a possible 174 drives (22.4%), good for the eighth best mark in the NFL. Additionally, under Wilks' lead, the 49ers held opponents to 44 red zone drives, the second best in the NFL, and held opposing quarterbacks to an average passer rating of 79.6, the fourth best in the NFL. Wilks helped four 49er defenders earn Pro Bowl honors, and two earn AP All-Pro honors.

Wilks joined San Francisco after spending the 2022 season with the Carolina Panthers as the defensive passing game coordinator and secondary coach and later as the team's interim head coach. As the interim head coach, he led Carolina to six wins across their final 12 games, finishing in a tie for second place in the NFC South after opening the season 1-4.

Wilks spent the 2021 season as the defensive coordinator for the University of Missouri after serving as the defensive coordinator for the Cleveland Browns in 2019. Under Wilks' direction, the Browns improved from 25th to seventh in passing defense that season, allowing 216.9 passing yards per game and registering 14 interceptions, tied for the eighth-most in the League.

Prior to his time in Cleveland, Wilks served as the head coach of the Arizona Cardinals (2018), where he helped lead a top 10 passing defense in the NFL. Additionally, Wilks helped CB Patrick Peterson earn his eighth-consecutive Pro Bowl selection.

Before earning his head coaching role in Arizona, Wilks spent six seasons (2012-17) in multiple defensive roles with Carolina. He originally joined the staff as the defensive backs coach (2012-14), leading a unit that finished seventh in passing defense (221.7) during that span. Wilks saw multiple Panthers players record some of their most successful seasons, recording career highs in tackles, interceptions, and passes defended. During the 2015-2016 seasons, Wilks was awarded additional responsibility, adding assistant head coach to his title.

In 2015, Wilks was part of a coaching staff that helped lead the Panthers to a Super Bowl appearance, leading the NFL in interceptions (24) and finishing sixth in scoring defense (19.3). Under Wilks' lead, CB Josh Norman earned First-Team All-Pro honors and a Pro Bowl selection, while DT Kawann Short was named to his first Pro Bowl and earned Second-Team All-Pro honors that season.

During the 2016 season with Carolina, Wilks saw his secondary finish tied for fourth in the NFL in interceptions (17). After his sustained success each season in Carolina, Wilks was named defensive coordinator for the 2017 season. That year, Wilks coached a unit

that jumped from 21st to seventh in total defense (317.1), finished third in rushing defense (88.1), and 10th in scoring defense (20.4). Additionally, Wilks helped LB Luke Kuechly achieve First-Team All-Pro honors and earn his fifth-consecutive Pro Bowl selection that season.

Wilks spent the 2009-11 seasons with the San Diego Chargers coaching their defensive backs. Over that span, the Chargers ranked fourth in both total defense (315.1) and passing defense (203.8), and in 2010, led the NFL in total defense (271.6). Wilks saw S Eric Weddle earn All-Pro recognition in back-to-back seasons.

Before his time in San Diego, Wilks served as the defensive backs coach for the Chicago Bears from 2006-08. During the 2006 season, Wilks was part of a coaching staff that helped the Bears appear in Super Bowl XLI. Under his lead, the Bears finished second in interceptions (24), third in scoring defense (15.9), and fifth in total defense (294.1) that season.

Prior to coaching in the NFL, Wilks spent 11 years at the collegiate level, coaching defensive backs at the University of Washington (2005), the University of Notre Dame (2004), Bowling Green State University (2003), Appalachian State University (2001), and Illinois State University (2000). Additionally, Wilks served as the defensive coordinator for two different schools: Johnson C. Smith University (1995-96) and Savannah State University (1997-98). Wilks also served one season as head coach at Savannah State University (1999).

A native of Charlotte, NC, Wilks attended Appalachian State University (1987-91) where he earned his bachelor's degree in communications and played defensive back for four years. After graduating, Wilks attended training camp with the Seattle Seahawks (1992).

Wilks and his wife, Marcia, have two daughters, Marissa and Melanni, and a son, Steven James.

WIDE RECEIVERS

SHAWN JEFFERSON enters his fourth season with the New York Jets, and his first as part of Head Coach Aaron Glenn's staff. 2025 marks Jefferson's 21st season as a coach in the NFL, following a 13-year playing career.

Last season (2024), Jefferson guided wide receiver Garrett Wilson to career highs in receptions (101) and receiving yards (1,104), marking his third consecutive 1,000+ yard season, making him the first wide receiver in franchise history, and the 10th player in NFL history, to record at least 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first three seasons. Wilson's 101 receptions were the second most in franchise history behind only Brandon Marshall (109). Additionally, Jefferson helped wide receiver Davante Adams rank ninth in the NFL in receiving touchdowns (seven), 10th in receiving yards (854), and tied for 12th in receptions (67) after being acquired via trade prior to Week Seven. On the season, Jefferson's unit was the only one in the League to produce multiple 1,000+ yard, 75+ reception, and five+ touchdown receivers (Wilson and Adams).

Jefferson began his coaching career shortly after a 13-season playing career during which the former Charger (1991-95), Patriot (1996-99), Falcon (2000-02) and Lion (2003) wide receiver caught 470 passes for 7,024 yards and 29 touchdowns after entering the League as a ninth-round selection in 1991.

Additionally, Washington’s unit held opposing offenses to a 46% efficiency rate in the redzone, the second lowest mark in the League, and to just a 67.6% success rate on goal-to-go downs, the ninth-lowest mark in the League.

Prior to his time in Chicago, Washington served as the defensive line coach for the Buffalo Bills from 2020-23. In 2023, he helped guide a defense that held opposing offenses to 307.2 yards per game, the ninth-best mark in the League, and to 104.6 rushing yards per game, the fifth lowest mark in the League. During Washington’s tenure, the Bills recorded a sack rate of 9.8% per pass attempt, the third-best rate in the League. Additionally, Washington helped contribute to defensive end Leonard Floyd’s success that season, as Floyd registered a career-high 10.5 sacks, tied for 10th most in the League.

ROOSEVELT WILLIAMS joins the New York Jets as a defensive assistant with over 15 years of coaching experience at the NFL and collegiate level.

Williams most recently served as the cornerbacks coach at Houston Christian University (HCU) in 2024. Prior to HCU, he spent four seasons at Hardin-Simmons University (HSU) as the defensive backs coach and defensive pass game coordinator. During his tenure at HSU, Williams coached eight defensive backs to All-American Southwest Conference honors. In 2021, his defensive unit ranked sixth in NCAA Division III for passing defense, allowing just 132 yards per game.

Williams was selected by the Chicago Bears in the third round of the 2002 NFL Draft. He played seven games in his rookie season, starting three, and was named to the NFL All-Rookie Team in 2002. Williams also had stints with the Denver Broncos and Cleveland Browns, starting 15 of the 26 games he appeared in during his time with the Browns. He later played in the Canadian Football League with the Edmonton Eskimos.

ASSISTANT LINEBACKERS

NATHANIEL WILLINGHAM enters his fourth season with the New York Jets, and his first as the assistant linebackers coach, after joining the organization in 2022. He was promoted to defensive backs/nickelbacks coach prior to the start of the 2024 season. For Willingham, 2025 marks his seventh season coaching in the NFL, after five years at the collegiate level.

Willingham has helped the defense register a top five unit in football in each of the last three seasons, ranking fourth (311.1) in total defense in 2022 and third in both 2023 (293.2) and 2024 (318.8). Last season (2024), he helped the defense limit opponents to 192.6 passing yards per game and a 66.7% goal to go efficiency, the fourth and seventh lowest marks in the League respectively.

Prior to joining the Jets, Willingham spent three seasons with the Denver Broncos (2019-21) as a defensive quality control coach. During his time in Denver, the Broncos became the first team since 1995 to lead the League in red zone defense in consecutive seasons (2019-20).
